

## **REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS**

## OCTOBER 29 - NOVEMBER 12, 2007 FOR SPRING 2008

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Spring must complete advance registration by November 12<sup>th</sup>. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

### STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- ... Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- ... Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- ... Been accepted by a department (unless they are a first– year student, or first semester sophomore)
- ... Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- ... Have an active Network account
- ... Applied for graduation if they are classified as a Senior or 4th year

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on BANNER Web Self Service on the date listed on your PIN Label. Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on BANNER Web Self Service after they have cleared all registration holds

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

### **REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS**

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on BANNER Web Self Service through January 17th. You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor. To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 163) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of cancelled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on BANNER Web Self Service. Students should use BANNER Web Self Service to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/ Add card to the Registrar's Office.

### REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on cumulative earned hours. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. Banner Web Self Service will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.

#### **DROP/ADD on Banner Web Self Service**

If you would like to drop and add courses for Spring Term 2008, you may do this through BANNER Web Self Service until January 17th. Please keep your Registration PIN #. You will need this to Drop/Add on Web Self Service. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

### **OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT**

All students must have a NETWORK account to use Web Self Service from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

Step #1: Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm

Step #2: Identify yourself as needing a Network account.

Step #3: Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

#### ... Your PIN # doesn't work.

**Solution:** Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit Web Self Service completely and login again. **YOUR PIN#** for registration is <u>not the same</u> as your WSC (Web Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on Web Self Service. Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.

#### ... You lost your PIN #.

**Solution:** Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)

### ... You entered the wrong CRN #.

**Solution:** Web Self Service allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using Web Self Service". You may make changes on Web Self Service through January 17th.

### ... While using Web Self Service it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".

**Solution:** Web Self Service is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you leave the screen idle for more than 15 minutes. If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on Web Self Service and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.

### ... Web Self Service shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.

**Solution:** You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

### **ESSENTIAL INFORMATION**

### **ACADEMIC ADVISING**

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Spring 2008 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

### **ACADEMIC PROBATION**

First semester students must earn a minimum 1.8 cumulative grade point average to remain in good academic standing. In subsequent semesters, all students are required to maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average for all CSB/SJU coursework. Students who fall below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation for the next semester. During the probationary semester, students must raise their cumulative GPA to 2.0 and may take no courses for S/U grading unless the course if offered only on an S/U basis. Students whose cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standards at the end of a Final Probationary semester are subject to dismissal. For more information, see the Official Academic Catalog.


### **ADDING A CLASS**

Thursday, January 17th is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after January 17th. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

BANNER Web Self Service will be available to add courses through the 4<sup>th</sup> day of the semester. After the 4<sup>th</sup> day of the semester, any additions, with the instructor's consent, must be made by filling out a drop/add card and bringing it to the Registrar's Office.

### **AUDITING A CLASS**

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.



### **CALENDAR CHANGES**

The CSB/SJU calendar is subject to modification or interruption due to occurrences such as fire, flood, labor disputes, interruption of utility services, acts of God, civil disorder and war. In the event of such occurrences, the Institutions will attempt to accommodate their students. However, we do not guarantee that courses of instruction, extra curricular activities or other programs or events will be completed or rescheduled. Refunds will be made to eligible students in accordance with College or University policy.

Classes offered Periods II, III, and IV generally are requested by greater numbers of students than are other periods. You are less likely to be closed out of a class that is scheduled for Period I, or V, and may wish to consider this when you prepare your initial registration.

### **CO-REQUISITES (COREQ)**

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester.

### **CREDITS EARNED AT OTHER COLLEGES**

Students may complete out-of-residence courses and transfer them to the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University. The college at which the coursework is completed must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency at the time of enrollment. Courses to be transferred must be similar to courses offered for credit at the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University. Courses to be transferred must receive a minimum grade of C. Credits received for these courses are translated into semester credits according to the appropriate translation formula. Grades earned for transferred coursework are not calculated into the student's cumulative GPA. Before credit may be transferred, the Registrar's Office must receive an official transcript directly from the college at which the courses were completed.

With advance approval, students may apply these courses towards the core or common curriculum and/or major requirements. Work taken to complete core or common curriculum requirements requires prior consultation with and approval of the Registrar's Office or the Academic Advising Office. Work taken to complete major requirements requires prior consultation and approval of the department chair. The department chair needs to sign an Academic Exemption Form.

Students who intend to transfer coursework from a foreign college or university must consult the director of international studies before beginning such study. Consult the Center for International Education for further information.

### **CREDIT OVERLOAD**

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is billed at \$723.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. BANNER Web Self Service registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credits.

### **DROPPING A CLASS**

- ... Jan. 17h Last day to add/drop a course using BANNER Web Self Service. After this date students must fill out a drop/add card & obtain the instructor's signature to receive a permanent drop until February 6th .
- ... Feb. 6th Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- ... Apr. 10th Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure if appropriate.

Students who fail to properly drop or withdraw from a course may be subject to a failing grade if appropriate.

### **EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION**

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/ substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/ substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

## Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for their final exam

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and three-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the three-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam

One period has been reserved on each of the three test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this spring. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

### **GRADUATION INFORMATION**

- ... An Application for Degree must be submitted to the Registrar's Office prior to the award of a degree from Saint John's University or the College of Saint Benedict.
- ... An Application for Degree is sent spring semester to all CSB/SJU
- ... Submitted applications are then reviewed to ensure all Core or Common Curriculum and Major requirements are met prior to the award of a degree.
- ... Results of the Degree Audit are sent to students two times during their senior year: September and March.
- ... Degrees are issued May, August, and December.

- ... Upon successful completion of all degree requirements, diplomas and transcripts are sent to all graduates at their permanent address
- ... An Application for Degree allows students the privilege to participate in the May commencement ceremony.
- ... Students may participate in the May commencement ceremony if they are within 8 credits of all degree requirements.
- ... Students who leave CSB/SJU may transfer up to eight semester credits from another accredited institution of higher education to complete their degree requirements.

### **GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

- ... 124 credit hours. 45 of these must be taken at CSB/SJU
- ... 40 of the total credit hours must be upper division (300 level)
- ... 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- ... 2.0 minimum GPA major and/or supporting courses (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- ... Completed Core or Common Curriculum requirements
- ... Acceptance to a major (usually at the completion of sophomore year)
- ... Requirements for a major or minor (half of the courses for a major or minor must be completed at CSB/SJU)

#### HOLDS

All financial, academic, student accounts & health center holds must be cleared before registering for classes.

### **INCOMPLETE GRADE POLICY**

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the minimum grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the provisional grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the Assistant Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation) by March 13th may result in post-ponement of their graduation.

### **INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS**

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Spring term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A CRN #12797, or DNA 371-01A, CRN #13616 on Banner Web Self Service. Remember to indicate the number of credits. First-year students are not eligible for ILPs.

### OFFICIAL COMMUNICATIONS TO STUDENTS BY E-MAIL

The Registrar's Office will use electronic mail as the most expeditious means of communicating with you. Make sure you are not blocking messages from the Registrar's Office in order to receive important notices regarding graduation, cancellation of courses, course schedule updates, etc.

#### **ON TRACK**

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through BANNER Web Self Service for Faculty. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students MUST see their advisor to receive their Registration PIN # Label.

#### PERMISSION REQUIRED CLASSES

Before attempting to register for courses listed as "Permission of Instructor or Department", students must obtain written permission.

#### **PREREQUISITES**

Check the course listings section of this class schedule to find out if a class has a prerequisite. Make sure you have met all prerequisites before attempting to register for a course. If you have not taken the prerequisite, you must contact the department to seek written approval (signed drop/add card or e-mail directly from the instructor) to register for the course. If you fulfilled the prerequisite through a course taken at another college prior to Fall 2005, please contact the Registrar's Office prior to registration.

### **REPEATING A COURSE**

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you MUST notify the Registrar's Office.

### STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their  $9^{\text{th}}$  (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

### STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Center for International Education. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the International Education Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$199 fee.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for a External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

### S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE. Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either A-F grading only or S-U grading only. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the

instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

### TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before January 2<sup>nd</sup>. The course will be added to your Spring 2008 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$723.00, will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Stromme in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 163.

### TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 2-3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

### **UPDATES TO THE OFFICIAL CLASS SCHEDULE**

Updates, including additional courses, cancellations, changes to existing courses, core and common curriculum approvals & other general changes to the Official Class Schedule will be published periodically on the Registrar's Official website. ### **VARIABLE CREDIT COURSES**

If a course is listed with a range of credits (variable), you must enter the appropriate credit amount desired when you register for the course. The credit amount you are registered for may impact your status as a full-time student or your financial aid.

## **COURSE DESCRIPTIONS**

## **SPRING 2008**

#### **BIOLOGY**

## **BIOL 341: Natural History of Tropical Carbonate Ecosystems** *Larry Davis*

Cross-listed with ENVR 341 & GEOL 341

This course provides students with an introduction to the unique ecology and geology of tropical marine carbonate ecosystems, with an emphasis on those of the Bahamas. Topics covered include the evolution of reefs and reef-building organisms, geological history of the Bahamas, and the natural history of modern reef, mangal, and seagrass ecosystems. Environmental challenges facing these ecosystems will also be considered. The course requires participation in a field trip to San Salvador, Bahamas. As part of the field trip, students will participate in a research project that involves monitoring of the ecological status of a tropical carbonate ecosystem. Students must have a valid US passport by the time spring break arrives.

PREREQUISITE: BIOL 115 and 116 or ENVR 175 and 275 or GEOL

### **COMMUNICATION**

### COMM 383D: A Survey of Documentary Film

Lu Lippold

Truth is Stranger than Fiction. What is the difference between fiction films and non-fiction films? Do documentaries represent "reality"? What choices do documentarists make when they approach a topic? What narrative and stylistic strategies do they use? What social, cultural, and political functions have documentaries served over time? Through the examination of different types of documentary films, this course will introduce students to the history and the theory of documentary film practice. We'll watch some of the most widely acclaimed documentaries of all time, as well as some that are obscure and eccentric. Note: this is not a course in film production. Your work will involve analysis of different documentaries as opposed to actual film production.

## **COMM 383E: Layout & Design for Print Media** *Marty Sundvall*

This course will explore the different computer technologies and software used in creating print media. Students will use programs such as Adobe In-Design, Adobe Photoshop, and basic web page design to bring their creative visions and course projects into printed reality. The course is geared for advertising, public relations and news editorial students. Completion of COMM 245 recommended

## **COMM 385A:** Love, Sex, Commitment, and Communication *Karyl Daughters*

This course will explore the communication of love, sexuality, and commitment in close interpersonal relationships. To do this, we will discuss readings from psychological, cultural, and evolutionary perspectives that will address these functions of communication and help us understand why and how we love. Throughout this process students will discover current research findings as well as become familiar with how research is conducted. Ultimately, students will propose and conduct research projects that will contribute to our understanding of love and communication. Evaluation will be based on exams, a research paper, a group research project, and class participation.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 105 or 205 or permission of Instructor.

### COMM 385B: Health Communication

Jennifer Kramer

This course is designed to provide a broad introduction to the study and application of communication theories, principles, and practices in health contexts. In the course you will examine how narratives, media, interpersonal communication, group communication, intercultural communication, gender communication, organizational communication, and promotional campaigns function within health contexts. The relevance of communication to health will be examined as a means for improving communication in the health care setting, improving personal health, and influencing public health.

### CORE 390-01A: Poverty, Hunger & Moral Issues

Diane Veale-Jones

Why is there poverty and hunger in the 21st Century? Who are the poor and hungry? Why are they poor and hungry? What is the impact of poverty and hunger on individuals, households, and nations?

Answers to these questions require us to examine the role of social, economic, political, and agricultural factors as causes of poverty and hunger, and to explore the ethical questions and dilemmas associated with poverty and hunger. What approaches to ending hunger have been successful? Why? Is it possible for an individual or small group to have an impact on ending hunger and poverty? If not, do we still have a moral obligation to try?

A small group service learning project is a requirement of the course.

### CORE 390-02A: Current Issues in Society

James Makepeace

This senior seminar will be a synthetic examination of four social issues which have recently come to the forefront of public and scholarly attention: terrorism, globalization, treatment of animals, and the environment.

Greatest attention will be given to the environmental issue. Each issue will be examined in a two-fold manner: *objective assessment* utilizing scientific evidence and theory and *normative assessment* utilizing tools of ethical theory. Aspects of these social issues to be considered will include: conditions of emergence, theories, applicable social movements and counter-movements, cross-cultural aspects, and social change.

## CORE 390-03A: "The Tao of Lagom: A Middle Way for the Middle Kingdom"

John Hasselberg

"The Tao of Lagom: A Middle Way for the Middle Kingdom".

China must address its growing income and wealth inequalities, its aging population, its rapidly deteriorating health and social safety supports and the other related consequences of its rapid development and of its thirty years of the one-child policy. Research into issues of ethical accountability, environmental sustainability, and corporate social responsibility (and its evolution into International Corporate Responsibility) clearly distinguish rival systems of organizing the relationships between the state, market and civil society spheres. The corporatist model of Sweden holds great promise for adoption by and adaptation to China's evolving socio-economic system.

The Swedish "Middle Way" arrangement emerged out of a situation similar to what is happening economically, socially+ and in the work-places and families of China today. The system adopted in Sweden reflected an understanding of the need for each side to both give and take but not give or take too much. "Lagom" is the Swedish word for this phenomenon. Such a system is necessary for a morally healthy and sustainable civil society, responsible government and a market system that is both vibrant and accountable while respectful of human dignity and vulnerability. With occasional modifications, the "Middle Way" continues to serve the Swedish society well (itself arguably the first highly successful export-driven developing economy in the 20th century) to this day. It provides a model of economic, social, environmental and cultural

sustainability that ought to be most attractive to China as it addresses the challenges embedded in its long term growth and development strategy.

### CORE 390-04A: Social Issues and the Law

Tim Robinson

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law

### CORE 390-05A: Reading for Life

### CORE 390-07A: Visions of the Good Life

Stephen Wagner

This course will look at some of the most prominent moral views in the tradition of western philosophical thought. Our goal we will be to consider whether these views provide adequate guides for living a good life. We will look at aspects of the moral theories of Plato, Aristotle, Thomas Hobbes, John Stuart Mill, Immanuel Kant and Albert Camus. We will also investigate a number of views which claim to offer variations or alternatives to these classical western models, such as feminist thought and virtue ethics. We will use a number of literary texts in our attempt to gain moral insight, reading *The Stranger, The Remains of the Day, Their Eyes Were Watching God* and *The Plague*. As we consider whether we can find guidance for our own lives in these readings, our focus throughout will be to develop in ourselves the ability to make good moral judgments.

### CORE 390-08A: Cultural Criticism

Bruce Campbell

Whether we're reading a book, watching television, going to the movies, attending a concert, visiting a museum or engaging in cultural criticism (!), we're involved in a process of negotiating and producing mean-

ing, shaping and re-shaping how we perceive ourselves and others and the core values that hold society together (or pull it apart). There are a lot of differing opinions about what "culture" is, and about why we should bother to study it at all. Mass, popular, and "high" culture are value-laden categories that further complicate the matter. And different critical approaches to culture carry with them distinct ethical and political objectives. It's no wonder that "culture" has been called one of the most complicated words in the English language.

We will read and discuss a range of theories and methods of cultural analysis, and apply these to a variety of cultural forms (television, film, visual art, advertising, music and literature), touching on themes including aesthetics, cultural representation, semiotics, and ideology. The goal of the course will be to develop the student's ability to critically evaluate the ethical implications of the cultural environment and their own relationship to it.

## CORE 390-13A: Race & Socio-Economic Status: An America Still Divided

Phil Kramer

This course will examine the effects race and socio-economic status have on the increasing gaps found in educational achievement, economic opportunity, political power, and identity in America. A number of theoretical and practical lenses will be used to examine the increasing differences and tensions between subgroups and the democratic and moral leadership issues and implications America's future leaders may expect and confront.

### **COURSES OF THE COLLEGE**

### COLG 130: EMT Basics

This course covers basic minimal emergency care required to work on an ambulance or first responder squad throughout the 50 states in the U.S. The course offers basic to more advanced techniques and principles of pre-hospital; emergency care. Students must be at least 18 years old to take the National and State Certification exams.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES**

### **ENVR 200A: Environmental Art & Architecture**

Richard Bresnahan

This course focuses on a range of issues addressing art, architecture and their relationship to a sustainable environment. Through an analysis of critical theory, students will gain an understanding of the language and critical issues of art, architecture and their impact upon the environment. Through a hands-on approach, students will apply these concepts to make ceramic artwork in the SJU Pottery studio. Students will critically analyze readings, discuss examples of art and architecture and meet with artists in order to expand their understanding of the relationship between art, architecture and the environment.

Grading: A-F only

### ENVR 300A: Introduction to Geographic Information Systems Jean Lavigne

Geographic Information Systems are combinations of data management and mapping software that allow users (such as city and state governments) to organize, query, and map multiple forms of spatial data.

Data can include road networks, lakes and streams, vegetation or soil types, land use, property ownership, zoning codes, elevations, census tract data, and so on. In this class, students will learn how these systems work and will produce a series of maps, some from existing data and others from new data collected during the course with global positioning systems (GPS). In order to do this successfully, students will learn spatial analysis techniques, some principles of cartography, and will consider the ethical and social justice implications of the use of GIS and GPS technologies.

## ENVR 300B: Sustainable Agriculture Diane Veale Jones

How do we sustain the environment and provide food security to 9 billion people in 2042? This course examines the causes of food insecurity; investigates the environmental, human, and cultural costs of industrial agricultural food production; identifies the environmental consequences of producing protein foods, e.g. fish farming, meat, and soybeans; explores the potential and the risks of agricultural biotechnology to increase the global food supply. Students will examine the claims made by proponents of sustainable agriculture and assess its potential in balancing human food production with other environmental goods.

### ENVR 341: Natural History of Tropical Carbonate Ecosystems Larry Davis

Cross-listed with BIOL 341 & GEOL 341. See course description under BIOL 341

### **GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES**

GWST 290A: Men's Studies Research

Gar Kellom

In addition to men's studies content and research methodology, students participate in three ongoing research projects in the SJU men's center: a small group social norms study of masculinity, a social norms spirituality project, and an international men's stories project. Additional projects may be developed. Class time arranged with those enrolled. May be repeated.

### **GEOLOGY**

GEOL 341: Natural History of Tropical Carbonate Ecosystems

Cross-listed with BIOL 341 & ENVR 341. See course description under BIOL 341

### **HISTORY**

HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium: American Indians in the Cities

This course will explore the history of American Indian people in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul and other Midwestern cities, primarily since the turn of the twentieth century. We will spend much of the course considering questions of cultural conflict, change, persistence, and revitalization. The course also will focus on the Twin Cities' place in the history of Indigenous political activism, as the birthplace of the American Indian Movement in 1968, and as a center for other kinds of activism in the decades before and since.

We will use a range of sources—including sociological studies, newspapers, photographs, literature, and oral history—to investigate what we can know about the history of urban Indian people, and to understand how historians construct the stories they tell. Students will write reflective responses to course readings, contribute actively to class discussions, and participate in a creative group project resulting in a public exhibit.

## HIST 395: Historiography and Methods: History, Memory & the Politics of Remembering

Gregory Schroeder

This course examines the ways in which countries and societies remember the past, what they remember, and why they remember. Sometimes, the things that are forgotten are as significant as what is remembered. In many cases, the events at issue pertain to the Second World War, but other topics will be included as well. The course focuses on the politics of memory in several European countries, the United States, and Japan.

### **HONORS**

HONR 210B: Computing: Science & It's Applications Lynn Ziegler

This course is an overview of computing and its applications from a scientific perspective. Students should learn how computers are built up from simple components to chips to computing devices and how various levels of software enable users to use them as "general purpose machines". Included in the topics covered will be limits of computation, tractable and intractable problems, artificial intelligence, social and ethical problems, representation of complex data, algorithms, operating systems, databases, the theoretical and hardware bases of computation, programming, and use of applications for doing useful work with computers. Students should have a reasonable level of mathematical ability although no mathematics beyond high school algebra will be assumed as a prerequisite.

### HONR 220C: Business, Government & Society

Virginia Arthur

Study of the social, governmental and ethical issues that affect the conduct of business within a global environment. This course addresses the link between human, economic, social, political and legal systems and the conduct of business. The course will examine the foundations of our economic system, the changing role of business enterprises in society as technology and globalization proceed, and the appropriate relationship between consumers, workers and the businesses they deal with.

## HONR 240A: The Development of the Christian Tradition—Interpreting the Bible

Charles Bobertz

By means of the study of selected biblical texts, I hope to introduce students to a brief history of interpretation and a selection of methodologies involved in a modern critical reading of the bible in a Catholic context. Our emphasis will be on the role played by the interpretation of the Bible in the life of the Church and the world. Text used in this course will include: Early Christian Worship, Creation and the Persistence of Evil, The Death and Resurrection of the Beloved Son, The Writings of St. Paul, and Mark and Method.

## Honors 250B: An Atlas of the Difficult World": Reading Poetry, Fiction and Memoirs

Mara Faulkner

I borrowed the title of this literature course from a long poem by Adrienne Rich, in which she asks whether poetry can help us find our way through the dangers that mark the world of the twenty-first century. We will study this poem as well as several of Rich's essays from her collection, Arts of the Possible. Many other writers have asked what value imaginative literature has in "a difficult world." Does it create a bridge to cross the abyss between the personal and the public, the aesthetic and the political, the I and the we? We will read the works of poets, fiction writers, memoirists, and theorists. You will add your voices to this conversation by doing many kinds of writing—a poetry anthology, a personal essay, and a critical/analytical essay. I will also give frequent short written assignments which will become the springboards into each day's discussion. I hope we will often find ourselves in deep water! There will be a written mid-term exam and either a written or an oral final exam. I will ask you to present some of your work to the class, raise questions, bring your experience of the world to bear on what we read, help each other improve as writers, and be actively engaged in all course activities.

### HONR 250C: Great Issues in Philosophy

Emily Esch

This writing intensive course introduces you to philosophy through the examination of some of philosophy's biggest questions. The course is designed around the following five topics: the relationship between the mind and body, personal identity, morality, the concept of God and the problem of evil, and the nature of knowledge.

In respective order, these are some of the questions which fall under each topic. Is the mind an immaterial soul or is it identical to the brain? What makes it possible that you are the same person now that you were ten years ago, given that all sorts of facts about you have changed? What makes an action right or wrong, or a person good or bad? Is the traditional Christian conception of God compatible with the existence of evil in the world? Do we ever know anything? If so, what justifies our beliefs?

### HONR 270B: Math Exploration

Michael Tangredi

You're waiting patiently at the grocery store checkout counter as the clerk keeps rescanning your bag of potato chips until the familiar "beep" sounds. Are you confident that during the failed attempts, the machine won't misread your purchase as an expensive rib roast and charge you accordingly? You send your credit card information over a "secure" web connection. What makes it so secure?

Science fiction writers (and physicists) often speak of time as the "fourth dimension". What does this mean?

While these questions may seem to be unrelated, there is in fact an underlying mathematical unity that connects them to each other. In mathematics, as in art, the key to discovering a connection among seemingly disparate subjects is abstraction. In this course, we will examine the traditional mathematical concepts of "number and space" and see how modern mathematicians have abstracted these notions to forge powerful tools for solving problems and for framing our understanding of the world around us. The topics we will cover—number theory, group theory, and geometry of higher dimensional space-will most likely be brand new to you. Thus, this course offers a fresh start in new mathematical directions, rather than being one which builds heavily on high school algebra.

#### HONR 311: Great Books/Great Ideas

Dennis Beach

This is a year-long discussion based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Augustine, Euripides, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, Camus, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Eliot, Faulkner, Pynchon, Freud, Homer, Kafka, Flaubert, Melville, Dinesen, Flannery O'Connor, Plato, Nabokov, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Virginia Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to Junior and Senior honors students who will complete the entire year. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of works during the summer.

#### HONR 340G: Religious Perspectives on Economic Life Dan Finn

How economic life ought to be conducted has long been a concern of religious people, based on both moral norms and some view of what is actually happening in the economy. This course will examine various visions of economic life held by religious people in the West, focusing on the understanding of economic life in Christianity: from roots in the Hebrew scriptures and the New Testament, through the early church, the middle ages, the Protestant Reformation and the Enlightenment, up to the contemporary debates about free markets, liberation theology, feminism, and the social teaching of the Roman Catholic Church today.

### **MANAGEMENT**

### MGMT 305A: Personal Finance

Michelle Li-Kuehne

The course introduces the student to the concepts, tools, and applications of personal finance and investments. It shows the student how to take the first step towards understanding the process of financial planning and the logic that drives it. Special attention will be paid to cash or liquid asset management, the use of open credit, consumer loans, insurance, investment management, automobile and housing purchase and financing.

PREREQUISITE: None. Open to all majors.

### **MATHEMATICS**

#### MATH 340: Introduction to Game Theory & Its Applications Gary Brown

Game theory is the logical analysis of situations of conflict and cooperation. In situations of conflict the idea is to find a model where "players" and their strategies are identified in a game with certain outcomes and resulting payoffs. Game theory then is the systematic study of how players should rationally play games to maximize their payoffs.

The course begins by studying a class of games in "recreational mathematics" known as combinatorial games. Played mostly just for fun, these type of games include Nim and Hex. Then the course turns to its more classical treatment of two person zero-sum games culminating in the famous Mini-Max theorem of Von Neumann. Then we turn to the fascinating subject of two person non-zero sum games and Nash's theory of equilibrium points. Finally we conclude with a look at n-person games when n>2.

Historically game theory has its roots in the study of economic competition starting with the famous treatise of Von Neumann and Morgenstern in 1944. The subject's applications have since spread to political science as candidates are playing a game to win an election or legislators are playing a game to pass a bill, to biology as species are playing a game in which the payoff is the chance to pass along genes to future generations, to psychology as for example married couples are playing a game where the payoffs are trust issues, or even to philosophy and theology where "man" is playing a game against "God."

In all of these situations, the analysis begins by stripping all of the emotional aspects and determining how the players will rationally choose from their strategies by playing non-cooperatively. Once this analysis is completed then other aspects of the situation can be slowly added into the mix starting with allowing players to play cooperatively and possibly form coalitions. Finally the emotional and psychological aspects can be added to the mix to make a final prediction on the outcome of the game.

This course could be attractive to economics majors, prospective teachers and especially anyone who loves to have fun playing games. The prerequisite is math 239 or permission from the instructor.

### **MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES**

### **GERM 355: Filmbiographien**

Anna Lisa Ohm

From the dramatic interpretations of the lives of royalty and geniuses to that of scientists, politicians, entertainers, sports figures, and even gangsters, the subjects of film biographies, or bio-pics, have expanded as the genre in general has improved. GERM 355 reveals the breath and depth of that development, within the context of the genre's intent to interpret a person's life, or part of a life. Bio-pic filmmakers may be intrigued, for example, by the historical, social, and political era, or compelled by the way the issues reflect problems contemporary to the film. In this course we research the biographies and view bio-pic's of such pivotal figures as Martin Luther, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, W. A. Mozart, Friedrich Schiller, Adolf Hitler, Rosa Luxemburg, Sophie Scholl, and others in the arts, politics, and religion. The learning goals are to comprehend the texts, compare prose and film texts, research the historical context, and finally analyze the film's presentation in order to critique its validity and understand or speculate on the bio-pic's message to its audience. After initially modeling the process, students work in groups on selected projects. A common text is Peter Beicken's basic introduction to film, Wie interpretiert man einen Film?, and biographies of two or three individuals featured. Four or five films are viewed outside of class time.

PREREQUISITE: 311 and/or 312.

### **NUTRITION**

### **NUTR 230: Cultural Foods**

Jayne Byrne

The meaning and significance of food in different cultures will be identifies by exploring the way that climate, ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status and religion influence food choices and preferences. A special focus will be placed on how food impacts health and nutritional status of various populations. The experience of tasting foods and practicing food preparations techniques from a variety of traditions will be part of the class.

### **PEACE STUDIES**

### PCST 368: Theory & Practice of Nonviolence

Kelly Kraemer

Over the past hundred years, nonviolent action by ordinary people has brought down colonial rulers, overthrown dictators, established and defended civil and human rights. Nonviolence has been used effectively in different countries, cultures, and historical eras. Successful nonviolent movements have exercised discipline and employed innovative, well planned strategies. Yet the belief that nonviolence doesn't work or is "too idealistic" remains prevalent. This introduction to the history, theory and practice of nonviolence will focus on the tremendous power of nonviolent direct action as a force for social change. We will explore the theoretical and philosophical roots of nonviolence; examine the most current theoretical research on nonviolent struggle, power, and social change; study the practical skills necessary for disciplined nonviolent action; critically analyze historical examples of nonviolent action; and research contemporary social movements committed to nonviolence.

### PCST 399: Is Peace Possible?

Kelly Kraemer

Are human beings naturally violent and warlike, or do we have the potential for peace? John Lennon once said, "If everyone demanded peace instead of another television set, then there'd be peace." Maybe it's not quite that simple, but is peace possible? If it is, how might we achieve it, and what roles can individuals play in the process? This course is designed to help senior peace studies majors and minors search for and evaluate answers to these and related questions by examining theories and evidence from a variety of fields (including, but not limited to: peace studies, anthropology, psychology, history, sociology, biology, and futures studies), with a view to integrating their four year academic experience. Preference given to senior Peace Studies majors & minors

### **PSYCHOLOGY**

### PSYC 309C: Cross-cultural Psychology

Linda Tennison

Cross cultural psychology examines traditional topics in the field of psychology (for example, research methods, cognition, development, emotion, psychopathology, social behavior, etc.) with a special emphasis on the comparison of these topics across different cultural groups. We will explore these topics with a particular emphasis on the methodological challenges associated with developing a scientific understanding of the influence of culture on human behavior and mental processes.

### PSYC 309D: Neuroscience of Mental Illness

Laura Sinville

This course will explore mental illness from the neuroscience/biopsychological perspective; sample topics include anxiety disorders, eating disorders, depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, Alzheimer's disease, aggression, and personality disorders. This reading-intensive course will involve both lecture and discussion and will require students to prepare and present a major paper.

PREREQUISITE: Physiological Psychology (PSYC 340)

## PSYC 393: Senior Psychology Seminar: Buddhist PSYC Linda Tennison

This course will explore the interface between Western and Buddhist psychologies by a re-examination of traditional substantive areas in psychology including (but not limited to): historical development, research methodology and ways of knowing, neuroscience, sensation and perception, consciousness, conditioning, cognition, motivation and emotion, personality, social interaction and psychopathology. Class meetings will be spent discussing assigned readings from both the psychological and the Buddhist literature. Students will select a psychological topic of interest, extensively research the topic from both perspectives, and prepare a term paper to be presented to the group. In addition, students will receive basic instruction in mindfulness meditation and will be asked to adopt a daily practice, journaling their reactions and experiences, as an experiential component of the course.

### SOCIOLOGY

### SOCI 337: Sociology of Body

Liddy Hope

This course examines body image using a sociological perpective and theoretical foundation. Body image is defined as a person's thoughts, feelings and reactions to his or her body. Specific attention will be given to the change in societal expectations of male body, the role of health and body image, and the impact of family. Students will participate in a class research project designed to assess body image and media.

### **THEOLOGY**

### THEO 111: The Biblical Tradition

Various instructors

This course offers an introduction to the discipline of Christian theology, giving primary attention to texts from the Bible (including selections from the Pentateuch, the Prophets, the Gospels, and the Pauline Letters), emphasizing prominent biblical themes (including creation, covenant, and reign of God), and considering some post-biblical developments in the tradition.

### THEO 339B: Spiritual Companioning

Marian Diaz

Cross-listed with CORE 339B

This course will introduce participants to the ministry of spiritual companionship. They will explore the growing need for "soul friends" in contemporary life and consider the various contexts for cultivating spiritual community: one-to-one, small groups, marriage, family life, place of worship, and the workplace. Participants will apply companioning skills to their own lives through course assignments and class activities such as role-plays, discussion of case studies, and reflection on personal experiences.

### THEO 349A: Family, Church, and Society

Kari-Shane Zimmerman

Cross-listed with CORE 349A

Drawing on historical, sociological, and religious sources, this course introduces students to a range of perspectives concerning the intersection of family, church and society, focusing on issues such as cohabitation, marriage, divorce, homosexuality, and gender roles.

### THEO 349C: Theology, Biomedical & Healthcare Ethics

Kathryn Cox

Cross-listed with CORE 349C (pending JC approval)

Why do so many Americans say that they are "spiritual but not religious"? How should Christian theologians respond? In this seminar, we will explore some important recent scholarship on the historical roots of the "spiritual but not religious" phenomenon in the United States, analyze primary sources related to evangelical, Transcendentalist, metaphysical, and new age spiritualities, and read the works of Catholic and Protestant theologians who have responded positively or negatively to these spiritualities. Each student will complete an individual research project that either explores a specific spiritual tradition or develops a constructive theological response to American spirituality.

## THEO 395: Advanced Seminar in Theology: Spiritual But Not Religious: Historical Roots and Theological Responses

Each student will complete an individual research project that either explores a specific spiritual tradition or develops a constructive theological response to American spirituality.

### SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

## HHTH 468-01A: Contemporary Monasticism: Currents, Queries & Concerns

Mary Forman

Cross-listed with MONS 468-01A

Since Vatican II with its call to religious communities to return to the sources, the monastic world has witnessed a multiplicity of expressions of monastic life: from intentional communities to heritages, from traditional Benedictine and Cistercian communities to ecumenical, inter-faith and Protestant communities, from solely vowed religious to various forms of affiliation of lay membership. Some of the fastest growing communities appear to be in regions of the world other than Europe and North America. The rise of new expressions of monastic life has led to questions about what it means to be a monastic in the world. This course will explore some of the currents of the changing face of monasticism, along with the hopes, dreams, concerns and challenges for monasticism in the 21st century.

## MONS 468-01A: Contemporary Monasticism: Currents, Queries & Concerns

Mary Forman

Cross-listed with HHTH 468-01A. See description above.

## MONS 468-02A: The Monastic Tradition of Spirtual Direction—WEB Luke Dysinger

This course will study different approaches to spiritual direction found in the Christian East and West, noting the historical development of early monastic models and methods of spiritual guidance. Particular attention will be paid to the themes of spiritual friendship and spiritual father-/motherhood in literature of early monasticism, especially the writings of John Cassian and Evagrius Ponticus

### STUDY ABROAD COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

General:

MGMT 389: SA Experiential Learning

Wendy Klepetar & Virginia Arthur

This course is designed for students participating in Study Abroad. Reading relevant to understanding business in the international environment will be assigned. Students will write a series of essay integrating their knowledge of theory with their personal observations and reactions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the impact of culture on business. The course will be taught by a professor at CSB/SJU using distance learning to maintain contact with students located in a variety of countries.

### **CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS**

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

### The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

### 1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

### **Mathematics Proficiency**

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 8 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—four events per semester.

### 2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses) -- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 &101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. <u>Cannot be repeated for credit.</u> Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

### 3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

JC	(1 course)	May be satisfied only after the TH and one HML course is completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
MT	(1 course)	Must have satisfied the Math Proficiency before the completion of the course.
NS	(2 courses)	Must be from different departments (unless NATS, COLG, HONR or ENVR).
SSL	(1 course)	Must be 100 level.
SSU	(1 course)	Must have completed the SSL course first.

Courses may carry 1 or more flags, in addition to meeting Core disciplinary or Major requirements. Flagged courses are specific to the instructor and term. Flagged courses are listed in the Class Schedule and updated lists are posted at the Office of the Registrar.

CSCI 130: Computing: Science & Its Applications (NS), 4 credits

Faculty Moderator - Imad Rahal

Dates: May 27 through July 2

Day & time: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday & Friday from 1:00-3:00 (lecture), PENGL 238 Monday, Tuesday, Thursday & Friday from 3:30-4:50 (lab), PENGL 218

An overview of computing and its applications from a scientific perspective, designed to equip students with the basic tools needed to understand computers and use them effectively. Students will study the basic architecture of computers, the structure of programming, and the design of spreadsheets and databases. Through regularly scheduled labs they will gain hands-on experience with applications to scientific and business problems. Not intended for students majoring in the sciences.

GEOL 211: Physical Geology (NS), 4 credits

Day & time: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday from 9:00-12:00 (lecture)

Tuesday & Thursday from 1-4:00 (lab)

Geology is the study of the composition of the Earth and its dynamic systems. One system, using solar and gravitational energy, involves the processes of weathering, erosion and deposition of sediments by the atmosphere, wind, rivers, ground water and glaciers. The other system, using internal energy of the Earth, is tectonic. This involves movement of material in the Earth's interior resulting in plate movement which creates and destroys the crust and results in volcanism, earthquakes and mountain-building. Laboratory and field trips required.

#### GEOL 214: Paleobiology of Dinosauria (NS), 4 credits

Dates: July 21 through August 14

Day & time: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday from 9:00-12:00 (lecture)

Tuesday & Thursday from 1-4:00 (lab)

A study of the paleobiology and evolution of Dinosauria. Dinosaurs will be studied within the context of geological, biological, and anatomical considerations, and will include an examination of controversial issues; ideas about established facts and reasonable inferences; and separation of truth from fiction and misinformation. This course is designed to help students improve their command of written Spanish. It also includes practice in oral expression, oral presentations, and daily debate. Written assignments will be based on a step-by-step approach to the development of writing skills. Writing topics will be related to short literary and cultural readings. These readings will be incorporated thematically and according to the writing styles presented in class. The course will also provide a systematic review of Spanish grammatical structures and troublesome lexical items. The grammar will be integrated with the material studied in class. Students who successfully complete this course may receive a global flag.

# SPAN 355-01A: Spanish Theater from Romanticism to the Civil War (1833-1936), 4 credits

Faculty Moderator - Gladys White & José Antonio Fábres Note: Course will be taught by qualified Spanish professor on site Dates: May 15 through June 20

This course will explore through a series of texts the transformation and changes in the genre in Spain in the period that runs from the Romanticism to the Spanish Civil War. The goal of this course is to examine the works representative of these periods, the radical differences in their structure, and the series of demands on the playwright which include those of the public which can condition and undermine his/her creative freedom. This is what was called Borel's possible and impossible theatre, a formula which explains well the possibility of debuting of many of the plays during the first third of the 20th century.

## SPAN 355-02A: Fin de siècle Spanish Literature, 4 credits

**Faculty Moderator - José Antonio Fábres Note:** Course will be taught by qualified Spanish professor on site Dates: June 19 through July 25

Objectives: Through the analysis of a series of literary texts students will be exposed to the global phenomenon known at the *fin de siècle* crisis. This phenomenon adopted different characteristics depending on the country in which it was experienced, but in the Hispanic world it had very specific aspects that it shared with western, and particularly the European world. In the Hispanic culture, this moment also known as the generation of 98 and modernism—labels which live today in criticism—, but which in recent years are seen as the same phenomenon. Much like the two sides of the deep crisis that positivism must confront, the *fin de siècle* crisis makes connections with certain historical events that generate cultural and literary diversity as a new century begins.
