

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### Registration Instructions March 28— April 13, 2007 FALL 2007

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Fall must complete advance registration by April 13<sup>th</sup>. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

#### STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a firstyear student)
- Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- Have an active Network account

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on BANNER Web Self Service on the date listed on your PIN Label. Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on BANNER Web Self Service after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

#### **REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS**

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on Banner Web Self Service through September 3rd. You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor. To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 161) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on Banner Web Self Service. Students should use Banner Web Self Service to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/ Add card to the Registrar's Office.

#### **REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION**

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on cumulative earned hours. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. Banner Web Self Service will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.

#### **DROP/ADD on Banner Web Self Service**

If you would like to drop and add courses for Fall Term 2007, you may do this through Banner Web Self Service until September 3rd. Please keep your Registration PIN #. You will need this to Drop/Add on Banner Web Self Service. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

#### **OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT**

All students must have a NETWORK account to use Banner Web Self Service from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

- Step #1: Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am 4:30 pm
- Step #2: Identify yourself as needing a Network account.

Step #3: Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

**PROBLEMS** -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

• Your PIN # doesn't work.

**Solution:** Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit Banner Web Self Service completely and login again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is <u>not the same</u> as your WSC (Web Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on Banner-Web Self Service.** Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.

• You lost your PIN #.

Solution: Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)

• You entered the wrong CRN #.

**Solution:** Banner Web Self Service allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using Banner Web Self Service". You may make changes on Banner Web Self Service through September 3rd.

• While using Banner Web Self Service it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".

Solution: Banner Web Self Service is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you leave the screen idle for more than 15 minutes. If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on Banner Web Self Service and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.

Banner Web Self Service shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.
 Solution: You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

# **ESSENTIAL INFORMATION**

#### ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Fall 2007 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

#### ACADEMIC PROBATION

First semester students must earn a minimum 1.8 cumulative grade point average to remain in good academic standing. In subsequent semesters, all students are required to maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average for all CSB/SJU coursework. Students who fall below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation for the next semester. During the probationary semester, students must raise their cumulative GPA to 2.0 and may take no courses for S/U grading unless the course if offered only on an S/U basis. Students whose cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standards at the end of a Final Probationary semester are subject to dismissal. For more information, see the Official Academic Catalog.

#### **ADDING A CLASS**


September 3rd is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after September 3rd. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

#### AUDITING A CLASS

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is calculated in the total tuition cost.

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The classroom assignments or campus locations of some classes listed in this Schedule may be changed before the term begins. #### CALENDAR CHANGES

The CSB/SJU calendar is subject to modification or interruption due to occurrences such as fire, flood, labor disputes, interruption of utility services, acts of God, civil disorder and war. In the event of such occurrences, the Institutions will attempt to accommodate their students. However, we do not guarantee that courses of instruction, extra curricular activities or other programs or events will be completed or rescheduled. Refunds will be made to eligible students in accordance with College or University policy.

Classes offered Periods II, III, and IV generally are requested by greater numbers of students than are other periods. You are less likely to be closed out of a class that is scheduled for Period I, or V, and may wish to consider this when you prepare your initial registration.

#### **CO-REQUISITES (COREQ)**

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester.

#### **CREDITS EARNED AT OTHER COLLEGES**

Students may complete out-of-residence courses and transfer them to Saint Benedict's and Saint John's. The college at which the coursework is completed must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency at the time of enrollment. Courses to be transferred must be similar to courses offered for credit at Saint Benedicts and Saint John's. Courses to be transferred must receive a minimum grade of C. Credits received for these courses are translated into semester credits according to the appropriate translation formula. Grades earned for transferred coursework are not calculated into the student's cumulative GPA. Before credit may be transferred, the Registrar's Office must receive an official transcript directly from the college at which the courses were completed.

With advance approval, students may apply these courses towards core and/or major requirements. Work taken to complete core requirements requires prior consultation with and approval of the Registrar's Office or the Academic Advising Office. Work taken to complete major requirements requires prior consultation and approval of the department chair. The department chair needs to sign an Academic Substitution/Exemption Form.

Students who intend to transfer coursework from a foreign college or university must consult the director of international studies before beginning such study. Consult the Center for International Education for further information.

#### **CREDIT OVERLOAD**

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is estimated at \$720.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The Banner Web Self Service registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credits.

#### **DROPPING A CLASS**

• Sept. 3rd Last day to drop a course using Banner Web Self Service. After this date students must fill out a drop/add card & obtain the instructor's signature to receive a permanent drop until September 21st.

Theology, Graduate

- Sept. 21st Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- Nov. 19th Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor may assign you an "F" at the end of the semester if appropriate.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure if appropriate.

Students who fail to properly drop or withdraw from a course may be subject to a failing grade if appropriate.

#### **EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION**

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/ substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/ substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

# Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for their final exam or request a multi section common exam time.

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and three-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the three-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

#### **GRADUATION INFORMATION**

- An Application for Degree must be submitted to the Registrar's Office prior to the award of a degree from Saint John's University or the College of Saint Benedict.
- An Application for Degree is sent spring semester to all CSB/SJU

Juniors.

- Submitted applications are then reviewed to ensure all Core and Major requirements are met prior to the award of a degree.
- Results of the Degree Audit are sent to students two times during their senior year: September and February.
- Degrees are issued May, August, and December.
- Upon successful completion of all degree requirements, diplomas and transcripts are sent to all graduates at their permanent address.
- An Application for Degree allows students the privilege to participate in the May commencement ceremony.
- Students may participate in the May commencement ceremony if they are within 8 credits of all degree requirements.
- Students who leave CSB/SJU may transfer up to eight semester credits from another accredited institution of higher education to complete their degree requirements.

#### **GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

- 124 credit hours. 45 of these must be taken at CSB/SJU
- 40 of the total credit hours must be upper division (300 level)
- 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- 2.0 minimum GPA major and/or supporting courses (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- Completed Core curriculum requirements
- Acceptance to a major (usually at the completion of sophomore year)
- Requirements for a major (half of the courses for a major must be completed at CSB/SJU)
- Candidates for a degree must normally be in residence for the two semesters preceding commencement

#### HOLDS

All financial, academic, student accounts & health center holds must be cleared before registering for classes.

#### **INCOMPLETE GRADE POLICY**

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the minimum grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/ GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the minimum grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation by March 15th will necessarily result in postponement of their graduation.

#### INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Fall term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A CRN #11190, or DNA 371-01A, CRN #11191 on Banner Web Self Service. Remember to indicate the number of credits. First-year students are <u>not</u> eligible for ILPs.

#### **INTERNSHIPS**

#### SUMMER 2007 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer of 2007 are required to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2007. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term not under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Summer 2007 Internship is Friday, May 5th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Internship Program Coordinator.

#### FALL 2007 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Fall of 2007 are <u>required</u> to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2007. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. When you register for fall classes, you may indicate your <u>intent</u> to register for a Fall 2007 internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, Call # 11192 through Banner Web Self Service. Enter the number of credits you expect to earn.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Fall 2007 Internship is Friday, May 5th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Internship Program Coordinator.

# MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at CSB or SJU. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

The Registrar's Office will use electronic mail as the most expeditious means of communicating with you. Make sure you are not blocking messages from the Registrar's Office in order to receive important notices regarding graduation, cancellation of courses, course schedule updates, etc.

#### **ON TRACK**

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through Banner Web Self Service for Faculty Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students MUST see their advisor to receive their Registration PIN # Label.

#### PERMISSION REQUIRED CLASSES

Before attempting to register for courses listed as "Permission of Instructor or Department", students must obtain written permission.

#### PREREQUISITES

Check the course listings section of this class schedule to find out if a class has a prerequisite. Make sure you have met all prerequisites before attempting to register for a course. If you have not taken the prerequisite, you must contact the department to seek written approval (signed drop/add card or e-mail directly from the instructor) to register for the course. If you fulfilled the prerequisite through a course taken at another college, prior to Fall 2005, please contact the Registrar's Office prior to registration.

#### **REPEATING A COURSE**

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you MUST notify the Registrar's Office.

#### STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9th (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

#### STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Center for International Education, QUAD 128 at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the Center for International Education or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$199.00 fee.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for a External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

#### S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**.

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED or GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If

neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

#### **TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE**

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before August 25th. The course will be added to your Fall 2007 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$720.00 (estimate), will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Stromme in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 161.

#### TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

#### UPDATES TO THE OFFICIAL CLASS SCHEDULE

Updates, including additional courses, cancellations, changes to existing courses, core approvals & other general changes to the Official Class Schedule will be published periodically on the Registrar's Official website. Notification of the publication of these updates will be sent via E-mail to all students and faculty.

#### VARIABLE CREDIT COURSES

If a course is listed with a range of credits (variable), you must enter the appropriate credit amount desired when you register for the course. The credit amount you are registered for may impact your status as a full-time student or your financial aid.

#### VERIFICATION OF ENROLLMENT

The Registrar's Office can provide verification of your enrollment at the College of Saint Benedict or Saint John's University, as well as other information, such as graduation date, majors, full-time status, etc. Students may also print out a verification of Enrollment for themselves via Banner Web.

# FALL 2007 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

#### ART ART 233D: Artists Books

#### Elaine Rutherford

Students will develop visual narratives using various 2-D media such as drawing, painting and printmaking processes. Students will investigate the bookform as a format as they work towards arriving at a marriage of form and content. The artist book is a unique format that encourages different attitudes between artist and viewer. It contains ideas in the familiarity and intimacy of the bookform while providing opportunities for development of sequential imagery and narratives. Students may combine text and image in their projects and will work towards finding the most appropriate bookform for their content. Visual presentations, demos, field trips, discussion and hands on studio practice are all components of this class.

#### **BIOLOGY**

#### **BIOL 373: Topic: Introduction to Bioinformatics**

Jennifer Galovich

#### COMMUNICATION

#### COMM 381: Rhetoric of Women Staff

This course is a critical and historical study of women's rhetoric. Students will analyze the rhetorical acts of women from diverse backgrounds and cultures and in diverse circumstances. PREREQUISITE: COMM 101 or permission of Instructor.

#### COMM 383: New Media: Communicating in an On-Line Era Kelly Berg

You know that time you sent off an instant message while talking on your cell phone to your roommate in the other room who was checking Facebook, surfing the Net and researching for a 10-page paper while you replied to the 20 emails that arrived in your inbox since that morning? ....yeah, I mean last night... The use of computer-mediated communication (CMC) in our society, locally and globally, has altered traditional boundaries that once defined communication, identity, and community. This course examines how on-line communication affects interpersonal, group and mass communication, social identities and the concept of community. Participants will investigate theoretical questions raised by on-line communication and explore various types of CMC. PREREQUISITE: COMM Major AND Junior or Senior Standing or Permission of the instructor.

#### COMM 383E: Layout and Design for Print Media Marty Sundvall

This course will explore the different computer technologies and software used in creating print media. Students will use programs such as Adobe In-Design, Adobe Photoshop, and basic web page design to bring their creative visions and course projects into printed reality. The course is geared for advertising, public relations, and news editorial students.

Completion of COMM 245 recommended. Reserved for COMM majors.

#### COMM 385: Special Topics: Language, Gender, and Culture Jeanne Cook

This course will examine the relationship between language, gender, and culture in a variety of contexts and cultures. The mutual influences of language and culture, and their role in the creation of gendered roles and identities will be explored.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 105 or 205 or 350 or 351 or permission of instructor.

### CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS CORE 390-01A: Justice in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Daniel Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice: everyone is in favor of it. Yet few issues are as controversial: justice has different meanings for different people. This course will examine in detail six rival understandings of justice prevalent in debates today. Students will read two novels and six philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale. Like all Senior Seminars, the goal of this course is to improve each student's ability to make good moral judgments.

#### CORE 390-02A: Current Issues in Society James Makepeace

This senior seminar will be a synthetic examination of four social issues which have recently come to the forefront of public and scholarly attention: terrorism, globalization, treatment of animals, and the environment.

Greatest attention will be given to the environmental issue. Each issue will be examined in a two-fold manner: objective assessment utilizing scientific evidence and theory and normative assessment utilizing tools of ethical theory. Aspects of these social issues to be considered will include: conditions of emergence, theories, applicable social movements and countermovements, cross-cultural aspects, and social change.

#### CORE 390-03A: Art and Morality: Is it Art if ...? James Hendershot

Through active involvement, course participants will be developing their own moral framework to deal with the issues addressed by the art world. We will have a chance to apply this framework to some real problems addressed by artists and their works. Students will be shown some techniques of analysis through a series discussing articles, visiting galleries, and tracking the involvement of the various media (television, newspaper, and publications). Seeing the art world from the view of moral critical analysis will be dealt with in groups of 3-4 students. The final project will involve going beyond the limits of the classroom to acquire the information necessary to complete the assignment. The process of gathering information is an important step so the participants will need to sharpen their innovative research skills.

Participants will raise questions ancient and modern: Does producing art to promote social issues end up destroying art? Are the values of art more important than social values? And on the lighter side, a sculpture placed in a pasture and used as a backscratcher, is it art? Participants will be required to read and discuss assigned materials in class and to develop a project independently or cooperatively (pairs). They will work on a schedule of viewing or experiencing the works which they wish to study, collect appropriate data, share it with the class, and discuss it in terms of the core theme, art and morality. The prime goal of the course is to be able to gain insight into what it means to make moral choices in art.

#### CORE 390-04A: "The Tao of Lagom: A Middle Way for the Middle Kingdom"

#### John Hasselberg

"The Tao of Lagom: A Middle Way for the Middle Kingdom".

China must address its growing income and wealth inequalities, its aging population, its rapidly deteriorating health and social safety supports and the other related consequences of its rapid development and of its thirty years of the one-child policy. Research into issues of ethical accountability, environmental sustainability, and corporate social responsibility (and its evolution into International Corporate Responsibility) clearly distinguish rival systems of organizing the relationships between the state, market and civil society spheres. The corporatist model of Sweden holds great promise for adoption by and adaptation to China's evolving socio-economic system.

The Swedish "Middle Way" arrangement emerged out of a situation similar to what is happening economically, socially+ and in the workplaces and families of China today. The system adopted in Sweden reflected an understanding of the need for each side to both give and take but not give or take too much. "Lagom" is the Swedish word for this phenomenon. Such a system is necessary for a morally healthy and sustainable civil society, responsible government and a market system that is both vibrant and accountable while respectful of human dignity and vulnerability. With occasional modifications, the "Middle Way" continues to serve the Swedish society well (itself arguably the first highly successful export-driven developing economy in the 20th century) to this day. It provides a model of economic, social, environmental and cultural sustainability that ought to be most attractive to China as it addresses the challenges embedded in its long term growth and development strategy.

#### CORE 390-05A: Social Issues and the Law

#### **Tim Robinson**

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law.

#### CORE 390-06A: War and the Memory of War in the Last Century Nick Hayes

The twentieth century opened with the promise of peace and prosperity. Our last century, however, witnessed a succession of wars from its beginning to its end. This course examines how twentieth century culture came to remember and interpret the century's wars from WWI, the Spanish Civil War, WWII, the Holocaust, the Vietnam Wars, to the Wars of the ex-Yugoslavia in the 1990's. Our focus falls not on the basic history of each of these tragic events, but on how the memory of the wars shaped our culture and values. Behind our inquires lie disturbing moral questions: How does a society reconcile itself to the knowledge of human atrocity and the legacy of total war on civilian populations? What are our moral and ethical responsibilities to remember the indeed such things happen on this earth?

# CORE 390-07A: Expanding Awareness and Consciousness (without drugs!)

#### Leigh Dillard

This course examines how our perception of reality, and ourselves, is determined by our belief-systems and how unaware we are of our own resulting biases and blind spots. The course explores different ways of thinking and knowing from a variety of perspectives (e.g., somatics, psychology, neuroscience, the arts) and includes an experiential component combining meditation, the Feldenkrais Method, creative movement and play as means for increasing self-awareness and altering belief-systems and perceptions of reality.

### CORE 390-08A: Reading for Life

#### Anthony Cunningham

Everyone loves a good story. Great stories can provide us with far more than mere recreation. Stories can provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we'll use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical questions, "How should on live?" and "What sort of person should I be?" We'll do so by attending to all the concrete, particular details of real-life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. The stated goal of the Senior Seminar Core requirement is to help students to develop the ability to make good moral judgments. # CORE 390-09A: Religion, Identity, and Conflict Noreen Herzfeld

In many recent conflicts the sides have been identified primarily through religious affiliation. But are these religious conflicts? And, if so, to what extent do the religious traditions involved affect both the cause and the means used in these conflicts? This course will address the role of religion and identity in recent conflicts in Northern Ireland, Bosnia, and the Middle East. Our focus will be on how religious tenets, values, and customs have shaped these conflicts. We will also continually ask how comprehensive the role of religion is in these conflicts. What is the role of religion in shaping personal or group identity and how do religious values affect our decisions in times of both war and peace? Does one's religious affiliation affect one's world view, even when one is no longer an active participant in that tradition? How can we reconcile religion with the acts committed in its name?

# CORE 390-10A: Reading for Life Anthony Cunningham

Everyone loves a good story. Great stories can provide us with far more than mere recreation. Stories can provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we'll use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical questions, "How should on live?" and "What sort of person should I be?" We'll do so by attending to all the concrete, particular details of real-life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. The stated goal of the Senior Seminar Core requirement is to help students to develop the ability to make good moral judgments. This is a life-long process but hopefully some diligent, careful, thoughtful attention on our part this semester can help us hone the ability to think about Socrates' questions. Our readings may include some of the following: *The Crucible* (Arthur

Miller), Nobody's Fool (Richard Russo), The Remains of the Day (Kazuo Ishiguro), Beloved (Toni Morrison), Crossing to Safety (Wallace Stegner), Their Eyes Were Watching God (Zora Neale Hurston) and Cold Mountain (Charles Frazier).

#### CORE 390-11A: Political Philosophy & Public Policy John Brandl

This course considers the rationales for public action. We will be concerned with understandings of governance and the roles of the principal public policy professions. The central questions that we will take up in the course are: What is the just society? How does the world of public affairs operate? In what ways can public policy be influenced? And, how should an individual – in particular, a public policy professional – carry oneself? These are vast subjects and, of course, much of importance on these subjects cannot be considered in a semester.

One often hears "that's all right in theory, but it doesn't work in practice." Yet any action intended to bring about an outcome rests on a theory (that if action x is taken, result y will occur). Theories, explicitly and implicitly, have immense influence. (The economist, John Maynard Keynes, wrote, "The ideas of economists and political philosophers, both when they are right and when they are wrong, are more powerful than is commonly understood. Indeed, the world is ruled by little else.") We will study some social science theories dealing with each of the four questions that motivate the course. The theories not only describe and predict behavior but also embody significant assumptions and derivations concerning what constitutes a just society.

#### ENGLISH ENGL 130: Reading Fiction Steven Thomas

Short stories and novels are attempts by both their authors and their readers to detect the hidden truths about our human nature, our social environment, and our political world. In this class, we will investigate how the genre of the short story and novel try to detect meaning in our world. We will begin the semester covering some of the basics: first, comparing the modern short story genre pioneered by Edgar Allen Poe and Washington Irving with other related genres, such as the parable, the tale, and the sketch; second, asking ourselves what is different about romantic, realistic, modernist, and postmodernist prose. Then we will explore other issues, a different question each week questions such as the difference between allegory and "hauntology," how fiction is able to appear real, and how fiction explores the "political unconscious." As we explore these questions, we will read classic nineteenth and twentieth-century works from an anthology of American short stories. In addition, because all fiction in a sense is meant to detect meaning in our world, we will spend part of the class focusing on the genre of detective fiction, starting with Poe and then reading twentieth-century detective novels by Raymond Chandler, Walter Mosley, and Barbara Neely.

The course will mostly involve discussion of the stories as a class and in small groups. There will be occasional lectures and quizzes, but mostly I expect you to participate actively in class discussion. Over the course of the semester, you will write three 3-4 page papers in which you compare and contrast stories of your choosing.

#### ENGL 133-02A: Reading Fiction & Poetry

Jessica Harkins Cross-listed with HONR 250B. See description under HONR 250B

#### ENGL 346: Reading U.S. Literature to1865

#### Steven Thomas

This course will introduce you to the literary history of the United States, beginning with the narratives of its founding (e.g., Christopher Columbus and John Smith) and ending with poetry about the Civil War (e.g., Walt Whitman, Herman Melville, and Emily Dickenson), a moment when it seemed America might be forever torn apart. Between these two incredibly violent historical moments, there is a long history of writing about the meaning of America. Some authors fantasized about the promise of America and projected their fantasies as well as their paranoid fears through their non-fictional and fictional narratives and poetry. Other authors responded by questioning and challenging such fantasies and paranoia. Hence, authors did not just write about issues such as the legitimacy (or illegitimacy) of conquest, the form of government, American identity, slavery, death, and love; they also debated these issues in their writing. In a sense, the literary history of the United States is an on-going conversation among different authors with different points of view and different ways of expressing their views.

Most of the reading will be selected from the *Heath Anthology of American Literature* (2006), volumes A and B. Each week, we will focus on a different question (such as the United States' relationship to the Native American, the issue of slavery, or the meaning of the word democracy) and explore how two or three or four pieces of literature addressed that question. You will be responsible for short response papers each week. In class, we will alternate among lecture, discussion, and independent work in small groups.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES ENVR 300: Environmental Geography Jean Lavigne

Case-study based and issue-oriented approach to understanding relationships between societies and their environments from a geographical perspective. Centered on exploring how humans around the world have modified their environments, and how societies respond to environmental change. Examining these processes includes exploring the current and historical roles played by social and cultural institutions, by political and economic systems, and by forces such as development and globalization.

### ENVR 300B: Sustainable Agriculture

#### Diane Veale Jones

How do we sustain the environment and provide food security to 9 billion people in 2042? This course examines the causes of food insecurity; investigates the environmental, human, and cultural costs of industrial agricultural food production; identifies the environmental consequences of producing protein foods, e.g. fish farming, meat, and soybeans; explores the potential and the risks of agricultural biotechnology to increase the global food supply. Students will examine the claims made by proponents of sustainable agriculture and assess its potential in balancing human food production with other environmental goods.

#### GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES

#### GWST 290A: Men's Studies Research

#### Gar Kellom

In addition to men's studies content and research methodology, students participate in three ongoing research projects in the SJU men's center: a small group social norms study of masculinity, a social norms spirituality project, and an international men's stories project. Additional projects may be developed. Class time arranged with those enrolled. May be repeated.

#### GWST 360: Spirituality & the Male Athlete

#### William Schipper Cross-listed with CORE 360F

This course will use the experience of the male athlete as the point of departure for a consideration of the interplay between male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality, and the ways in which these might be better integrated. This course will examine concepts found in long-established and contemporary studies of spirituality, male sexuality, and masculinity. Of special interest will be the ways in which male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality affect men's relationships with God, self and the other. Underlying this course is the assumption that the development of a personal spirituality will help one to be more attentive to the voice of God, more aware of the meaning of one's own existence, and better able to form communities founded on respect for individual persons.

#### **HISTORY**

#### HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium: The French Revolution Elisabeth Wengler

The ideas and events of the French Revolution continue to be hotly debated more than 200 years later. Was it a revolution of the bourgeoisie? What role did books and ideas play? Why did the revolution devolve into the Reign of Terror? Was the Revolution a success or a failure? Was women's position better or worse as a result? We will analyze these questions by using sources that include eye witness accounts of events, newspaper articles written from various political perspectives, philosophical texts, revolutionary songs, and artwork from the period.

Many college courses adopt, intentionally or not, a Socratic approach: the instructor guides students through discussion of difficult texts by posing questions. This class is different. Here students will play an elaborate game set in the past, lasting approximately 10 class sessions. You will attempt to recapture the experience of the French revolutionaries by assuming, researching, and reenacting the roles of key players and trying to achieve your characters' victory objectives in a recreation of the French National Assembly of 1791-2. After completing the game, you will continue to follow your characters through the rest of the revolution (from the Terror through the Napoleonic era) through an analysis of primary and secondary sources. The course culminates with an exhibit that educates the public about the variety of opinions and experiences of the French Revolution.

#### HIST 300G: Gandhi, Non-Violence and Islamic Movements in India Brendan Larocque

This course will explore the life and times of one of the modern world's greatest leaders, Mohandas K. Gandhi. We will examine how Gandhi forged a long-term movement, centered on the practices of non-violence and civil disobedience, which helped bring down the mightiest empire in the world. The period of Gandhi's struggle was also a time when numerous other powerful nationalist currents, including many based on Islamic ideas and symbols, emerged in the Indian subcontinent. We will therefore look at the historical

forces and people which comprised these socio-political movements, in an effort to understand the complex and intriguing ways in which Gandhi's movement intersected, combined, and conflicted with other nationalist trends. The lives of a number of Gandhi's contemporaries will be studied, as will topics including the role of political violence and non-violence, conceptions of masculinity and femininity, caste, class, and race.

#### HIST 300H: From Books to Bytes

#### Theresa Vann

Books have served as a primary repository of human knowledge since their inception. Over the millennia, book technology has evolved from ancient papyrus scrolls to modern digital formats, proving the adaptability and longevity of the book form.

Using the collections and resources of the Hill Museum & Manuscript Library, this introductory course will examine the book both as an artifact and as an agent of cultural change. Students will learn the technology of the book; the innovations introduced by the book; and the book's impact on human culture on a global basis.

The goal of this course will be to provide an introductory vocabulary and a structure for students who wish to explore the history of books and printing from the ancient to modern world. The course will be organized around the following topics: the technology of the book; the book in ancient society, focusing on the development of writing and the alphabet; the classical book; the people of the book; the medieval book; printing; and the digital book.

# HIST 300J: Making History Matter: Introduction to Public History Julie Davis

What, exactly, is public history? What do public historians do? And how do we make history that matters in public life? This course will address these questions as we learn about the definitions, theory, methods, and practice of public history. We also will explore various career possibilities and consider what it might be like to work as a public historian.

Students will read, analyze, discuss, and write responses to course readings. Course work also requires students to co-lead class discussion and participate in a group project that engages them in the process of making history.

### HIST 300K: Public Culture in Modern India

#### Brendan Larocque

In this course we will examine some of the major forms of culture, politics, and religion as well as the ways in which the acquisition and transmission of knowledge developed and was transformed in the modern Indian subcontinent. We will initially focus on some the key features of political, social, and religious thought that existed prior to the period of British rule. We will then move on to study how colonial rule affected Indian thought and society, concentrating on ideas concerning just governance, the public sphere, social hierarchies, militarism, the respective roles of women and men in society, science and technology, and the meanings of religion and secularism. British perspectives and Indian views will both be examined in detail, and while intellectual history will be one of our topics of research, we will at all times give close attention to the social, economic, and political forces which shaped thought and culture in modern South Asia. In addition to reading scholarly books and articles, our course material will include music, poetry, literature, journalism, television broadcasts, popular "Bollywood" cinema and art films.

# HIST 395: Historiography and Methods: History One Person at a Time *Martha Tomhave Blauvelt*

How can you understand the mind and feelings of a person living in a radically different time? What can we say we "know" about the individual in history? How much of a person is captured in a diary, letters or autobiography? How can we understand individuals through the material artifacts of their lives? History too often generalizes about groups; this course takes the opposite tack and looks at how you can see both unique personality and whole cultures in the individual. Our purpose is to understand how to write history well, to appreciate and analyze individual motivation, and to make sense of the past. In short, it explores the art of biography.

We will look at sources on some very obscure people (using, for example, interviews with ex-slaves and letters home written by a pioneer woman) and also sources on some major political figures, such as Malcolm X and Abraham Lincoln. In the process, we will 1) explore the different ways historians can get under the skin of individuals in the past through exploring the uses and limits of letters, diaries, memories, autobiographies and interviews; 2) analyze one life in depth, the life of Malcolm X, to understand the different selves presented in his autobiography, speeches and reactions of his contemporaries; and 3) compare the biographies of an individual which students will choose, so that they can see how historians come to vastly different conclusions about the same person. Although most of the sources we examine will be printed, students will also have the opportunity to read handwritten manuscripts from the 1800s and examine past material culture.

This is a small seminar in which discussion will be the heart of the class. Students will read a variety of texts and will write several short papers and one extended essay comparing different books on the same individual.

#### HONORS HONR 220A: Introduction to Economics Joseph Friedrich

Why are some countries rich and others poor? Why are some individuals rich and others poor? Is international trade harmful to the environment or helpful? What causes unemployment? Who the heck is Ben Bernanke and why should you care? Should you stay in business even if you are losing money? How much is a human life worth? This course will address these and many other issues through the lens of economic analysis. We will cover all of the material of an introductory economics and push beyond this through additional readings and quantitative sources. Bring your curiosity! (This course will be accepted as a substitute for ECON 111 – Introduction to Economics within the Economics curriculum and as an SSL.)

### HONR 230A: Playwriting

Kaarin Johnston

The theory and practice of writing plays for theater performance. Writing exercises and reading assignments will culminate in the writing of an original one-act play.

PREREQUISITE: Successful completion of First-Year Symposium.

#### HONR 240A: The Development of the Christian Tradition Michael Patella

An introductory study of Sacred Scripture including an investigation of the ideas, documents, and developments within the Christian tradition.

### HONR 250B: Reading Fiction & Poetry

#### Jessica Harkins

#### Cross-listed with ENGL 133

The word "allegory" derives from the Greek terms "allos", *other* and "agoria", *speaking.* Most works of literature employ a kind of "other-speaking", such as metaphor or allegory, in order to create meaning. In this course students will read selected works of fiction and poetry with an eye to figurative language and meaning. Without eliminating the surface meaning, we will examine the ways in which literature additionally means and how we understand it. Students can expect to read medieval to contemporary texts, and to become familiar with different allegorical modes. Authors include Geoffrey Chaucer, Marie de France, Nathaniel Hawthorne, and Italo Calvino.

### HONR 250D: Ethical Thinking in Global Perspectives

#### Frederick de Sam Lazaro

This course examines the ethical issues and dilemmas of contemporary global issues. Its topics include the HIV/AIDS pandemic, religious and ethnic conflict, immigration, economic development, and the global labor force. Special emphasis falls upon the representation of these issues in the media.

#### HONR 250G: The 20<sup>th</sup> Century American Experience Derek Larson

This course explores the history of the United States in the twentieth century, paying particular attention to events that have helped shape various communities within the nation and to the ongoing struggle to define just what "American" means. Topics covered will include changes in social, political, and economic life; the environment; race and gender relations; the growth of cities and industry; the American role in global conflicts; the progress of technology; the impacts of immigration and internal migration; and the role of popular culture in American society. We will approach the study of history with three major goals in mind: to develop knowledge of the basic "facts" of American history; to learn to think, speak, and write analytically about the past; and to better understand ourselves and the various communities to which we belond.

#### HONR 310: Great Books/Ideas

#### Dennis Beach

This is a year-long discussion-based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Ovid, Sophocles, Tolstoy, Dostoevsky, Dickens, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, García Márquez, Camus, Eliot, Faulkner, Nietzsche, Homer, Kafka, Flaubert, Stendhal, Dinesen, O'Connor, Plato, Saramago, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to junior and senior honors students who will complete the entire year. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of works during the summer.

# HONR 340E: The Jewish Encounter with Jesus and Christianity Barry Cytron

#### Cross-listed with HONR 350E

An exploration of the theological and historical encounters between Judaism and Christianity, from the emergence of both Christianity and Judaism out of biblical religion, the disagreements and distancing one from the other over the centuries, but culminating in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century in efforts at rapprochement and mutual acceptance.

#### HONR 350E: The Jewish Encounter with Jesus and Christianity Barry Cytron

Cross-listed with HONR 340E. See description under HONR 340E

#### HONR 350G: James Joyce Scott Richardson

Arguably the greatest and most influential writer of this century, James Joyce is not simply an "important" author to know about, someone to feel guilty for not having read—his works are actually well worth reading for their own sake. Late in life he made the justifiable claim that he could do anything he wanted with the English language, and in reading three major works we will experience his mastery of the language and his devilish manipulation of narrative forms. We start with Dubliners and A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man, which present a sensitive portrayal of life in Dublin that is both scathing and loving. We will spend the last two thirds of the semester on the brilliant, outrageous, encyclopedic, and hilarious Ulysses, which stretches the novel beyond its breaking point and incorporates virtually all of Western Civilization in one day in the life of a few ordinary people.

# HONR 350H: Spiritual Traditions of Islam: The Religion & Politics of Islam

#### Noreen Herzfeld

Islam is in the news—bombings in London and Madrid, 9/11, the furor over the Jyllands Posten cartoons, the rise of Herzbollah in Lebanon, a Sunni/ Shitte civil war in Iraq. Islam is also the fastest growing religion in America. Although we will begin with a historic overview and examination of the basic beliefs of Islam, our focus will be on how Muslims have encountered God (Allah), how this encounter informs their daily lives, and how the traditions of Islam are influencing and informing current political and cultural events around the globe.

Another faith tradition also provides a new window through which to examine one's own faith, and a new appreciation for the commonality of the human condition. A study of Islam raises broader questions of faith versus reason, the role and position of women, the rights of religious and cultural minorities, freedom of speech vs. religious respect, multiculturalism vs. assimilation.

#### HONR 390: Senior Seminar: Justice in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Daniel Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice: everyone is in favor of it. Yet few issues are as controversial: justice has widely divergent meanings for different people. This course will examine in detail five rival understandings of justice prevalent in debates today. Students will read two novels, and five philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale. Like all Senior Seminars, the goal of this course is to improve each student's ability to make good moral judgments.

#### <u>MANAGEMENT</u>

#### MGMT 305A: Personal Finance Mark Asuzu

The course introduces the student to the concepts, tools, and applications of personal finance and investments. It shows the student how to take the first step towards understanding the process of financial planning and the logic that drives it. Special attention will be paid to cash or liquid asset management, the use of open credit, consumer loans, insurance, investment management, automobile and housing purchase and financing. <u>PREREQUISITE</u>: None. Open to all majors.

#### MGMT 305C: Marketing & Technology Law Jean Didier

This course explores the legal aspects of developing, selling and promoting a product or service. It would be particularly useful to students planning a career in marketing, management, communication, technological innovation or entrepreneurship. Topics in the course include intellectual property, deceptive advertising, commercial speech, privacy, product defect claims, antitrust, trade regulation, consumer protection and contracts as they relate to marketing and technological innovation.

#### MATHEMATICS

#### MATH 340: Topic: Introduction to Bioinformatics Jennifer Galovich

Cross-listed with BIOL 373

"Bioinformatics" is the name given to the study of certain problems in biology as questions about the nature and interpretation of information. Bioinformatics is all about "making sense of molecular messages". In just a few decades, mathematicians, biologists and computer scientists working together have assembled huge data banks of DNA sequences and very powerful computer programs for analyzing them. The goals of this course will include understanding the nature of these molecular messages – what kinds of questions can this data answer? We will also study some of the computer algorithms that have been devised for answering these questions. In so doing, we will both practice using the algorithms and work on understanding the mathematical ideas that justify their use.

The course begins with comparison of DNA sequences motivated by questions in phylogenetics. We will focus on DNA sequences rather than the more complicated protein sequences which DNA encodes, however we will look at some bioinformatics techniques that are helpful in answering questions about protein structure and function. We will also study probabilistic methods and machine learning, which provide various techniques for pattern recognition. For example, we will look at some recent research which uses machine learning techniques to try to predict intrinsically disordered proteins – proteins which do not fold in a predictable way. Similar methods have also been used to try to predict and understand various protein folding diseases such as variant Creuzfeld-Jacob disease (so-called "mad cow" disease in humans), type II diabetes and Alzheimer's disease.

If time permits, we will also look at models of RNA secondary structure and approaches to the analysis of DNA microarray data.

<u>PREREQUISITE</u>: For Math major credit – Math 239; For Bio major credit, Bio 121, 221, and either Math 119 or Math 123,. Or permission of instructor.

#### MILITARY SCIENCE MILS 210: American History I: 1609-1918 James Fischer

The course has been designed to give Army ROTC cadets a basic understanding of military operations in America from colonial times through World War I. Upon completion of this course, students will be able to employ America military history as a tool for studying military professionalism and for applying critical-thinking and decision making skills to military problems while pursuing their education as officers in the United States Army. The course will focus on weapons technology, lessons learned from combat operations, and conceptual improvements made with regard to the way the United States military fights. The course is open to all students with priority going to those enrolled as cadets in the ROTC program.

#### MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES FREN 355: Prête-moi ta plume! (Got a pen, anyone?) Vera Theisen

Is the widespread use of electronic messages placing the epistolary genre on the endangered list? This course will acquaint students with the almostforgotten art of reading and writing letters in French and help bring the skill back to life! We will read many kinds of letters, from lovers in the Middle Ages, mothers to their daughters and famous writers to their friends, all expressing a wide range of emotions. Students will write their own letters using both conventional and creative formulas and will find a francophone pen pal somewhere in the world with whom to engage in correspondence.

#### **SPANISH**

#### SPAN 355: Issues of Testimonio Gladys White

Testimonial literature, testimonial narratives, testimonio, voice of the voiceless, women testimonies. This Course examines the much debated genre of Testimonio from Latin America, Central America and the Caribbean. The course includes early testimonies such as cronicas of the Conquista, slave narratives in the Caribbean, dictatorships and "guerras sucias' of the 20th and XXI centuries. We will explore theories, critiques and political importance of these testimonies that redefine the traditional notion of testimony.

#### **NUTRITION**

#### NUTR 230: Cultural Foods

Jayne Byrne

The meaning and significance of food in different cultures will be identified by exploring the way that climate, ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status and religion influence food choices and preferences. A special focus will be placed on how food impacts health and nutritional status of various populations. The experience of tasting foods and practicing food preparation techniques from a variety of traditions will be part of the class.

#### PHILOSOPHY

#### PHIL 339: Chinese Philosophy Charles Wright

In introduction to the Chinese Philosophical tradition through a close reading of selected foundational texts, including but not limited to the LaoTzu (the Tao Te Ching), the ChuangTzu, the Analects of Confucius, the Mencius, the important Buddhist work known as the Platform Sutra of the Sixth Patriarch and selections from the writings Chu His, the final synthesizer and organizer of the Neo-Confucian movement. PHIL 272: Introduction to Asian Philosophy is recommended, but not required, as a prerequisite.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

#### PHED 277: Exercise Techniques II

Don Fischer

In this course, students will apply concepts presented in PHED 257 & 258 and learn to instruct and demonstrate proper resistance training and plyometric techniques. Students enrolled in this course will actively participate in resistance and plyometric exercise and will be required to demonstrate competency in instructing specified techniques. <u>PREREQUISITE</u>: PHED 257 and 258

PSYCHOLOGY

#### PSYC 309A: Psychology of Language Robert Kachelski

This course provides an opportunity to learn about language and how it is processed and understood. Topics will include speech perception, word and sentence processing, reading, discourse, sign language, language development and language disorders. Psychological and neuropsychological research and theories will be examined.

#### PSYC 309B: Psychology & Law

#### Aubrey Immelman

The general aim of this course is to learn about psychological knowledge as it applies to law. The course offers an overview of contemporary psychological theories, research, principles, concepts, and practices pertinent to the legal system. Although students will gain an appreciation for the culture and traditions of law, this is *not* a law course. The emphasis is on human behavior and mental processes and the interaction of psychology with the legal and criminal justice systems.

Specific topics include psychological assessment, testing, and the law; psychology and the courts; mental health law (competencies, criminal responsibility, civil commitment; the psychology of the jury (procedural considerations and jury decision making; the psychology of evidence (eyewitness testimony, the polygraph, hypnosis, facial composites, profiling, pretrial publicity); correctional psychology; family law; juvenile delinquency and justice; criminal behavior; and the psychology of law enforcement.

PREREQUISITE: PSYC 111 and either PSYC 350 or 381

#### PSYC 393-01A: Freud and Psychoanalysis Michael Livingston

Sigmund Freud has cast a spell over the last 100 years of western civilization. Everywhere his influence is felt, yet few now study his original works. These works are as valuable now, and as thought provoking, as they were when they were published at the beginning of the last century. In this seminar we will read a selection of Freud's works, including his writings on dreams, sexuality, therapy, and religion, as well as a current biography and essays dealing with his life and work and its continued relevance for the 21st century. The class is structured like a real seminar: Grading will be based on discussion, class presentations, and papers (there are no tests and no homework assignments other than preparation for class discussion).

# PSYC 393-02A: Personality Assessment in Criminal & Political Psychology

#### Aubrey Immelman

Psychology Seminar involves detailed consideration of a special topic and requires seminar participants to prepare and present a major paper. This section is designed to help senior psychology majors integrate diverse psychological concepts, principles, theories, and methods to the applied areas of criminal investigation and political psychology.

The course will draw from several cognate areas of psychology, including the biological foundations of personality; perception and cognition; motivation and emotion; human development; personality psychology; psychopathology; and social psychology.

Students will develop a personality profile of a world leader or presidential candidate, or offender and victim profiles in an unsolved criminal case. *PREREQUISITE*: Senior standing and 20 credits in psychology

#### STUDY ABROAD COURSE DESCRIPTIONS GENERAL TO VARIOUS PROGRAMS: MGMT 389: Study Abroad Experiential Learning

This course is designed for students participating in Study Abroad. Reading relevant to understanding business in the international environment will be assigned. Students will write a series of essays integrating their knowledge of theory with their personal observations and reactions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the impact of culture on business. The course will be taught by a professor at CSB/SJU using distance learning to maintain contact with students located in a variety of countries.

#### THEOLOGY THEO 111: The Biblical Tradition Various

This course offers an introduction to the discipline of Christian theology, giving primary attention to texts from the Bible (including selections from the Pentateuch, the Prophets, the Gospels, and the Pauline Letters), emphasizing prominent biblical themes (including creation, covenant, and reign of God), and considering some post-biblical developments in the tradition.

#### THEO 329A: Women's Theological Perspectives

#### Anna Mercedes

#### Cross-listed with CORE 329A

This course introduces students to the critiques and alternative reconstructions that feminist/womanist/mujerista theologians present with respect to traditional Christian understandings of scripture, God, human personhood (including the body and sexuality), and the church using scriptural, historical, cultural, social, and spiritual approaches.

# THEO 339A: Discernment and Christian Decision Making Marian Diaz

#### Cross-listed with CORE 339A

This course introduces participants to the teachings on discernment found within the Christian tradition. The topic of discernment will be considered both as a way of life and as a specific process for vocational decision-making. Participants will apply discernment principles in differing contexts through course assignments and class activities such as discussion of case studies and reflection on personal experiences.

#### THEO 349A: Family, Church, and Society Kari-Shane Zimmerman

#### Cross-listed with CORE 349A

Drawing on historical, sociological, and religious sources, this course introduces students to a range of perspectives concerning the intersection of fam-

duces students to a range of perspectives concerning the intersection of family, church and society, focusing on issues such as cohabitation, marriage, divorce, homosexuality, and gender roles.

#### THEO 395: Advanced Seminar in Theology: Faith After Auschwitz: Jewish & Christian Perspectives

#### Barry Cytron

Why do bad things happen to good people? From earliest days, the Jewish and Christian traditions have wrestled with the questions of Divine justice, human suffering, and the struggle for human goodness in a world tainted by human evil. The events of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, especially genocide, have served to sharpen these questions for many.

We begin by reading from Biblical and other early responses to these questions, and then turn to modern perspectives, focusing on the ways modern Jewish thought and Christian theology are coming to terms with the catastrophe of the Holocaust and genocide. We conclude by examining the moral lessons that these events thrust on us.

#### SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

#### MONS 468-01A: Medieval Monastic Spirituality-WEB Greg Peters

#### Cross-listed with SPIR 468-01A

Course will meet two weekends (September 14-16 and November 9-11) at Saint Andrew's Abbey, Valyermo, CA

The abundance of monasteries and their inhabitants during the Middle Ages still inspires awe and adoration as do many of the literary texts produced from these schools of the Lord's service. This course will examine important texts representative of the medieval monastic tradition with selections from Benedictines (Anselm of Canterbury and Hildegard of Bingen), Cistercians (Aelred of Rievaulx and Bernard of Clairvaux), Carthusians (Guigo II), Byzantine monastic authors (Peter of Damascus and Gregory Palamas) and others (Julian of Norwich, Walter Hilton and Richard Rolle). These texts will be examined for their rich spiritual theology and ongoing influence in today's church.

#### SPIR 468-01A: Medieval Monastic Spirituality-WEB Greg Peters

Cross-listed MONS 468-01A—See Description above

# CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

#### The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

#### 1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 8 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—four events per semester.

#### 2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses) -- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 &101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. <u>Cannot be repeated for credit</u>. Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

#### 3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

NS	(2 courses)	Must be from different departments (unless NATS, COLG, HONR or ENVR).
SSL	(1 course)	Must be 100 level.
SSU	(1 course)	Must have completed the SSL course first.

Courses may carry 1 or more flags, in addition to meeting Core disciplinary or Major requirements. Flagged courses are specific to the instructor and term. Flagged courses are listed in the Class Schedule and updated lists are posted at the Office of the Registrar.

# **CSB/SJU Summer 2007** Undergraduate Course Offerings

### SUMMER 2007 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer 2007 are required to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2007. All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term not under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar's Office receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. Most classes are scheduled to meet on either odd days (1-3-5) of the cycle, or on even days (2-4-6). As a result, your classes generally meet every other day. Most likely, you will be registered for four 4-credit classes. Classes (with occasional exceptions--such as Art studios) generally meet for 70 minutes. A 30 minute break between the ending and beginning of periods allows you to easily schedule back-to-back classes, even on both campuses!
