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Registration Instructions March 30 — April 15, 2005 FALL 2005

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Fall must complete advance registration by April 15th. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- · Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a firstyear student)
- Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- · Have an active Network account

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on Web Self Service on the date listed on your PIN Label. Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on Web Self Service after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on Web Self Service through September 2nd. You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor. To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 161) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on Web Self Service. Students should use Web Self Service to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/ Add card to the Registrar's Office.

REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on cumlative earned credits. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, and earned hours do not include spring attempted credits. You are encouraged to keep these priorities in mind when you develop your course requests. Web Self Service will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.

DROP/ADD on Banner Web Self Service

If you would like to drop and add courses for Fall Term 2005, you may do this through Web Self Service until September 2nd. Please keep your Registration PIN #. You will need this to Drop/Add on Web Self Service. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use Web Self Service from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

Step #1: Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm

Step #2: Identify yourself as needing a Network account.

Step #3: Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

• Your PIN # doesn't work.

Solution: Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit Web Self Service completely and login again. **YOUR PIN#** for registration is <u>not the same</u> as your WSC (Web Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on Web Self Service. Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.

• You lost your PIN #.

Solution: Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)

You entered the wrong CRN #.

Solution: Web Self Service allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using Web Self Service". You may make changes on Web Self Service through September 2nd.

• While using Web Self Service it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".

Solution: Web Self Service is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you leave the screen idle for more than 15 minutes. If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on Web Self Service and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.

• Web Self Service shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.

Solution: You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Fall 2005 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

ACADEMIC PROBATION

Students are required to maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average for all CSB/SJU coursework. Students who fall below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation for the next semester. During the probationary semester, students must raise their cumulative GPA to 2.0 and may take no courses for S/U grading unless the course if offered only on an S/U basis. Students whose cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standards at the end of a probationary semester is subject to dismissal. For more information, see the Official Academic Catalog.

ADDING A CLASS

September 2nd is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after September 2nd. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

Web Self Service will be available to add courses through the 4th day of the semester. After the 4th day of the semester, any additions, with the

instructor's consent, must be made by filling out a drop/add card & filing with the Registrar's Office.


AUDITING A CLASS

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.

However, we do not guarantee that courses of instruction, extra curricular activities or other programs or events will be completed or rescheduled. Refunds will be made to eligible students in accordance with College or University policy.

Classes offered Periods II, III, and IV generally are requested by greater numbers of students than are other periods. You are less likely to be closed out of a class that is scheduled for Period I, or V, and may wish to consider this when you prepare your initial registration.

CO-REQUISITES (COREQ)

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester.

CREDITS EARNED AT OTHER COLLEGES

Students may complete out-of-residence courses and transfer them to Saint Benedict's and Saint John's. The college at which the coursework is completed must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency at the time of enrollment. Courses to be transferred must be similar to courses offered for credit at Saint Benedicts and Saint John's. Courses to be transferred must receive a minimum grade of C. Credits received for these courses are translated into semester credits according to the appropriate translation formula. Grades earned for transferred coursework are not calculated into the student's cumulative GPA. Before credit may be transferred, the Registrar's Office must receive an official transcript directly from the college at which the courses were completed.

With advance approval, students may apply these courses towards core and/or major requirements. Work taken to complete core requirements requires prior consultation with and approval of the Registrar's Office or the Academic Advising Office. Work taken to complete major requirements requires prior consultation and approval of the department chair. The department chair needs to sign an Academic Exemption Form.

Students who intend to transfer coursework from a foreign college or university must consult the director of international studies before beginning such study. Consult the Center for International Education for further information.

CREDIT OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is estimated at \$640.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The Web Self Service registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credit

DROPPING A CLASS

- Sept. 2nd Last day to drop a course using Web Self Service.
 After this date students must fill out a drop/add card & obtain the instructor's signature to receive a permanent drop until September 22nd.
- Sept. 22nd Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- Nov. 17th Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you
 withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the
 end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a W entry; during the final third, a failure.

Students who fail to properly drop or withdraw from a course are subject to a failing grade.

EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and four-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the four-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

GRADUATION INFORMATION

- An Application for Degree must be submitted to the Registrar's Office prior to the award of a degree from Saint John's University or the College of Saint Benedict.
- An Application for Degree is sent spring semester to all CSB/SJU Juniors.
- Submitted applications are then reviewed to ensure all Core and Major requirements are met prior to the award of a degree.
- Results of the Degree Audit are sent to students three times during their senior year: September and February..
- Degrees are issued May, August, and December.

- Upon successful completion of all degree requirements, diplomas and transcripts are sent to all graduates at their permanent address
- An Application for Degree allows students the privilege to participate in the May commencement ceremony.
- Students may participate in the May commencement ceremony if they are within 8 credits of all degree requirements.
- Students who leave CSB/SJU may transfer up to eight semester credits from another accredited institution of higher education to complete their degree requirements.

GRADUATOIN REQUIREMENTS

- 124 credit hours. 45 of these must be taken at CSB/SJU
- 40 of the total credit hours must be upper division (300 level)
- 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- 2.0 minimum GPA major and/or supporting courses (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- Completed Core curriculum requirements
- Acceptance to a major (usually at the completion of sophomore year)
- Requirements for a major (half of the courses for a major must be completed at CSB/SJU)

HOLDS

All financial, academic, student accounts & health center holds must be cleared before registering for classes.

INCOMPLETE GRADE POLICY

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the minimum grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the minimum grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation by March 15th will necessarily result in postponement of their graduation.

INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Fall term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A Call # 10398, or DNA 371-01A, Call # 10399 on Web Self Service. First-year students are not eligible for ILPs.

INTERNSHIPS

SUMMER 2005 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer of 2005 are required to to attend a one-hour Final Pre-Internship Registration session offered in April of 2005. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. All internships which take place during the

summer <u>must</u> be registered under the Summer term <u>not</u> under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Summer 2005 Internship is Friday, May 6th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Assistant Academic Dean.

FALL 2005 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Fall of 2005 are required to to attend a one-hour Final Pre-Internship Registration session offered in April of 2005. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. When you register for fall classes, you may indicate your intent to register for a Fall 2005 internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, Call # 10400 through Web Self Service. Enter the number of credits you expect to earn.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Fall 2005 Internship is Friday, May 6th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Assistant Academic Dean.

SPRING AND SUMMER 2006 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an internship for academic credit during Spring or Summer of 2006 must enroll in the Fall 2005 Pre-Internship Seminar. This seminar meets during A mod, even days, 8:00 am at SJU, or 2:40 pm at CSB. The Pre-Internship Seminar is for no credit. To sign up for this seminar contact the Internship Office, Academic Services Building, phone 5799.

MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at CSB or SJU. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

OFFICIAL COMMUNICATIONS TO STUDENTS BY E-MAIL

The Registrar's Office will use electronic mail as the most expeditious means of communicating with you. Make sure you are not blocking messages from the Registrar's Office in order to receive important notices regarding graduation, cancellation of courses, course schedule updates, etc.

ON TRACK

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through Web Self Service for Faculty Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students MUST see their advisor to receive their Registration PIN # Label.

PERMISSION REQUIRED CLASSES

Before attempting to register for courses listed as "Permission of Instructor or Department", students must obtain written permission.

PREREQUISITES

Check the course listings section of this class schedule to find out if a class has a prerequisite. Make sure you have met all prerequisites before attempting to register for a course. If you have not taken the prerequisite, you must contact the department to seek written approval (signed drop/add card or e-mail directly from the instructor) to register for the course. If you fulfilled the prerequisite through a course taken at another college, please contact the Registrar's Office prior to registration.

REPEATING A COURSE

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you MUST notify the Registrar's Office.

STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9th (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Center for International Education, QUAD 128 at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the Center for International Education or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$199.00 fee.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for a External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**.

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED or GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before August 28th. The course will be added to your Fall 2005 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$640.00 (estimate), will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Simon in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 161.

TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

UPDATES TO THE OFFICIAL CLASS SCHEDULE

Updates, including additional courses, cancellations, changes to existing courses, core approvals & other general changes to the Official Class Schedule will be published periodically on the Registrar's Official website. Notification of the publication of these updates will be sent via E-mail to all students and faculty.

VARIABLE CREDIT COURSES

If a course is listed with a range of credits (variable), you must enter the appropriate credit amount desired when you register for the course. The credit amount you are registered for may impact your status as a full-time student or your financial aid.

VERIFICATION OF ENROLLMENT

The Registrar's Office can provide verification of your enrollment at the College of Saint Benedict or Saint John's University, as well as other information, such as graduation date, majors, full-time status, etc.

WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw by September 22nd no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between September 23rd and November 17th, the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after November 17th, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you MUST notify the office mentioned above.

FALL 2005 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ACCOUNTING

ACCT 310: Corporate Finance

Mark Asuzu

This course is the foundation course in Finance and the prerequisite for all other Finance courses. Topics covered include the time value of money, the financial markets, the concepts of risk and valuation, the types of financing and their relative mix, financial leverage, the cost of capital, and the criteria for evaluating the attractiveness of investment opportunities.

ACCT 315: Investments Mark Asuzu

The primary focus of this course will be the concepts of Modern Portfolio Theory. Through efficient diversification, it is possible to minimize the risk consequences of investing and maximize return. Topics covered will include models of capital market equilibrium, the risk and valuation of financial instruments in the money market, the fixed income and equity markets, and the derivative markets.

ACCT 333: Corporate Financial Analysis Michael Rouse

This course is a mixture of financial theory along with real world applications. The course builds on the concepts of ACCT 310. Topics covered will include financial forecasting, capital budgeting, the cost of capital, capital structure, and long-term financing.

ART 208: Survey of Non-Western Art

Selected survey of great architecture, sculpture and painting of Asia and other non-Western cultures. A study of artworks in relation to religion, culture, philosophy and geography of the non-Western World.

ART 209: European Survey

Nathanael Hauser

An introductory survey of the most significant periods in European Art History from the Ancient World to the present. A study of artworks in relation to religion, culture, philosophy and geography of the European Cultures.

ART 233C: Arts Appreciation

James Hendershot

During this course, students will be actively involved (hands-on) in individual and group work. Students will work with relief prints, calligraph (a type of printing), and mono-prints. Group work will involve presentations and research. Through observation, the students will define the elements and principles of design as it relates to existing works of art as well as self-created works of art. Various media, including photocopy, will be explored throughout the course.

BIOLOGY

BIOL 121: Cellular Life: Introduction to Cell and Molecular Biology

This course includes the topics of biological chemistry, cell structure, metabolism, and classical and molecular genetics. Laboratories provide the students with opportunities to investigate living organisms at a cellular and molecular level. Intended for science majors.

COMMUNICATION

COMM 220: Debate

Terry Check

This course introduces students to the fundamentals of debate. Students will learn argumentation and debate theory and develop research, organization, reasoning, refutation and delivery skills. Students will participate in classroom debates. No previous debate training is expected.

COMM 385: Special Topics: Language, Gender, and Culture Jeanne Cook

This course will examine the relationship between language, gender, and culture in a variety of contexts and cultures. The mutual influences of language and culture, and their role in the creation of gendered roles and identities will be explored.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

CSCI 161: Introduction to Problem-Solving & Programming Lynn Ziegler

Introduces the fundamental concepts of problem-solving and programming from an object-oriented perspective. Through the study of object-oriented design, this course also introduces the basics of human-computer interfaces. graphics, and the social implications of computing.

CSCI 317: Algorithms for Computational Biology J Andrew Holey

This course will examine algorithms for solving problems in bioinformatics, particularly problems in genome and proteome analysis. Students will gain insight into the computational problems that arise in modern molecular biol-

CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS

SENIOR SEMINAR - A Core Curriculum Requirement

The traditions of the liberal arts and the Benedictine character of our two colleges emphasize the need to develop in our students an ability to lead responsible lives in a contemporary world. This concern has always been a central element in notions about striving for a 'good life,' leading a life of civic responsibility, a life of personal integration, a life of 'wholeness.' At the junior/ senior level of the curriculum, this objective implies that explicit and focused attention be paid to developing the ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. Developing this ability is, then, the goal of this program. By 'good moral judgments' we understand choices which are consciously elected and defensively maintained."

A second goal is to enhance, "the ability of students to think well about problems that resist easy solutions, problems that call for combining many separate resources and skills, both intellectual and personal." "The aim of the program is to develop these skills:

- An understanding of the role that empirical information plays in justifying moral judgment
- An ability to sort relevant from irrelevant data
- An understanding of relationships
- An ability to assess the cogency of arguments
- An appreciation of the implications of claims
- An ability to analyze concepts
- An appreciation of and ability to use contextual thinking
- An ability to imagine vividly the impact of events and decisions upon the needs, perceptions, and desires of others
- An appreciation of emotions in the decision making process
- An ability to identify and assess normative components of issues
- An ability to clarify the relationship between an issue and one's own values"

"Issues and concerns around and through which these abilities are developed must be pertinent and persistent in the lives of both students and professors. They should be issues which broaden and deepen the scope of our concern, that increase our consciousness of connections between our lives and the rest of the world." Taken from Exploring the Human Condition.

CORE 390-01B/J: How Do We Know Who We Are?

Nathanael Hauser 2-4-6 / 9:40-10:50 / SJU

So many of the questions that define us as a culture have been raised through and by the art of recent decades, that without coming to terms with our art, we can scarcely understand ourselves." -- Arthur C. Danto, Columbia University.

In an increasingly visual culture, the ability to communicate through the

visual arts is imperative. Students, in this class, will engage artists of the past and present in asking what constitutes a good and moral society. The class emphasis will be on discussion and "conversation" with art works that often raise difficult questions concerning the values of a culture. Students will have the opportunity to research questions of interest, present individual or small group projects and open their analysis to various media including gallery, film, television, and performance arts.

CORE 390-02B/J: Justice in the 21st Century 1-3-5 / 9:40-10:50 / SJU Daniel Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice: everyone is in favor of it. Yet few issues are as controversial: justice has different meanings for different people. This course will examine in detail six rival understandings of justice prevalent in debates today. Students will read two novels and six philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale. Like all Senior Seminars, the goal of this course is to improve each student's ability to make good moral judgments.

CORE 390-03B/J: Current Issues in Society 2-4-6 / 9:40-10:50 / CSB James Makepeace

This senior seminar will be a synthetic examination of four social issues which have recently come to the forefront of public and scholarly attention: terrorism, globalization, treatment of animals, and the environment.

Greatest attention will be given to the environmental issue. Each issue will be examined in a two-fold manner: objective assessment utilizing scientific evidence and theory and normative assessment utilizing tools of ethical theory. Aspects of these social issues to be considered will include: conditions of emergence, theories, applicable social movements and counter-movements, cross-cultural aspects, and social change.

CORE 390-04B/J: Ethics and the Jewish Tradition **Barry Cytron** 1-3-5 / 11:20-12:30 / SJU

An introduction to Jewish ethics, which begins by looking at the sources of Jewish moral principles [as presented in the narrative and legal portions of the Bible and rabbinic literature] and the relationship of those principles to other Jewish religious concepts. We then examine how the classical sources can be applied to practical moral problems, including medical decisions, social and business dilemmas, and interpersonal relationships. In this section of the course, students will be asked to develop a major paper on one of these practical moral problems, and how the Jewish view relates to that of another faith tradition. The course will conclude by examining the unique ethical challenges presented by the events of the Holocaust.

CORE 390-05B/J: Social Issues and the Law Tim Robinson 1-3-5 / 11:20-12:30 / SJU

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law.

CORE 390-06B/J: Poverty, Hunger and Moral Issues Diane Veale Jones 2-4-6 / 1:00-2:10 / CSB

Why is there poverty and hunger in the 21st Century? Who are the poor and hungry? Why are they poor and hungry? What is the impact of poverty and hunger on individuals, households, and nations?

Answers to these questions require us to examine the role of social, economic, political, and agricultural factors as causes of poverty and hunger, and to explore the ethical questions and dilemmas associated with poverty and hunger. What approaches to ending hunger have been successful? Why? Is it possible for an individual or small group to have an impact on ending hunger and poverty? If not, do we still have a moral obligation to try?

A small group service learning project is a requirement of the course.

CORE 390-07B/J: War and the Memory of War in the Last Century Nick Hayes 2-4-6 / 2:40-3:50 / SJU

The twentieth century opened with the promise of peace and prosperity. Our last century, however, witnessed a succession of wars from its beginning to its end. This course examines how twentieth century culture came to remember and interpret the century's wars from WWI, the Spanish Civil War, WWII, the Holocaust, the Vietnam Wars, to the Wars of the ex-Yugoslavia in the 1990's. Our focus falls not on the basic history of each of these tragic events, but on how the memory of the wars shaped our culture and values. Behind our inquires lie disturbing moral questions: How does a society reconcile itself to the knowledge of human atrocity and the legacy of total war on civilian populations? What are our moral and ethical responsibilities to remember that indeed such things happen on this earth?

CORE 390-08B/J: Religion, Identity, and Conflict Noreen Herzfeld

Tuesday / 6:30-9:30 pm / SJU

In many recent conflicts the sides have been identified primarily through religious affiliation. But are these religious conflicts? And, if so, to what extent do the religious traditions involved affect both the cause and the means used in these conflicts? This course will address the role of religion and identity in recent conflicts in Northern Ireland, Bosnia, and the Middle East. Our focus will be on how religious tenets, values, and customs have shaped these conflicts. We will also continually ask how comprehensive the role of religion is in these conflicts. What is the role of religion in shaping personal or group identity and how do religious values affect our decisions in times of both war and peace? Does one's religious affiliation affect one's world view, even when one is no longer an active participant in that tradition? How can we reconcile religion with the acts committed in its name?

CORE 390-09B/J: Does Gender Matter in Moral and Ethical Thinking? Charles Thornbury Tuesday & Thursday / 6:30-8:00 pm / SJU

This course investigates the moral and ethical implications of our conceptions of gender roles of males and females. A selection of themes from the following list will give us meeting points: the gendered classroom; gendered religion and monasteries; war; capital punishment; work and the workplace; and love, sex, and friendship.

Core 390-10B/J: Expanding Awareness and Consciousness (without drugs!)

Leigh Dillard Wednesday / 6:30-9:30 pm / CSB

This course examines how our perception of reality, and ourselves, is determined by our belief-systems and how unaware we are of our own resulting biases and blind spots. The course explores different ways of thinking and knowing from a variety of perspectives (e.g., somatics, psychology, neuroscience, the arts) and includes an experiential component combining meditation, the Feldenkrais Method, creative movement and play as means for increasing self-awareness and altering belief-systems and perceptions of reality.

ECONOMICS

ECON 359-01A: Industrial Organization and Public Policy Parker Wheatley

Theoretical and empirical investigation of industry structure and conduct as well as issues of location, information, pricing strategy, and advertising. Empirical and case studies of theories of firm organization. Exploration of topics such as network economics, technology adoption and technological standards, the value of innovation, and intellectual property.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 334; or 332 & concurrent registration in ECON 334

ECON 359-02A: Public Services Redesign John Brandl

Market failure is a standard rationale for government action. In recent decades, government has come to be seen as also failing in some circumstances and, some say, for similar reasons that markets fail. The course is concerned first with market failure, then with various forms of government failure. Next the course considers how the existence or possibility of government failure affects the argument for government action in the face of market failure. Finally, the bulk of the course is devoted to ways of designing public service programs so as to reduce the likelihood of government failure and market failure. Students completing the course should have an understanding of:

Reasons for and forms of market failure

Reasons for and forms of government failure

Alternative views concerning the incidence of and seriousness of government failure

Some designs/policies that hold promise for reducing the incidence of and untoward effects of government failure

The course will be conducted through lectures, discussion and formal debates. There will be a midterm examination. At the end of the course, each student will submit a paper describing and defending a reform to the way a public service of the student's choice is delivered.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 332

ECON 361: Evolution of Economic Systems Ernie Diedrich

Theoretical and practical examinations of how societies throughout history have organized their economies to accomplish social aims. Emphasis on how different societies have conducted vital functions such as health care, environmental protection, social security, defense, energy production, and trade. Special attention to reform efforts and their effectiveness. PREREQUISITE: ECON 332

ENGLISH

ENGL 130-01A: Reading Fiction: Novel Pleasures

Christina Tourino

Cross-listed with HONR 250A-01A. See description under HONR 250A

ENGL 355A: F. Scott Fitzgerald & William Faulkner Charles Thornbury

F. Scott Fitzgerald and William Faulkner were physically small in stature but in American literature they stand above most writers. In this course, we will live with their lives and works. We will read not only most of their novels and short stories but also a biography of each. Since Fitzgerald grew up in St. Paul and wrote a number of stories based there, we will take a tour of the haunts and homes of his life and fiction

Faulkner, who was awarded the Nobel Prize, is acclaimed throughout the world as one of our greatest writers. He transformed his native Mississippi soil into an apocryphal setting which he explored, articulated, and challenged. During what is generally considered his period of greatest artistic achievement, from The Sound and the Fury in 1929 to Go Down, Moses in 1942, Faulkner wrote more great works in a little over a decade than most writers accomplish over a lifetime, an extraordinary achievement since he did not graduate from high school, never received a college degree, and lived in a small town in the poorest state in the nation. Fitzgerald created his own legends. His life frequently overshadows his work as the drunken writer, the ruined novelist, the spoiled genius, the personification of the Jazz Age, the sacrificial victim of the Depression. The glamour, the triumph, the euphoria, the heartbreak, and the tragedy of his life were genuine, and it is impossible to dissociate the man from his work. But today he is considered one of the major prose stylists of the 20th century. He portrays the boom of the 1920s - The Great Gatsby being a major novel not only of the era but also of the century - and the crash of the 1930s. His themes combine the hollowness of the American worship of riches and the never-ending dream of love, splendor, and hope.

ENGL 385C: Literature of South Asia *Madhu Mitra*

East is East, and West is West, and never the twain shall meet.

--Rudyard Kipling

There has been a consistent strain in Western ideology, which has defined the East as absolutely Other. Whether it is judged to be execrable or laudable, India, China, Japan, and other countries in the area have been seen as mystical, inscrutable lands where even the most ordinary actions [are] imbued with symbolism.

--Patrick Colm Hogan, "Beauty, Politics, and Cultural Otherness: The Bias of Literary Difference"

This course is an attempt to recover the Indian subcontinent from a persistent tendency in the Western media to cast the land as "mysterious" or "mystical" and its people as "spiritual" or "exotic." Our readings of literary texts from India, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka, will reveal the concerns expressed by the writers of these countries—concerns that are rooted in and shaped by the material and historical world they inhabit. This course is not an introduction to the "culture" of the Indian subcontinent, but an attempt to understand the complex relationship between cultural production (literature) and what Terry Eagleton calls "its enabling material conditions" ("Introduction," *Marxist Literary Theory*). We might indeed encounter veiled women and snake charmers—perhaps even elephants—in our readings, not as symbols of an unknowable, exotic East, but as representations of certain forms of social consciousness.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The E-Scholars program (ENTR) is a three course interdisciplinary sequence open to all students regardless of major. The program focuses on social entrepreneurship, encouraging students to be creative about how they can make a difference to improve society. Students interested in the program will go through a selection process that includes an application and interview. Accepted students will become part of a cohort group. The cohort will complete the three course sequence and travel together to visit with successful entrepreneurs in the United States and abroad. ENTR 301: Creating World Class Ventures Paul Marsnik

This is the first in a three course sequence for the E-Scholars program. The course covers conceptual entrepreneurial skills needed to create a business that is globally competitive. Each student creates a feasibility plan for a potential world class venture. Students will observe first hand, the best practices of entrepreneurial organizations. Students will also be introduced to issues of organizational integrity and ethics. Permission of instructor required.

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

ENVR 150: Introduction to Environmental Studies Ernie Diedrich

Interdisciplinary introduction to environmental studies. Case-based investigation of environmental issues combining perspectives from the social sciences, natural sciences, and humanities. Topics will vary but may include such subjects as endangered species, air/water pollution, environmental justice/racism, animal rights, global warming, ecotourism, agriculture, nature writing, campus ecology, and others.

ENVR 215: Learning Community Gordon Brown

The Environmental Studies Learning Community is a discussion and field-based course exploring current environmental issues in our community, region, and state. Students meet in a weekly seminar to discuss readings, interact with guest speakers, and conduct group projects. Required field components include weekend camping trips, day trips to local sites of environmental interest, and service learning projects. <u>PREREQUISITE</u>: Concurrent registration in <u>any two</u> other courses approved for the Environmental Studies major.

Course Fee: \$75 for field trips/camping

GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES

GWST 101: Introduction to Gender and Women's Studies Diane Veale Jones

This course explores gender through the history, traditions, and politics surrounding food. Topics for analysis include the changing philosophical, political, biological, nutritional, social, and cultural contexts surrounding gender and identity in relation to foodways.

GWST 290: Men's Studies Research Gar Kellom

In addition to men's studies content and research methodology, students participate in three ongoing research projects in the SJU men's center: a small group social norms study of masculinity, a social norms spirituality project, and an international men's stories project. Additional projects may be developed. Class time arranged with those enrolled. May be repeated.

HISTORY

HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium: "EAST MEETS WEST: EVER THE TWAIN SHALL MEET"

Richard Bohr

The Victorian poet Rudyard Kipling once wrote that "East is East, and West is West, and never the twain shall meet." This course seeks to prove him wrong by exploring the long, intimate relationship between Asia and the West. In particular, we will study the initial East-West encounter through the Silk Road, Marco Polo, and the spice trade; trace the destruction of traditional Asia in the wake of modern Western imperialism; analyze Asia's efforts to achieve "self-strengthening" through the adaptation of Western ideas and institutions; assess Asia's contribution to Western culture; and envision East-West partnerships in the newly-dawned "Asian Century."

The course will employ such Asian and Western primary sources as memoirs, letters, autobiographies, treaties, newspapers, magazines, novels, film, and photography as well as secondary sources. Through role play, debate, and other interactive formats, we will focus on the images and stereotypes Asians and Westerners have held of one another. At semester's end, students will share their exhibits on specific aspects of the East-West encounter with the CSB/SJU community.

HIST 300: Intro to Museums & Public History *Marcia Anderson*

In their book *The Presence of the Past: Popular Uses of History in American Life*, Roy Rosenzweig and David Thelen argue that most Americans get their history from visits to museums, historical societies, and historic sites. In this course we'll explore the theories, methods and practices of history in these public venues.

We will work in the classroom, and we'll also visit and study how public history is practiced and expressed at the Minnesota Historical Society, the Stearns History Museum, the Art and Heritage Place/Haehn Museum, the Hill Museum and Manuscript Library, and others.

Work will include reading, writing, class discussion, and individual and group projects.

HIST 300B: Civil Rights William Green

This course will examine central topics that contributed to the development of civil rights for African Americans, the interrelationship between social custom and the social contract, and tension between race, ethnicity and class.

HIST 389: Historiography & Methods for Social Science Majors Ken Jones

This course has multiple goals. At the most basic level, it is intended to make you more familiar with the history of the United States over the last 50 years, but it also raises the issue of historiography, or how the story of these decades has evolved as different people have shaped the narrative. Finally, it is designed to increase your readiness to teach High School History. My hope is that you will leave this course with more confidence in your ability to lecture and lead discussion, and with some new ideas on how to make the recent past exciting for the students you will soon be teaching.

HIST 395: Historiography & Methods: Debating Empire Cynthia Curran

If the sun never set on the British Empire (largely because, one wag observed, God knew that an Englishmen could never be trusted in the dark) and it was the largest empire ever created, what influences can be traced in today's world? Niall Ferguson argues that the Empire was largely positive in that it acted as an agency which imposed free markets and the rule of law on a quarter of the globe; he advocates that the United States shoulder the burden abandoned by Britain. Other historians differ violently and investigate the complex interrelationships between race, gender, ritual, or material culture in order to reassess the impact of British imperialism in a postmodern world. In this class, we will examine the different sources and approaches of historians in interpreting the post-1857 Empire, with special emphasis on South Asia and Africa. Readings will be varied and will include widely divergent views. Students will be required to write an historiographical essay on some aspect of Empire which is of particular interest.

HONORS

HONR 230A: Playwriting

Kaarin Johnston

The theory and practice of writing plays for theater performance. Writing exercises and reading assignments will culminate in the writing of an original one-act play. Prerequisite: Successful completion of First-Year Symposium.

HONR 240A: The Development of the Christian Tradition Vincent Smiles

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures, such as creation, covenant, kingdom, prophets, gospel and New Testament letters. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to Biblical Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

HONR 250A: Reading Fiction: Novel Pleasures Christina Tourino

Cross-listed with ENGL 130-01A

This course introduces novel-reading and its pleasures. W will read novels from a wide variety of genres and narrative styles, published from the mid 1800's to the present. Though vastly different, each of these novels thematizes reading itself, and asks us to think about what stories do for us and why we read them. What is it about stories (fable, epic, art, theatre, history, among other forms) that makes us love, need, and sometimes even obsess about them? We will approach these novels with some basic tools from the philosophy of art, as well as some feminist literary theory. Theoretical materials may include writings by Plato, Sidney, Rousseau, Freud and Millet. Novels may include: Don Quijote by Cervantes, Madame Bovary, by Gustave Flaubert, The Great Gatsby, by F. Scott Fitzgerald, Absalom, Absalom!, by William Faulkner, Chronicle of a Death Foretold, by Gabriel Garcia Márquez, and Kiss of the Spiderwoman by Manuel Puig, and Lolita by Vladimir Nabokov.

HONR 310: Great Books/Ideas Karen Erickson

This is a year-long discussion based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Augustine, Euripides, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, Camus, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Eliot, Faulkner, Pynchon, Freud, Homer, Kafka, Flaubert, Melville, Dinesen, Flannery O'Connor, Plato, Nabokov, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Virginia Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to Junior and Senior honors students who will complete the entire year. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of works during the summer.

HONR 340B: Christianity in Relation to Judaism John Merkle

Cross-listed with HONR 350C-01A

This course explores the Jewish tradition, the emergence of Christianity within and from that tradition, the de-Judaization of Christianity, traditional Christian teachings about Judaism, anti-Jewish formulations of Christian faith, contemporary Christian affirmations of Judaism's abiding validity, and the implications of these new affirmations for Christian self-understanding and for Christian-Jewish relations.

HONR 350B: Morality & Human Nature Charles Wright

Humans have wondered about the basis of human morality since the beginning of recorded history. Some have argued that human morality is innate, a kind of "moral instinct;" others that it is a product of society; yet others that it is based on human rationality. Typically these three perspectives have been thought to be mutually exclusive and in competition with one another. This

class will consider whether they might actually be compatible. For this purpose, we will study writings from several sources. One will be the tradition of evolutionary ethics, whose advocates suggest that human morality is at least in part the product of natural selection. Humans with a certain propensity for fair play, the argument goes, are more likely to survive and reproduce than those lacking this propensity. But evolution is also a cultural process. So we will also be reading the works of philosophers and social theorists who examine how moral values have evolved over time. Finally, we'll also consider basic philosophical investigations into the rational roots of morality. By integrating all three perspectives on morality, we'll be able to develop a robust understanding not only of how humans are "naturally" moral animals, but also of how it is possible for humans to behave badly as often as we do.

HONR 350C: Christianity in Relation to Judaism John Merkle

Cross-listed with HONR 340B-01A. See description under HONR 340B

HONR 390: Senior Seminar: Justice in the 21st Century Daniel Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice: everyone is in favor of it. Yet few issues are as controversial: justice has widely divergent meanings for different people. This course will examine in detail five rival understandings of justice prevalent in debates today. Students will read two novels, and five philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale. Like all Senior Seminars, the goal of this course is to improve each student's ability to make good moral judgments.

MANAGEMENT

MGMT 241: Decision Making Using Computer Application Software Karleen Nordquist

This course is an advanced computer applications course for students who already have some knowledge of Microsoft Excel computer software. Students will use case studies and computer software in the analysis and decision making process related to the case studies. Case studies will come from the four functional areas in organizations.

MGMT 243: Introduction to Management Information Systems Karleen Nordquist

This course covers the conceptual foundations of management information systems and the various types of computer-based information systems and their roles in organizations. The course also introduces students to the relational-database structure underlying modern information systems and the information systems tools that managers use.

MGMT 305: Marketing Research

This course introduces methods for collecting and analyzing data to solve marketing problems. Topics include research design, secondary and primary data collection, sample design and data analysis.

PREREQUISITE: MGMT 321

MATHEMATICS

MATH 340: Applied Optimization

This course is in the same spirit as Math 315 - Operations Research but with a different selection of topics. Students will be able to take both courses if they wish, in either order. The material we will cover is very applications-driven, where the applications will tend to be from fields other than the natural sciences.

Consider the following variety of situations: You are setting up a mail order operation and need to decide how many telephone agents should be scheduled at various times and how many customers can be placed on hold at a time. Or you run a warehouse and need to decide when to reorder merchandise – ordering too frequently may lead to overstocked inventory, but ordering too late may lead to customers being turned away because you don't have the desired items in stock yet. Perhaps you are a track coach and have to decide which team members to place in which events, based on your knowledge of the strengths of your and other team's players, knowing that the other coaches are trying to guess your strategy just as you are trying to guess theirs. Or, in a manufacturing operation, you are trying to allocate resources in an optimal way.

Each of these problems can be addressed using different kinds of mathematics. Each one calls for a value judgment as to what is meant by "optimal" and then a mathematical method for determining the optimal course of action. We will draw on calculus, matrix algebra, and probability theory as our main tools, in conjunction with the optimization software LINDO on our computer network.

MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

FREN 352: Movers and Shakers through the ages in France Vera Theisen

How did France become the country it is today? How have women and men interacted in constructive ways to produce an impressive civilization? The course will present a survey of various, important movements that were instrumental in the development of French culture, society and government, along with particular individuals, men and women, who were central to such events. Examples: the troubadour singers and poets in the Middle Ages created an unusual vision of love and romance that placed women on a pedestal, to be loved and admired. During the Renaissance, many women pursued scholarly lives and became educated despite the national trends against this pursuit. The elegant, intellectual salons of the 17th century were led by women who discussed on an equal basis with philosophers and poets of the time. During the difficult years of the French Revolution, women were very much involved and active in the political process. Modeled after the Declaration of the Rights of Man, a similar document was later written to define the rights of women. In the XXth century, French women were leaders the feminist movement that was to influence the whole Western world. Through discussion and writing on these themes, students will learn of a sophisticated, literary and political French

FREN 354: Eléments de la Phonétique Ned Dubin

Tired of getting interrupted in English before you can finish your sentence? Try losing that American accent! A study of the acoustic differences between English and French, with practice in rhythm, intonation, word groups, emphasis, enchaînement, liaison, spelling/pronunciation (hooked on French phonics), nasals, rounded vowels and other problem sounds, as well as an introduction to the international phonetic alphabets. The instructor may have to present some technical niceties of sound production in English; students will speak only French. Scenes from plays, poetry, songs, tongue-twisters, but some less entertaining stuff too (like dictée). Required equipment: standard size cassette tapes and some way of recording onto them. S/U grading only.

SPAN 355: Colombia: a case of paradoxes in Latin America Gladys White

The representation of Colombian society is a case of paradoxes reflected in its recent history of war, nation building, and democracy. Its recent history is one of extreme social and political polarization, a phenomenon that plagues most Latin American countries, where the state is unable to incorporate its people and territory within a unitary idea of a nation.

The course aims to provide an insight into Colombian society and by extension into Latin America by means of an examination of key novels, cultural essays and films. It aims to encourage a critical perspective on history in order to better enable engagement with and analysis of the present-day conflict. Students will become familiar with a wide array of sources and perspectives, and develop a multi-dimensional approach to Colombian issues. They will recognise the most difficult problems of this society, the concerns and priorities of a range of people in grass roots organizations, non governmental agencies, intellectuals and artists. They will be able to engage critically with both primary and secondary sources, and to develop their own perspective and analysis of Colombian society. But most importantly, students will be able to place Colombia in a global context where developing countries failed to breach the gap which is everyday widening between the haves and the have-nots.

PHILOSOPHY

PHIL 368: Will Power: Myth or Reality

Rene McGraw

In any casual conversation, at some point someone is likely to say, "If only I had more will power, then...." But is there such a thing as will-power? Are there any steroids around to enhance our will power? Or is the will power simply a myth? But even a more basic question must be asked. What is the will? These are the questions which this course will face, using, as the basic text, Paul Ricoeur's *Voluntary and the Involuntary*. Two exams. One major paper. Daily writing of a half page.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

PHYS 267: Theory of Coaching Soccer

Students enrolled in PHED 267 have the opportunity to attain a class 'E' certificate through the Minnesota Youth Soccer Association under the umbrella of the United States Soccer Federation. The 'E' certificate is a prerequisite to a 'D' license. Course material will cover proper technical execution and education in addition to an introduction to the tactical, physical and psychological aspects of the game. Students choosing to pursue a class "E" license will be required to put in 5 additional hours of classroom and/or practical experience and pass a practical exam, in addition to requirements of the PHED 267 course. There will be a \$25 administrative fee for students choosing to pursue the class "E" certificate.

PHYSICS

PHYS 365: Topics in Elementary Particle Physics Tom Kirkman

Physics at the smallest known length scale. Topics will include relativistic particle decay, construction of baryons and mesons from quarks, the four fundamental interactions and corresponding gauge particles, the vision and consequences of grand unified theories, the cosmic onion. PREREQUISITE: 320

PHYS 366: Topics in Relativity

Tom Kirkman

Foundations and application of the special and general theories of relativity. Topics covered may include: relativistic kinematics, structure of flat spacetime, curvature and topologies of general space-times, Schwarzschild and Friedman solutions, cosmology, blackholes and gravitational radiation. *PREREQUISITE*: 320

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 393-01A: Social Psychology of the Self

Pamela Bacon

This course focuses on understanding the theories and controversies associated with contemporary social psychological research on the self. Some of the questions we will explore include: Where does self-knowledge and self-esteem come from? How does the self affect the way we think and feel about ourselves? How does the self influence our motivation and behavior? When are positive thoughts about the self more important than accurate thoughts about who we are? Are there different conceptions of the self in different cultures? Is high self-esteem always preferable to low self-esteem? To address these questions, students will read and discuss empirical journal articles written by leading social psychologists. Students will also have the opportunity to design, implement, and present their own social psychological experiment related to the self.

PSYC 393-02A: Clinical Neuroscience Laura Helfritz

Detailed consideration of mental illness from the neuroscience/biological perspective; topics to include anxiety disorders, mood disorders, schizophrenia, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, prion diseases, Huntington's disease, autism, aggression, and personality disorders. This reading-intensive course will follow a discussion format and will require participants to prepare and present a major paper to seminar participants.

PREREQUISITE: Junior or Senior standing and 20 credits in Psychology.

SOCIOLOGY

SOCI 367: Advanced Topics in Sociology: World Populations Jeff Kamakahi

The course investigates important aspects of populations (e.g., fertility, mortality, migration, consumption) and their impact upon development and social change. Participants will investigate and discuss the role of demographics vis-à-vis major Sociological perspectives, social and cultural inequalities, public policy, and the expected life chances of populations by demographic profiles. Students are expected to have some quantitative skills as well as a working knowledge of spreadsheets and SPSS.

STUDY ABROAD COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

GENERAL TO VARIOUS PROGRAMS:

MGMT 389: Study Abroad Experiential Learning

This course is designed for students participating in Study Abroad. Reading relevant to understanding business in the international environment will be assigned. Students will write a series of essays integrating their knowledge of theory with their personal observations and reactions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the impact of culture on business. The course will be taught by a professor at CSB/SJU using distance learning to maintain contact with students located in a variety of countries.

CHILE

Program Director, Jose Antonio Fabres

CORE 390A: Censorship: Its moral implications and personal ramifications

The Goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. This senior seminar will touch, in some way, on a form or manifestation of moral judgment (s) encountered in the site country or culture. A more detailed course description will be provided by the program director at a later date.

RESTRICTED TO JUNIORS AND SENIORS FOR SENIOR SEMINAR CORE DESIGNATION.

NOTE: Students who are sophomores, Education or Social Work majors, or who have already completed their Senior Seminar requirement, must see

Academic Advising to determine if this course may fulfill another Core requirement

POLS 357: International Relations between Latin America and the United States

Cross-listed with SPAN 357

This course delivers a critical perspective on historical, social, political, and economic relations between different Latin American countries and the United States. Special emphasis will be given to the analysis of the relations of Chile and the United States.

SPAN 322: Topics of Conversation and Composition on Chilean and Latin American Issues

This course is designed to increase accuracy in writing and conversation to facilitate the acquisition of language skills necessary to express oneself in various contexts. Classes revolve around frequent written compositions, selected readings, and discussions on Latin American issues.

SPAN 326: Seminar on Chilean Culture

This seminar is an interdisciplinary course covering different aspects of the Chilean culture: literature, culture, music, painting and history. The course offers a vision of problems, ideologies, social reality and the colonization process during the 16th and 17th centuries. We will discuss and analyze the implications of the social and economic conflicts in the 21st century.

SPAN 328: History of Chile

This course seeks to give the foreign student the tools for analysis and reflection to allow him/her to understand Chile's historical development between the institutional crisis and reformulation of 1925 and the end of the 20th Century, including the period of the Exclusionary Utopias, the Marxist Experiment of Popular Unity, the Military Government and the process of national political transition and regularization. Regarding these processes the student should be able to, by the end of the course, make his/her own reasoned judgments and deepen his knowledge through the recommended readings.

SPAN 329: Seminar on Latin American Literature

This course is designed to give a vision Hispano America through the aesthetic expression of the word, which inserts the beautiful as a particular aspect of man and, in particular, of the Hispano American being. It includes a view from written as well as oral literature. In addition, we will deal with literary expression as a form of Hispano American Identity. The course will be on rotating writers and topics. (HMU)

SPAN 356: Topics: Arts and Identity in Latin America

The study of artistic phenomena is a very useful tool for an in-depth study of a culture. This course aims to promote the understanding of Latin American artistic forms from the pre-Columbian world to the popular expressions of the Twentieth Century, seeking in its iconography and morphology, signs of cultural identity of the nations found in the continent. (FA pending)

SPAN 357: International Relations between Latin America and the United States

Cross-listed with POLS 357

This course delivers a critical perspective on historical, social, political, and economic relations between different Latin American countries and the United States. Special emphasis will be given to the analysis of the relations of Chile and the United States.

FRANCE

Program Director, Camilla Krone

CORE 390A: Ethical Considerations in Contemporary French Society

In this course we will examine various aspects of contemporary French culture from an ethical perspective as well as from an intercultural perspective. Much of the course will focus on French institutions that affect the daily lives of the French such as their multi-party parlementary govenernment, a generously funded education system (pre-school through university), social security (unemployment, family allocations, retirement), and national health care. We will also consider France's membership in the European Union and the ways in which this affects (or threatens to affect) what the French have come to consider as rights. Finally, we will examine social conflict in contemporary France, especially surrounding the current hot-button issues of immigration, difference in terms of race, social class, and religion, and the notion of assimilation. The course will begin with a brief study of Ethics and of the concept of culture and cultural views that will inform our study of French society.

THEATER

THEA 210: Dance Studies

This course will offer students the opportunity to develop technical skills to improve flexibility, coordination, and strength and to use those skills to increase their range of abilities in creating and performing dance. Modern

dance techniques will serve as the foundation for students to build a movement vocabulary, and students will be expected to develop their own movement material in improvisation and composition exercises. Choreographic elements, form, and styles will be explored to guide students in the creative process and performance will be an on-going focus within the class. The goal is for the students to be able to clarify and fulfill all movement so they can physically express their ideas and emotions in movement which is authentic and meaningful, i.e., dance. Repeatable up to 6 credits.

THEA 310: Advanced Dance Studies

Continuation of THEA 210 Dance Studies for more advanced students, taught concurrently with THEA 210. Repeatable up to 6 credits.

THEOLOGY

THEO 201: Thinking Theologically Miguel Diaz

While offering an overview of topics within systematic theology (God, Trinity, Christ, grace, salvation, church, and sacraments), this course fosters skills of theological thinking, speaking, and writing, and provides a foundation for more specialized courses. Restricted to THEO majors and minors.

THEO 307: Bible, Church, and Gender Vincent Smiles

Cross-listed with CORE 307

Focusing on the importance of Bible and Church for society, ideas about femininity and masculinity, roles of women in the Christian tradition, the use of the Bible as a norm for modern sexual ethics and family values, and views on marriage and sexuality, this course explores the engagement between the Christian biblical tradition and modern perspectives arising from the study of gender.

THEO 333: Suffering and Christian Healing Juliann Heller

Cross-listed with CORE 333

This course considers human suffering and the Christian ministry of healing from historical, literary, psychological, scientific, and theological perspectives.

THEO 339: Discernment and Christian Decision Making Marian Diaz

This (2-credit) course introduces students to Christian perspectives on moral and spiritual discernment as a process for vocational decision-making. Students apply discernment skills through reflection on personal experiences and discussion of case studies.

THEO 342: Theology of Sex and Marriage David Cloutier

Cross-listed with CORE 342

This course examines our actions relating to sex, love, dating, and marriage, placed within our larger vocation of relationship to God. While attending to sociological data and cultural context, particularly of present-day American culture, this course focuses on how Christian narratives from scripture and tradition shape our visions of sex and marriage, and it addresses contested questions regarding premarital sex, homosexual activity, contraception, divorce, etc.

THEO 349A: Family, Church, and Society Kari-Shane Davis

Cross-listed with CORE 349A

Drawing on historical, sociological, and religious sources, this course introduces students to a range of perspectives concerning the intersection of family, church and society, focusing on issues such as cohabitation, marriage, divorce, homosexuality, and gender roles.

THEO 365: Islam and the Judeo-Christian Tradition

Instructor: Jon Armajani

Cross-listed with CORE 360A

This course explores the history of Islam and its interpretations, as well as doctrines and practices among Muslims in various parts of the world. It examines the Quran and Hadith, and topics related to women and gender, Islamic law, and Islam and politics. Close attention is given to the historical, political, and theological relationships and dissonances between Islam and the Judeo-Christian tradition.

THEO 390: Moral Theology David Cloutier

This course introduces students to basic ethical concepts (such as human action, human agency, natural law, freedom, conscience, and the Christian moral life) and to the application of Christian moral reasoning to contemporary ethical issues. Restricted to THEO majors and minors.

THEO 395: Advanced Seminar in Theology Vincent Smiles

This seminar will investigate the growth of the Church from the earliest apostolic communities through the period of the early Church Fathers. It will focus on the formation of Christian communities and ministries and the significance of baptism and Eucharist in that process. Restricted to THEO majors and minors.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

DOCT 419: Mariology

Cross-listed with LTGY 468-01A

Scriptural, Christological and ecclesiological bases of the Church's view of Mary. The development of Marian devotions and their place in the history of spirituality and in contemporary spiritual life.

DOCT 468-01A: U.S. Hispanic Theology Miguel Diaz

An introduction to U.S. Hispanic theology and the writings of contemporary U.S. Hispanic theologians, the course examines the presence and diversity of Hispanic communities in the Unites states and U.S. Hispanic theology as an expression of the contemporary quest to do theology in light of specific contexts (e.g. the emergence of local or contextual theologies). The course explores the following theological themes from a U.S. Hispanic perspective: theological method, biblical interpretation, Christology, doctrine of God, anthropology, ecclesiology, Mariology, and the centrality of popular faith expressions in U.S. Hispanic theological discourse.

HHTH 468-01A: Eastern Christianity Columba Stewart

Cross-listed with SPIR 468-01A & MONS 468-01A

The traditions of eastern Christianity were formative of the western church, and have continued to develop their distinctive identities rooted in ancient Christian cultures. This course will consider the variety and history of eastern Christian traditions, and then examine distinctive characteristics of eastern Christian faith and practice, especially liturgical spirituality, the importance of image and sacred space, the use of the body in prayer, and an emphasis on monasticism as the fundamental form of spiritual life for both vowed monastics and lay people.

LTGY 468-01A: Mariology

Cross-listed with DOCT 419-01A. See description above

LMUS 468 01a Gregorian Chant Schola Anthony Ruff

Small ensemble which sings Gregorian chant according to informed scholarship and performs regularly at liturgies on campus.

SPIR 468-02A: Art & Religious Experience Don Saliers

This seminar will explore questions of religious and theological aesthetics by focusing on specific works from a variety of art forms: music, poetry, dance, painting, among others. We will read key historical texts from both philosophical and theological traditions, including Plato, Plotinus, Aquinas, Kant, and more recent figures such as von Balthasar. Particular attention will be given to relations between aesthetic and religious patterns of experience and judgment. Proposals will be considered for how Christian liturgy is an "eschatological art."

SSNT 468-01A: Bible: Image and Text—WEB SSNT 468-02A: Bible: Image and Text—MEPKIN Michael Patella

At the foundation of Christian Civilization lies the Bible. The Word of God not only has been a source of salvation for millions, but it has also been a fount of inspiration for myriads of artists, poets, and musicians. Is there a connection between biblical exegesis and art? Using the Saint John's Bible as a model, this course will put the tradition of biblical manuscript illumination in dialogue with the historical-critical method of interpretation. The premise of this course is that the artistic imagination, when in dialogue with biblical scholarship, can lead to new insights and interpretation of Sacred Scripture.

SSOT 468-01A: Women of the Old Testament—WEB Irene Nowell

Women, both named and nameless, have played a significant role throughout the history of God's people. After a consideration of the techniques and effects of storytelling, we will study the stories of women throughout the Old Testament, paying particular attention to their experience and influence. We will also consider the later interpretation of these stories and probe their significance for faithful people today.

CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 8 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—four events per semester.

2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses) -- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 &101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. <u>Cannot be repeated for credit.</u> Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

- ⇒ Students should go to the Registrar's Office on either campus to register for on-campus courses. Registration for on campus courses will begin on January 10th, 2004 and ends on April 26th.
- ⇒ Students should contact the Faculty Moderator to register for off-campus courses.

SUMMER 2005 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer 2005 are <u>required</u> to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2005. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. All internships which take place during the summer <u>must</u> be registered under the Summer term <u>not</u> under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. The last day to register for a Summer 2005 Internship is Friday, May 6. Registration after this date requires approval of the Internship Director.
