Registration Instructions March 29— April 12, 2010 FALL 2010

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Fall must complete advance registration by April 12th. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- · Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- · Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a firstyear student)
 - Applied for graduation if they are classified as a Senior
- · Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- · Have an active Network account

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on BANNER Web Self Service on the date listed on your PIN Label. Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on BANNER Web Self Service after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on Banner Web Self Service through August 30th. **You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor.** To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 163) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of cancelled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on Banner Web Self Service. Students should use Banner Web Self Service to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/Add card to the Registrar's Office or the online request form: https://www1.csbsju.edu/registrar/forms/sec/OverrideRequest.aspx

REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on cumulative earned hours. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. Banner Web Self Service will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.

DROP/ADD on Banner Web Self Service

If you would like to drop and add courses for Fall Term 2010, you may do this through Banner Web Self Service until August 30th. Please keep your Registration PIN #. You will need this to Drop/Add on Banner Web Self Service. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use Banner Web Self Service from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

Step #1: Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm

Step #2: Identify yourself as needing a Network account.

Step #3: Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

Your PIN # doesn't work.

Solution: Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit Banner Web Self Service completely and login again. **YOUR PIN#** for registration is <u>not the same</u> as your WSC (Web Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on Banner-Web Self Service. Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.

You lost your PIN #.

Solution: Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)

You entered the wrong CRN #.

Solution: Banner Web Self Service allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using Banner Web Self Service". You may make changes on Banner Web Self Service through August 30st.

• While using Banner Web Self Service it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".

Solution: Banner Web Self Service is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you **leave the screen idle for more than 15 minutes.** If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on Banner Web Self Service and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.


• Banner Web Self Service shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.

Solution: You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Fall 2010 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

ACADEMIC PROBATION

First semester students must earn a minimum 1.8 cumulative grade point average to remain in good academic standing. In subsequent semesters, all students are required to maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average for all CSB/SJU coursework. Students who fall below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation for the next semester. During the probationary semester, students must raise their cumulative GPA to 2.0 and may take no courses for S/U grading unless the course if offered only on an S/U basis. Students whose cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standards at the end of a Final Probationary semester are subject to dismissal. For more information, see the Official Academic Catalog.

ADDING A CLASS

August 30th is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after August 30th. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

Banner Web Self Service will be available to add courses through the 4th day of the semester. After the 4th day of the semester, any additions, with the instructor's consent, must be made by filling out a drop/add card & filing with the Registrar's Office.

AUDITING A CLASS

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is calculated in the total tuition cost.

CALENDAR CHANGES

The CSB/SJU calendar is subject to modification or interruption due to occurrences such as fire, flood, labor disputes, interruption of utility services, acts of God, civil disorder and war. In the event of such occurrences, the Institutions will attempt to accommodate their students. However, we do not guarantee that courses of instruction, extra curricular activities or other programs or events will be completed or rescheduled. Refunds will be made to eligible students in accordance with College or University policy.

Classes offered Periods II, III, and IV generally are requested by greater numbers of students than are other periods. You are less likely to be closed out of a class that is scheduled for Period I, or V, and may wish to consider this when you prepare your initial registration.

CO-REQUISITES (COREQ)

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester.

CREDITS EARNED AT OTHER COLLEGES

Students may complete out-of-residence courses and transfer them to Saint Benedict's and Saint John's. The college at which the coursework is completed must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency at the time of enrollment. Courses to be transferred must be similar to courses offered for credit at Saint Benedicts and Saint John's. Courses to be transferred must receive a minimum grade of C. Credits received for these courses are translated into semester credits according to the appropriate translation formula. Grades earned for transferred coursework are not calculated into the student's cumulative GPA. Before credit may be transferred, the Registrar's Office must receive an official transcript directly from the college at which the courses were completed.

With advance approval, students may apply these courses towards common curriculum and/or major requirements. Work taken to complete common requirements requires prior consultation with and approval of the Registrar's Office or the Academic Advising Office. Work taken to complete major requirements requires prior consultation and approval of the department chair. The department chair needs to sign an Academic Substitution/Exemption Form.

Students who intend to transfer coursework from a foreign college or university must consult the director of international studies before beginning such study. Consult the Education Abroad Office for further information.

CREDIT OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is estimated at approximately \$873 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The Banner Web Self Service registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credits.

DROPPING A CLASS

- Aug. 30th Last day to drop a course using Banner Web Self Service.
 After this date students must fill out a drop/add card & obtain the instructor's signature to receive a permanent drop until September 20th.
- Sept. 20th Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- Nov. 15th Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you
 withdraw after this date, your instructor may assign you an "F" at the
 end of the semester if appropriate.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure if appropriate.

Students who fail to properly drop or withdraw from a course may be subject to a failing grade if appropriate.

EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for their final exam or request a multi section common exam time.

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and three-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the three-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the three test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

GRADUATION INFORMATION

- An Application for Degree must be submitted to the Registrar's Office prior to the award of a degree from Saint John's University or the College of Saint Benedict.
- An Application for Degree is sent to all CSB/SJU Juniors during spring semester.
- Submitted applications are then reviewed to ensure all Common Curriculum and Major requirements are met prior to the award of a degree.
- Results of the Degree Audit are sent to students two times during their senior year: September and February.
- Degrees are issued in May, August, and December.
- Upon successful completion of all degree requirements, diplomas and transcripts are sent to all graduates at their permanent address
- An Application for Degree allows students the privilege to participate in the May commencement ceremony.
- Students may participate in the May commencement ceremony if they are within 8 credits of all degree requirements.
- Students who leave CSB/SJU may transfer up to eight semester credits from another accredited institution of higher education to complete their degree requirements.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- 124 credit hours. 45 of these must be earned at CSB/SJU
- 40 of the total credit hours must be upper division (300 level)
- 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- 2.0 minimum GPA major and/or supporting courses (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- Completed Common Curriculum requirements
- Acceptance to a major (usually at the completion of sophomore year)
- Requirements for a major (half of the courses for a major must be completed at CSB/SJU)

 Candidates for a degree must normally be in residence for the two semesters preceding commencement

HOLDS

All financial, academic, student accounts & health center holds must be cleared before registering for classes.

INCOMPLETE GRADE POLICY

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the minimum grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the minimum grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation by March 15th will necessarily result in postponement of their graduation.

INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Fall term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A CRN #11190, or DNA 371-01A, CRN #11191 on Banner Web Self Service. Remember to indicate the number of credits. First-year students are not eligible for ILPs.

INTERNSHIPS

SUMMER 2010 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer of 2010 are required to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2010. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates or check the Internship website: www.csbsju.edu/internship. All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term mot under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed on-line *Registration for Internship-Learning Contract* form with all required electronic signatures. This form, and other required legal forms can be downloaded from the Internship website. Check this website as well for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Summer 2010 internship is Monday, May 3. Registration after this date requires approval from the Internship Program Coordinator.

FALL 2010 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

When you register for fall classes, you may indicate your internship to register for a Fall 2010 internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, CRN # 11192 through Banner Web Self Service. Enter the number of credits you expect to earn.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed on-line Registration for Internship Learning Contract form with all required electronic signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be downloaded from the internship website. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Fall 2010 Internship is Monday, May 3. Registration after this date requires approval from the Internship Program Coordinator.

MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at CSB or SJU. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

ON TRACK

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through Banner Web Self Service for Faculty Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students MUST see their advisor to receive their Registration PIN # Label.

PERMISSION REQUIRED CLASSES

Before attempting to register for courses listed as "Permission of Instructor or Department", students must obtain written permission. You may complete the online request form: https://www1.csbsju.edu/registrar/forms/sec/OverrideRequest.aspx

PREREQUISITES

Check the course listings section of this class schedule to find out if a class has a prerequisite. Make sure you have met all prerequisites before attempting to register for a course. If you have not taken the prerequisite, you must contact the department to seek written approval (signed drop/add card or e-mail directly from the instructor) to register for the course. You may complete the online request form:

https://www1.csbsju.edu/registrar/forms/sec/OverrideRequest.aspx. If you fulfilled the prerequisite through a course taken at another college, prior to Fall 2005, please contact the Registrar's Office prior to registration.

REPEATING A COURSE

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you MUST notify the Registrar's Office. Repeating a course in which a passing grade has already been earned may have financial aid implications. See Financial Aid Office for additional information.

STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9th (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Education Abroad Office, ASB 104 at CSB. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the Education Abroad Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$225 fee.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for a External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**.

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED or GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before August 23rd. The course will be added to your Fall 2010 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition estimated at approximately \$873, will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Stromme in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 163.

TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term. Former students may request a transcript copy for \$5.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$5.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw by September 20th no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between September 21st and November 15th, the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after November 15th, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you MUST notify the office mentioned above.

FALL 2010 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ACCOUNTING & FINANCE

ACFN 337: Business Taxation Topics

Warren Bostrom

Advanced tax topics relating to businesses. Computation of tax, tax accruals, tax considerations on the formation and operation of businesses, and other tax topics. Includes on-line research of tax issues.

PREREQUISITE: ACFN 113

ART

ART 233F: Printmaking

James Hendershot

This is a hands on course working with the following printmaking processes.

- Monotypes, a created image painted or drawn on a smooth surface and printed, and one of a kind print form.
- A collagraph, a construction on a plate surface and printed.
- Releif/Woodcut, a surface cut away and printed

There will be equal importance given to the importance to the creating and printing of images.

ART 233J: Handmade Photography

Scott Murphy

Students will explore alternative approaches to photography from the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, which emphasize making images by hand. This will include crafting photographs without a camera, building cameras, making photographic paper, printing on non-traditional surfaces and manipulating imagery.

CHEMISTRY

CHEM 125: Introduction to Chemical Structure and Properties All instructors

An introductory chemistry course in which students study how the structure of atoms, ions, and molecules determine their physical and chemical properties. Starting with atoms and their electron configurations, students build a progressive and linked understand of bonding, ionic and moelcular geometry, and physical and chemical properties that emerge from structure. Intended as a first course for students majoring in the natural sciences. Students will be concurrently enrolled in the laboratory section associated with the corresponding course section.

COMMUNICATION

COMM 305: Women's Voices

Shane Miller

This class is a survey of the rhetorical efforts of a variety of North American women from the early 19th century to contemporary times. Women from diverse cultures and movements will be studied, and their rhetorical efforts critically discussed. The class will draw upon a variety of rhetorical theories to discover how and why women's voices have been silenced, as well as to understand the creative efforts used by these women to make their voices heard. *PREREQUISITE: COMM 101*

COMM 383G: Undertold Stories and Global Perspectives Frederick de Sam Lazaro

Cross-listed with HONR 350J

This course aims to shape an intellectual community centered on ethical thinking on global issues of our times, with emphasis on bringing home the relevance of these issues in our students' lives. Special attention will be paid to issues, stories and places that are underreported in the mass media—especially issues related to gender equity—since these form the portfolio of the instructors' day job. Through class discussions, regular visits to the UTS website (undertoldstories.org) and their vicarious connection to working journalists, students gain media literacy at a critical time of transition in the business of mass media and information

COMM 385C: Family Communication

Karvl Daughters

The primary objective of this course is to review research in family communication in order to understand and recognize communication patterns in families and familial relationships. Our study of this research will help us develop positive family communication patterns and create awareness about the connections between family communication and societal discourse. The course will include an exploration of *civility* in interpersonal relationships specifically in martial and parenting communication. Civility has become an increasing social concern and a growing area of communication research. The course will allow us to explore the reflexive nature of family and societal discourse.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

CSCI 281: Problem Solving

Lynn Ziegler

Cross-listed with PHYS 281

An introduction to solving complex problems in interdisciplinary topics which will be drawn from mathematics, computer science, and physics. Students will work in groups and present their results. Prerequisite: Math 120 and admission to MAPCORES program or consent of instructor.

EDUCATION

EDUC 335: Environmental Education Pedagogy Karen Bengtson

Cross-listed with ENVR 335

This course is designed for individuals that are planning on teaching in the field of environmental education in formal classroom settings and/or interpretive settings, such as environmental learning centers. Some of the issues that will be explored are the incorporation of environmental education in standards based settings, the dichotomy of advocacy versus education, and the history, trends and best practices of environmental education. The relationship between the two types of environmental education settings will also be explored, including collaboration, and students will be designing and teaching environmental education curriculum base on the North American Association for Environmental education's "Excellence in Environmental Education-Guidelines for Learning". This course will include a practicum experience. PREREQUISITE: EDUC/ENVR Studies majors/minors, or permission from instructor.

ENGLISH

ENGL 130-01A: Reading Fiction: Growing up in Literature Ozzie Mayers

Cross-listed with HONR 250

The "Bildungsroman," the novel of human development, traditionally traces the growth of a young person usually from adolescence to maturity. In this course, you will examine the evolution of this genre from its German origins through its manifestations in contemporary times, keeping in mind the essential influences on human growth: ethnicity, race, gender, sexualities, and class. By analyzing examples of the "Bildungsroman" by both women and men from various centuries, countries, and classes, we will expand and modify the traditional definition of this genre so that the very patterns of what constitutes growth will be understood contextually. This will provide you with the means whereby to know the drama of human development for others but ultimately for what these dramas tell you about your own development. Thus, you will not just read, discuss, and analyze these novels, but you will also explore your own patterns of growth. "Growing Up in Literature" will provide you with ample opportunities to discuss these novels as fictions and as realities of human development. The novels for this course are:

- The Samurai's Garden by Gail Tsukiyama
- The Bluest Eye Toni Morrison
- Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man by James Joyce
- Annie John by Jamaica Kincaid
- Villette Charlotte Bronte
- . A Boy's Own Story by Edmund White
- · Nectar in a Sieve by Kamala Markandaya
- The Dark Child Camara Laye
- Sons and Lovers by D. H. Lawrence
- The Catcher in the Rye by J. D. Salinger

ENGL 346: US Literature to 1865: Pirates, Puritans, and the Origins of the American Economy Steven Thomas

Almost everyone has seen the popular *Pirates of the Caribbean* movies, but where did these pirate stories come from? Would it surprise you to learn that the rigidly religious Puritans in New England sometimes did business with the anarchic pirates? The colonial period of America was a chaotic and strange moment in world history, but it is also a foundational moment. It was then that three of the most significant documents for American culture and economics were written: the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution, and Adam Smith's *Wealth of Nations*. In this class, we will read one of the earliest pirate stories, the classic novel *Robinson Crusoe*, debates among Puritans about the morality of slavery and the nature of money, poems about the business of tobacco, the famous autobiographies of Benjamin Franklin and Olaudah Equiano, and the writings of Thomas Jefferson as well as some of Adam Smith's classic work on economics. This course is intended to be of general interest not only to English majors but also to majors in Economics, History, Political Science, and Business.

ENGL 367-01A: Studies in Contemporary Literature Mara Faulkner

Powerful forces are changing both the content of literature and the physical form in which it comes to readers. Some of those forces are technology, environmental concerns, forced migrations, new or retooled ways of reading, readers' expectations, and human creativity, which refuses to be hemmed in or pushed around.

Of course, authors continue to write the kinds of literature we're all familiar with—novels, short stories, poetry, memoir—and we will read a fair number of those authors, primarily from the United States. But other forms are becoming increasingly popular with writers and reads—graphic novels, creative nonfiction and other hybrid forms, hypertext fiction, and even graffiti. We will read/look at a couple of graphic novels and explore the other forms in a variety of ways.

Your work for the class will include lots of reading/looking and engaged discussion. During the first half of the semester, you will complete and present an intensely focused research project on a contemporary author or a new literary development. During the second half of the semester, each of you will try your hand at creating a graphic novel, a hypertext (or mock hypertext) short story, or one of the forms that are new, or at least new to you. Or maybe you will invent a form no one else has thought of. There will be a mid-term and a final exam.

I will choose books in the next few months and will be glad to send the list to people who sign up for the class.

ENGL 369: Literature and Theory of the Caribbean Steven Thomas

Bob Marley is considered all over the world to be one of the greatest pop musicians, but of course there is a lot more to the Caribbean than reggae, rum, and relaxing warm weather. There have been hundreds of Caribbean novelists, essayists, scholars, and poets such as the world-renowned Jamaica Kincaid, Derek Wolcott, José Martí, Jean Rhys, Kamau Brathwaite, V.S. Naipaul, Aimé Césaire, Frantz Fanon, C. L. R. James, and Edwidge Danticat. The goal of this class is to gain a sense of 20th century Caribbean literature's development in its historical context. We will enjoy some of the modern classics of literature, literary criticism, political philosophy, history, and film from Jamaica, the Bahamas, Barbados, Trinidad, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Guadeloupe, Martinique, and – most importantly considering the recent earthquake tragedy – Haiti

ENGL 381: Literature by Women: African, Asian, and Caribbean *Madhu Mitra*

This course introduces students to a variety of works by contemporary writers from Africa, the Middle East, the Caribbean, and South Asia. A major objective of the course is to examine how different cultures, at specific historical moments, and under definite material conditions, define what it means to be a woman. Mainly through novels, but supplemented by poetry, essays, and memoirs, we will explore the ways in which women writers have articulated a female subjectivity, challenged or re-inscribed societal and familial roles, responded to political and cultural pressures, and formulated a literary and feminist aesthetic.

ENGL 385C: Studies in Literature: South Asia: Modern India through Literature and Film Madhu Mitra

This course offers an introduction—through literature and film—to the historical and social forces that have shaped modern India. We will examine the ways in which Indian writers and filmmakers have represented the anti-colonial nationalist movements, the struggle for independence, the partition of the subcontinent, religious strife, women's rights, and indigenous peoples' rights. We will also examine the complex and intersecting forces of religion, class,

caste, etc. which permeate the social and political fabric of the country.

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES ENVR 100A: The Nutritious Garden

Bernadette Elhard

This section of ENVR 100 is part of the new "Hands-On-The-Land" series of experiential learning courses offered by the Environmental Studies Department with the assistance of the St. John's Arboretum and faculty from several other departments. This first course will be offered by Profs. Bernadete Elhard and Romona Robinson-O'Brien of the Nutrition Department.

Want to eat green? Lower your carbon foot print with your food choices? Ever wonder what is whole food? How can you plant a garden to increase your nutritional status? This course will provide students with practical approaches to these issues by teaching them about growing their own food and safely preserving it. The course will combine lecture, discussion, readings and field trips to examine the relationship between the science of Nutrition, gardening and food preservation. Students will learn about garden planning from a nutritional and geographical perspective. Food preservation technology will be combined with culinary preparation technique to create appealing food from a taste, texture and visual perspective. Students will apply food preservation and

food preparation knowledge previously discussed in the course by preserving locally grown foods in the food science laboratory.

No prerequisites are required for this course.

A laboratory fee of \$10.00 will be charged to cover the cost of food and supplies for the food preservation lab.

ENVR 100C: Hand-Papermaking in the Arboretum Scott Murphy & Rachel Melis

This section of ENVR 100 is part of the new "Hands-On-The-Land" series of experiential learning courses offered by the Environmental Studies Department with the assistance of the St. John's Arboretum and faculty from several other departments. This course will introduce the history, methods and science of natural papermaking via the process of making paper by hand. Students will learn to identify and gather plants in the St. John's Arboretum suitable for making paper, then explore ways to break down the plants and reform the fibers into a variety of handmade papers involving creative fiber combinations unique to the CSBSJU environment. The course will include readings on papermaking's thousand-year history and will explore the contemporary uses of plant-based handmade paper. Discussion will include the environmental ramifications of using various types of plants found in the region. Instructors: Scott Murphy & Rachel Melis from the Art Department. Prerequisites: none; open to all majors.

ENVR 225: Food, Gender, Globalization and the Environment Diane Veale Jones

In this course, we examine the environmental, economical, and social equity issues of food, production, processing, distribution and consumption. We explore the journey of food from the field to our table. To map successfully this journey we analyze women's and men's roles, historically and currently, in food production; examine different approaches to food sustainability and environmental sustainability; and delve into politics of food regulation.

ENVR 300F: Environmental Geology Larry Davis

The objectives of this course are for the student to develop a more in-depth understanding about human interactions with the natural environment and to explore everyday problems with our environment and global community from a geological perspective.

- Develop a greater self-awareness of your personal role regarding environmental issues;
- Develop an increased awareness of environmental issues and how they affect society;
- Gain an understanding of the interactions between humans and geological processes; and
- Develop an understanding of past, present, and future environmental issues and how they affect the Earth and our society.

ENVR 300G: Science of Global Climate Change Troy Knight

Is Earth's climate rapidly changing, and if so, what is causing it? Heated ideological debates and images of imminent environmental catastrophe generated by the issue of climate change often obscure the scientific foundation upon which it rests. In this course students will gain a basic understanding of the interdisciplinary science behind climate change and its impacts. Following an introduction to the climate system, we will explore Earth's climatic history and how we know about this history, the drivers of climate change past and present, and the impact of climate change and stability on human societies in the past, present and future. Labs will focus on furthering understanding of climatic processes, methods in paleoclimatology, and the use of models in climate science.

ENVR 300I: Environmental Anthropology Jessica O'Reilly

Cross-listed with SOCI 337D

This course examines the relationships between human cultures and the environments that they inhabit. We will engage with the ways in which environments are collusions of human knowledge, perspective, histories, and economic and other cultural systems. Many of the course texts grapple with environmental management systems throughout the world, and ways that people plan for, participate in, subvert, and are affected by environment management schemes. Furthermore, this course also emphasizes the ways in which people shape knowledge about the environment and environmental management through historical vantages as well as Western science, particularly conservation biology and ecology.

The first several weeks of the course focus on contemporary and classic themes in environmental anthropology, providing a toolkit of ethnographic theories on the environment. What ideas have anthropologists contributed to general understanding about how people live in and think about their environments? How have anthropological perspectives on the environment changed over time? The second half of the course involves reading contemporary ethnographic case studies that address environmental issues within specific

themes. For this portion of the course, we will perform close readings of ethnographies for several reasons: 1) to be able to understand all components of each author's arguments, 2) to compare these ideas with others, and 3) to articulate how each ethnography is situated within the theories presented in the first half of the course.

<u>PREREQUISITE</u>: Any <u>one</u> of the following: SOCI 111 or 121, PSYC 111, ECON 111, POLS 111 or 121, PCST 111, or Permission of Instructor.

ENVR 310: Environmental Geography Jean Lavigne

Case-study based and issue-oriented approach to understanding relationships between societies and their environments from a geographical perspective. Centered on exploring how humans around the world have modified their environments, and how societies respond to environmental change. Examining these processes includes exploring the current and historical roles played by social and cultural institutions, by political and economic systems, and by forces such as development and globalization.

ENVR 311: Introduction to Geographic Information Systems

Geographic Information Systems are combinations of data management and mapping software that allow users (such as city and state governments) to organize, query, and map multiple forms of spatial data. Data can include road networks, lakes and streams, vegetation or soil types, land use, property ownership, zoning codes, elevations, census tract data, and so on. In this class, students will learn how these systems work and will produce a series of maps, some from existing data and others from new data collected during the course with global positioning systems (GPS). In order to do this successfully, students will learn spatial analysis techniques, some principles of cartography, and will consider the ethical and social justice implications of the use of GIS and GPS technologies.

ENVR 335: Environmental Education Pedagogy Karen Bengtson

Cross-listed with EDUC 335

This course is designed for individuals that are planning on teaching in the field of environmental education in formal classroom settings and/or interpretive settings, such as environmental learning centers. Some of the issues that will be explored are the incorporation of environmental education in standards based settings, the dichotomy of advocacy versus education, and the history, trends and best practices of environmental education. The relationship between the two types of environmental education settings will also be explored, including collaboration, and students will be designing and teaching environmental education curriculum base on the North American Association for Environmental education's "Excellence in Environmental Education-Guidelines for Learning". This course will include a practicum experience.

<u>PREREQUISITE</u>: EDUC/ENVR Studies majors/minors, or permission from instructor.

ETHICS

ETHS 390-01A: Moral Value & Law

Tim Robinson

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law.

ETHS 390-02A: Fragility of Goodness Margaret Cook

We all want to believe that we can take some credit for our own good character, and that our good character will survive whatever life throws at us. Yet good people do not always do the right thing. Martha Nussbaum, in *The Fragility of Goodness*, argues that luck has a great deal to do with character, and that human beings can suffer experiences that break their character so that they are incapable of goodness. On the other hand, Philip Zimbardo, in *The Lucifer Effect*, argues that the notorious Stanford Prison Experiment shows that good people can be seduced or induced by situational forces to commit evil acts. We will look at moral crises in literature and films to see whether we think we can find a way to be good people no matter what happens to us. Possible readings include the Greek tragedies Antigone and Hecuba, Jonathan Shay's *Achilles in Vietnam* together with Homer's *Iliad*, Tim O'Brien's *In the Lake of the Woods*, Elie Wiesel's *Night*, Toni Morrison's *Beloved*, and the films "Atonement," "Dead Man Walking," "Sophie's Choice," "Shindler's List," and "Life is Beautiful." Be prepared to spend at least 5 evenings during the semester watching films.

ETHS 390-03A: Happiness Is..... Rodger Narloch

When people are asked what they want in life, a common response is that they just want to be happy. But what does happiness mean and how does one attain it? In this course, we will address how one could conceive of happiness in a way that is independent of others. However, we will transition to addressing the question of how an individual's happiness relates to the happiness of others (and which others)? Next we will talk about different ways of being morally good and how we decide among them in choosing a vocation in life. Finally, we will discuss if happiness is promoted through engagement with the modern world or detachment from it. These topics will be covered through class discussion based on significant amounts of writing in response to readings from philosophical, psychological, as well as Catholic and Benedictine perspectives.

ETHS 390-04A: Moral Value & Law Tim Robinson

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? ETHS 390-05A: Reading for Life *Anthony Cunningham*

ETHS 390-06A: Reading for Life Anthony Cunningham

ETHS 390-07A: Sex, Death & Ethics Scott Johnson

Most students enjoy talking about sex (outside of class), haven't thought much yet about death, and are rather upset that a course on ethics is even required. Since the first seems amusing and the second far away, this class might seem like a pleasant way to satisfy an onerous requirement. So admit it, you just read this description because of the title. And you think since it meets once a week on a Wednesday night, it shouldn't interfere too much with the rest of your week. Be warned, however, this is a real class with difficult readings as well as a final paper graded on both style and content. It requires regular attendance, active participation, and weekly reflection on the reading.

This course will consider Sex, Death, and Ethics, consistent with the guidelines for Ethics Common Seminar. Abortion is only one area where the three interrelate. But isn't there really only one answer to the question of abortion? Why should a pro-choice president be allowed to speak at a pro-life university? Can abortion be discussed at the dinner table or in a classroom without parents becoming worried and suspicious? If we don't talk about abortion somewhere, how will we know that our moral judgments are consciously elected and defensibly maintained? And if we can't talk about this subject, how can we claim to account for a variety of other moral views which easily compare with ours on abortion?

There is more to Sex, Death, and Ethics than simply abortion. We will investigate euthanasia, AIDS, stripping, prostitution, and promiscuity. We will read plays as well as textbooks, memoirs, and some short fiction. You will need to watch several films outside of class. We will ask more questions than we will answer, but we will also develop our critical thinking skills with essentially contested concepts. There are no preconceived answers to the questions we will ask. Our task, properly stated, is to learn how to ask and assess those questions which may turn out to have uncertain answers. Ethics is the study of how we should live, and questions about these topics are vitally important. This is a difficult class that will repay your investment.

ETHS 390-08A: The Ethics of Immigration Policy Richard Albares

This course will examine recent debates in the United States about immigration policy, giving special attention to the vocabularies and logics of right and wrong that are employed. So for example, do people who can't make a decent living in their native lands have a basic "human right" to leave home and seek a better life in a more affluent society like the United States? Or is there no such thing as a human right to migrate, but only the right of citizens to decide who should be allowed to cross their borders and become new members of their national community? Is "rights talk" the only useful way of deliberating about immigration and its regulation? One attractive alternative is the utilitarian approach, which seeks that one policy which will generate the most benefits for the greatest number of people at the lowest possible cost. But as we will see, assessing the costs and benefits of past immigration policy is no easy task. Predicting future costs and benefits has no exact science to guide it. True, we know many things now thanks to social scientific research, and only a fool would ignore the best available evidence, but the best available is never quite good enough. By the same token, only a fool would prefer the weaker to the stronger argument, but no argument is ever final — as the long and indecisive history of philosophy itself bears testimony. With conceptual clarity so hard to come by and so few empirical certainties to guide our decisions, the "practical wisdom" of citizens and leaders becomes all-important. So we will end with a conversation about what it means "to be wise" in matters of public policy in general and immigration policy in particular.

ETHS 390-09A: Justice in the Twenty-First Century Dan Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice, and few are as controversial. This course will examine in detail six different understandings of justice, each of which is a rival to the others in debates about justice in the twenty-first century. Students will be reading two novels, and six philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale.

ETHS 390-10A: Happiness Is..... Rodger Narloch

When people are asked what they want in life, a common response is that they just want to be happy. But what does happiness mean and how does one attain it? In this course, we will address how one could conceive of happiness in a way that is independent of others. However, we will transition to addressing the question of how an individual's happiness relates to the happiness of others (and which others)? GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES

GWST 360A: Colonial Violence and the Mother-Daughter Relationship

This course considers how the figure of the mother in colonial contexts is depicted and imagined from the perspective of the daughter. After a brief introduction of women's autobiographical writings and psychoanalytic theories of motherhood by Irigaray, Kristeva and Klein, we explore a number of guestions: do the daughter's views differ depending on whether she belongs to the race of the colonizer or the colonized? Do any discrepancies exist in the daughter's mind between the representation of the mother and the idea of nation? How do heterosexual and/or interracial relationships complicate her relationship with the mother? How does sexual victimization of the daughter affect all of these? Readings include works by Kyoko Hayashi, Takako Takahashi, Taeko Kono, Hiromi Ito, Marguerite Duras, a Filipina ex-comfort woman Maria Rosa Henson, bell hooks, Toni Morrison, and Doris Lessing.

HISPANIC STUDIES

HISP 355C: The Legacy of Memory and Testimony in Post-dictatorship **Latin America**

Eleonora Bertranou

This course covers the experience of political violence in Argentina, Chile and Uruguay during the military dictatorships of the 1970's and 1980's. Through a wide range of literature on storytelling and testimony as well as poetry, fiction, memoirs and letters this seminar examines the (re) constructions of the past and memory in relation to political identity and resistance. Analysis will focus on the contrasting stories of different nationals, men and women, militant and non-militant victims of state terrorism, exiles and political prisoners. Readings will include established authors like Juan Gelman, Luisa Valenzuela, Ariel Dorfman, Liliana Hecker, Hernán Valdés, Miguel Bonasso as well as memoirs and collective pieces by prisoners and victims such as Nosotras, presas políticas; Chacabuco y otros centros de detención; Oblivion: and Memorias del calabozo.

HISP 356B: Spanish in Contact with other Languages Tania Gomez

The goal of this seminar is to study the influence of other languages in contact with (African creoles, indigenous languages, other languages such as Catalan and Gallego) and to determine the outcomes of this phenomenon. We will examine a wide range of language contact phenomena from both general linguistic and sociolinguistic perspectives, and survey current approaches to all of the major types of contact-induced change. We will consider both the linguistic and social aspects of the contact situation and how they affect the outcomes, with special attention to the general processes and principles that are at work in all cases of language contact. Students are encouraged to read omnivorously, in areas such as history, demographics, musicology, folklore, sociology, narrative and drama, as well as traditional linguistic studies, in designing their own pathways into dialect diversification. All the discussions will be conducted in Spanish.

HISTORY

HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium: Reel History

Cynthia Curran

Historians and historical filmmakers share a common methodology: both generally select and evaluate facts from various sources in order to interpret events from the past. Although traditionally historians have relied on written material such as newspapers and diaries to reflect the society that produced them, filmmakers manipulate images with the same goal. Written works of history and historical films both reflect flawed and biased views of the past; each type of interpretation presents just as much about the concerns of the age in which they were created as they do about the past.

This course is not a history of film but rather an investigation of film as historical source. Students will address such issues as the legitimate use of film in historical interpretation and will compare film and written sources in creating an understanding of the past. Students will also develop criteria for the critical evaluation of historical films.

HIST 395: Historiography and Methods: History, Identity, and Public Memory Julie Davis

In this course we'll explore how communities, societies, and nations have translated their histories into public representations of the past, and reflect on why these representations are so powerful and so important to understand. What gets included in the public version of the past? What is excluded or forgotten? Why does this happen, and what are the consequences? We'll consider how public interpretations of history shape collective memory and define a sense of common identity. The course will explore these dynamics in the United States as well as in other countries, including Ireland and New Zealand.

HONORS

HONR 210C: Paleobiology of Dinosauria Larry Davis

Cross-listed with GEOL 214

Dinosaurs, meaning 'fearfully great lizards', is a name which invokes both the concept of great success and utter failure. Dinosaurs were first recognized in the mid-19th century and are among the best known animals in the fossil record. Beginning with just one species among many very unusual Triassic age (240 million years ago) reptiles, the dinosaurs were to become the dominant group of land animals for nearly 130 million years. Dinosaurian diversity is incredible: from tiny feathered hunters to mighty predators; horned, spiked, and duckbilled herbivores; and the largest land animals of all time. From this great diversity arose the birds, the only surviving lineage of Dinosauria. How can we understand the biology of dinosaurs, given that no human has ever seen a dinosaur? How can we determine their diets, their speed of travel, their physiology, their behavior? In this course we will explore what we know about Dinosaurs. Even more importantly, we will examine how we know what we know. Most of the laboratory portion of this course will examine the question – 'Are birds dinosaurs?'

HONR 240A: The Biblical Tradition Vincent Smiles

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures, such as creation, covenant, kingdom, prophets, gospel and New Testament letters. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to the Biblical languages, especially Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

HONR 250A: Reading Fiction: Growing up in Literature Ozzie Mayers

Cross-listed with HONR 250A

The "Bildungsroman," the novel of human development, traditionally traces the growth of a young person usually from adolescence to maturity. In this course, you will examine the evolution of this genre from its German origins through its manifestations in contemporary times, keeping in mind the essential influences on human growth: ethnicity, race, gender, sexualities, and class. By analyzing examples of the "Bildungsroman" by both women and men from various centuries, countries, and classes, we will expand and modify the traditional definition of this genre so that the very patterns of what constitutes growth will be understood contextually. This will provide you with the means whereby to know the drama of human development for others but ultimately for what these dramas tell you about your own development. Thus, you will not just read, discuss, and analyze these novels, but you will also explore your own patterns of growth. "Growing Up in Literature" will provide you with ample opportunities to discuss these novels as fictions and as realities of human development. The novels for this course are:

- The Samurai's Garden by Gail Tsukiyama
- The Bluest Eye Toni Morrison
- Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man by James Joyce
- Annie John by Jamaica Kincaid
- Villette Charlotte Bronte
- A Boy's Own Story by Edmund White
- Nectar in a Sieve by Kamala Markandaya
- The Dark Child Camara Laye
- Sons and Lovers by D. H. Lawrence
- The Catcher in the Rye by J. D. Salinger

HONR 250H: Persuasion in Society Terry Check

The primary goal of the course is to empower students to think critically about persuasive messages in society. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify the features of a rhetorical message, describe the context in which it was given, apply communication theories in analyzing the message, be able to use analytical tools in making an argument about a message, and be able to evaluate the effectiveness and consequences of a message. Students will also learn how to create effective messages through proficiency in writing, research, and oral communication skills. Students will study some of the classic addresses of prominent public figures to learn how they responded to challenging rhetorical situations. Students will also examine a wide range of persuasive texts (speeches, statements, advertisements, videos, etc.) and issues (political, social, etc.) from a variety of speakers (politicians, entertainers, athletes, companies, etc.) to learn how persuasion is used in contemporary society.

HONR 310: Great Books/Ideas Dennis Beach

This is a year-long discussion-based seminar that concentrates of some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Ovid, Sophocles, Tolstoy, Dostoevsky, Dickens, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, García Márquez, Camus, Eliot, Faulkner, Nietzsche, Homer, Kafka, Flaubert, Stendhal, Dinesen, O'Connor, Plato, Saramago, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to junior and senior honors students who will complete the entire year, but sophomores may apply. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of works during the summer. Philosophy majors may substitute one semester for an elective towards the Philosophy major if an appropriate topic is arranged for the major writing project.

HONR 325B: Intercultural Communication Jeanmarie Cook

An examination of the relationship between communication and culture. Communication theory is used to identify and explore barriers and opportunities in communicating with individuals from different cultures and cocultures. Skills necessary for communication across cultures are identified

and developed. Topics covered include worldview, ethnocentrism, perception, language, nonverbal cues, gender, sexual orientation, power, multi-cultural identities, educational systems, approaches to health and healing, culture shock and acculturation, intercultural competence, and intercultural ethics.

HONR 340H: Reading Biblical Women Karen Erickson

An exploration of the Bible as sacred text, cultural document and literary masterpiece, with special attention to the women of scripture. In addition to close readings of texts such as Genesis, Exodus, The Song of Songs, the Gospels and Revelation, class members will become acquainted with a range of techniques of biblical and literary analysis, from historical and textual criticism to mysticism and feminist theory. In the final unit of the course, students will explore, as interpreters and creators, artistic responses to scripture (the study or creation of translation, stained-glass, theatre, poetry, mystical writings, prose fiction, etc., based on the biblical text).

HONR 350J: Undertold Stories and Global Perspectives Frederick de Sam Lazaro

Cross-listed with COMM 383G

This course aims to shape an intellectual community centered on ethical thinking on global issues of our times, with emphasis on bringing home the relevance of these issues in our students' lives. Special attention will be paid to issues, stories and places that are underreported in the mass media—especially issues related to gender equity—since these form the portfolio of the instructors' day job. Through class discussions, regular visits to the UTS website (undertoldstories.org) and their vicarious connection to working journalists, students gain media literacy at a critical time of transition in the business of mass media and information

HONR 350L: Reading Biblical Women Karen Erickson

An exploration of the Bible as sacred text, cultural document and literary masterpiece, with special attention to the women of scripture. In addition to close readings of texts such as Genesis, Exodus, The Song of Songs, the Gospels and Revelation, class members will become acquainted with a range of techniques of biblical and literary analysis, from historical and textual criticism to mysticism and feminist theory. In the final unit of the course, students will explore, as interpreters and creators, artistic responses to scripture (the study or creation of translation, stained-glass, theatre, poetry, mystical writings, prose fiction, etc., based on the biblical text).

HONR 390: Honors Ethics Seminar: The Medical Professional in the Modern World Jeff Anderson

The word "professional" today connotes an individual with well-developed skills, specialized knowledge, and expertise, who conforms to the standards of a profession. The original meaning of "professional" as one who "makes a profession of faith" in the face of demanding circumstances has been all but lost in the medical profession. This class will use the burgeoning literature of medicine, written by, for, and about medical professionals, in order to explore the full range of "professional" challenges facing today's medical professionals.

The practice of medicine is rife with ethical dilemmas. By exploring the efforts of medical professionals to counter the institutional forces that constrain them and to find their own solid ground to stand upon, this course aims to cultivate the habit of moral reflection in future medical professionals. Although this course will primarily focus on the experiences of medical doctors, it should also be of interest to those aspiring to other medical and non-medical careers.

MANAGEMENT

MGMT 305E: Product & Brand Marketing

Product and brand marketing has become a critical activity in today's organizations. Originally found only in large consumer packaged goods companies, a wide variety of companies (service, non-profit, business-to-business marketers) have organizations devoted to marketing the company's brands and products. Today almost 25% of sales and marketing jobs are involved in this critical function. This course examines all of the key aspects of marketing a brand, a product line, and an individual product.

MATHEMATICS

MATH 114-01A: Math Exploration

James Johnson

The class will focus on statistical ideas and statistical reasoning and on their relevance to public policy and to the human sciences from medicine to sociology. The course will be taught verbally rather than algebraically via discussion and examples. Several hands on experiments illustrating statistical concepts will be done in class to improve the student's ability to reason effectively about data and chance in everyday life.

MATH 114-02A & 03A: Math Exploration **David Hartz**

The aim of the course is to teach you some mathematics and I hope you will have a fun time learning it. The class will cover a variety of areas of mathematics and uses of mathematics that are different from the areas and uses that you are familiar with. Applications may include topics in Management science, voting theory, the relationship between art and mathematics, and identification and data security.

MATH 127: Number Systems Marilyn Creed

Topics to include sets, functions, other number bases, elementary number theory, rational and irrational numbers and problem solving strategies related

MATH 340: Topic: Computational Number Theory and Cryptography David Hartz

This course will be based on two major questions about the natural numbers: How do we determine whether a number is prime and if it isn't, how do we find its factors? We learned how to do this in grade school but those techniques only work well for relatively small numbers. In this class we will look at techniques that can be used to answer these questions for very large numbers. These questions have become important in recent years as the need for cryptography and data security mushroomed.

In order to examine these questions, we will cover the basic ideas of number theory: congruences, primitive roots, quadratic residues, and continued fractions as well as the techniques of primality testing and factoring. We will also cover some basics of cryptography and how different areas of number theory can be used for security.

PREREQUISITE: Math 239

MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

FREN 354: Thème et Version

Ned Dubin

A speculative investigation into how the different ways in which English and French speakers view the world are a result and/or reflection of the syntax. idioms and style of the languages. Our principal tool will be translation: version (from a foreign language into one's native tongue), thème (the reverse), and a comparison of the work of professional English/French translators, with one day of the cycle devoted to each type of exercise. Take-home final exam.

GERM 356A: German Music & It's Texts Mark Thamert

This mini-course will treat some of the all-time favorite works of German music, including texts set to music by Mozart, Beethoven, Clara and Robert Schumann, and Schubert. Deutsche Lieder from the era of Romanticism, Short opera scenes, and more modern protest and popular music will be at the heart of our listening and classroom discussions.

GERM 357B: Seminar: The Holocaust, It's Origins & Effects Andreas Kiryakakis

The collapse of 1945 leaves a physical and spiritual vacuum in Germany. The lost generation of young German writers who emerge from the rubble desperately try to come to terms with the Nazi past and establish new values in order to combat the inner chaos. The creation of the Gruppe 47 is their early attempt to salvage and maintaining positive values. They do this to distance themselves from the tradition associated with a totalitarian regime. Initially they are anticlerical and filled with social consciousness. Very soon, however, it changes to a loosely-knit society of writers, primarily interested in the quality and originality of their writings. Though their status is unofficial, it gives rise to the best know writers of a new Germany.

This course examines the consequences of the WW II upon the German mind as reflected in literature, film and the media. The difficult historical, moral, and artistic legacies of the Holocaust for Germany after 1945 will be central to this probe. We will look at the issue of remembrance and its victims, asking: where Germans casualties, perpetrators, or both? Can a new German state overcome the historical image associated with the holocaust? What's the difference between guilt and responsibility and how does it affect future generations? And how have discussions changed over the past decades?

GREK 332A: Herodotus Margaret Cook

Herodotus of Halicarnassus, the "Father of History," was the first historian in human civilization, invented this new discipline as he went along, and didn't know that history is supposed to be boring! In fact, the Greek word historia is the origin not only of English "history" but also of "story." We will read all of Herodotus's history of the war between the Greeks and the Persians in translation, and as much of it in Greek as we can get through in a semester.

MCLT 221: Golden Age of Athens Margaret Cook & Scott Richardson

Great works of Greek literature, history, and philosophy from the 5th and early 4th centuries B.C., one of the most remarkable periods of intellectual, artistic, and political activity. Authors read include Aeschylus, Sophocles, Euripides, Herodotus, Thucydides, Aristophanes, and Plato. All works read in

MCLT 319B: Radical Fantasies: Contemporary Japanese Women Writers Yuko Shibata

This course introduces entertainment novels, comics, and films created by Japanese female writers and directors since the 1970's. Postwar economic development made it possible for young talented women to go into a variety of cultural fields and become successful. We examine how these contemporary female creators have come to terms with issues of gender, sexuality, race, class, and nation as well as how their products have intersected the changing phases of economic conditions. Their works have created new businesses, not only in Japan but also in the broader Asian market, by being combined with thriving local entertainment industries. We also consider what these phenomena signify, especially when the images of the West, Asia, the US and Japan are diversely reflected in these works.

PEACE STUDIES

PCST 301: Social Services Grant Writing

Kerby Plante

Cross-listed with SWRK 301

This course is designed to teach the mechanics of successful grant writing. It addresses the full continuum of the grant writing process from defining the grant idea, identifying grant sources, and writing and submitting the grant application. Emphasizes skill development in the areas of writing and submitting a grant application, public speaking skills, and ethical issues. Students need to be at least Junior standing to register for this course. Course will meet once per cycle.

PCST 345A: Aesthetics, Violence & Non-Violence Rene McGraw

Cross-listed with PHIL 356

We all seem fixed in what seems real to us in our world. Is it possible for art-music, literature, sculpture, painting, photography, cinema-to shift our gaze, to see what we have not before seen? Even if art shifts our gaze, can it have a lasting effect on the way that we live in a world of conflict? PCST 368E: Justice, Peace & Reconciliation Ron Pagnucco

Cross-listed with THEO 349D

From the Book of Exodus to the Hebrew prophets and the New Testament, one finds the utopian vision of a just, peaceful and reconciled world, summarized in the biblical term "shalom." Through the study of biblical texts and contemporary writings, we will explore the Judeo-Christian tradition's vision of justice, peace and reconciliation. Through the analysis of case studies we will explore how individuals, organizations and communities in the tradition are working to bring about shalom in various parts of the world through such means as nonviolent action, the defense of human rights, methods to conflict resolution and transformation, and efforts for peacebuilding and reconciliation.

PHILOSOPHY

PHIL 356: Aesthetics, Violence & Non-Violence Rene McGraw

Cross-listed with PCST 345A

We all seem fixed in what seems real to us in our world. Is it possible for art-music, literature, sculpture, painting, photography, cinema-to shift our gaze, to see what we have not before seen? Even if art shifts our gaze, can it have a lasting effect on the way that we live in a world of conflict? Does art look to make people change their lives or only to let us see what we have not before seen? Or is it mainly concerned to prevent us from forgetting what we have once seen? Are the arts able to help us live more peacefully in a world of violence? The philosophical text for this course will be mainly Martin Heidegger's Origin of the Work of Art. PHIL 368J: Happiness & Morality Daniel Farnham

What is happiness? What makes for a good life? What is the relation between my being happy and my being morally virtuous? Is happiness up to us, or is it something we need help from others, or from God, to achieve? In this course we will examine different views about the nature of happiness and its relation to morality in order to develop our own views on these topics. Some of the thinkers we will study will be Plato, Aristotle, Epicurus, the Stoics, Christian philosophers, Nietzsche, Buddhists, and contemporary philosophers and psychologists.

PHYSICS

PHYS 281: Problem Solving

Lynn Ziegler

Cross-listed with CSCI 281

An introduction to solving complex problems in interdisciplinary topics which will be drawn from mathematics, computer science, and physics. Students will work in groups and present their results. Prerequisite: Math 120 and admission to MAPCORES program or consent of instructor.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

POLS 350B: American Political Thought & Contemporary Policy Applications

James Read

This newly-offered topics course will explore how key ideas in the history of American political thought have been translated into practice, both in the United States and elsewhere in the world. For example, we will examine how the Bush Administration used (or some would argue, abused) the arguments for executive power in the Federalist Papers and the speeches and actions of Abraham Lincoln to argue for sweeping presidential powers in the wake of the September 11, 2001 attacks. We will examine some of the political theories that have shaped the policies of presidents, including Clinton and Obama. We will compare the formation of a new federal constitution for the United States in 1787 with contemporary attempts to draft an acceptable constitution for the European Union. The course as a whole will emphasize the fact that political ideas have policy consequences, sometimes immediately in their own time, sometimes in contexts far removed in place and time.

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 309B: Psychology & Law

Aubrey Immelman

The general aim of this course is to learn about psychological knowledge as it applies to law. The course offers an overview of contemporary psychological theories, research, principles, concepts, and practices pertinent to the legal system. Although students will gain an appreciation for the culture and traditions of law, this is *not* a law course. The emphasis is on human behavior and mental processes and the interaction of psychology with the legal and criminal justice systems.

Specific topics include psychological assessment and testing in the context of criminal justice and the law; psychology and the courts; mental health law (competencies, criminal responsibility, civil commitment); the psychology of the jury (procedural considerations and jury decision making); the psychology of evidence (eyewitness testimony, the polygraph, hypnosis, facial composites, profiling, pretrial publicity); correctional psychology; family law; juvenile delinquency and justice; criminal behavior; and the psychology of law enforcement. PREREQUISITE: PSYC 111 and either PSYC 350 or 381

PSYC 309F: Animal Minds

Beniamin Faber

This class will attempt to look inside the minds of animals. It's an interesting, fun, and constantly changing field that is very accessible. We will explore issues focusing on Animal Cognition, Consciousness, Emotion, and Morality; constantly looking across species lines for commonalities and differences. The psychological capacities of human infants, children, and adults will be compared with widely varied species to understand not only how animals think, but also what makes us different. We will also discuss evolutionary theories and scientific methodologies used to explore varied minds. The course will involve a variety of readings from current journal articles, The Cognitive Animal, by Bekoff, Allen, and Burghart (ed), as well as films such as Inside the Animal Mind.

PREREQUISITE: PSYC 111

PSYC 393-01A: Personality Assessment & Profiling in Criminal Psychology

Aubrey Immelman

Psychology Seminar involves detailed consideration of a special topic and requires seminar participants to prepare and present a major paper. This section is designed to help senior psychology majors integrate diverse psychological concepts, principles, theories, and methods to the applied areas of criminal investigation.

The course will draw from several cognate areas of psychology, including the biological foundations of personality; perception and cognition; motivation and emotion; human development; personality psychology; psychopathology;

and social psychology.

Students will develop offender and victim psychological profiles in unsolved criminal cases.

PREREQUISITE: Senior standing and 20 credits in psychology.

PSYC 393-02A: Controversies and Ethical Issues in Psychology Bob Kachelski

In this reading-intensive, discussion-based course, we will examine a number of controversial topics within the field of psychology. The main objective of the course is to help psychology majors develop informed opinions on a variety of important issues that are currently being debated in the field. Participation in class discussions will be expected of all students and will constitute a significant portion of the course grade. In addition, students will write a major paper and present it to the group; they will also lead discussions and complete frequent short writing assignments.

Potential topics include the following: Is it ethical for psychologists to be involved in the interrogation of suspected terrorists? Should animal research in psychology be eliminated? To what degree is the diagnosis and treatment of psychological disorders influenced by drug companies? How well does evolutionary psychology explain human sex differences? What effect does media violence have on children? What is emotional intelligence and is it a useful construct? Do certain vaccines increase the chances that a child will develop autism? Does psychotherapy truly help people?

PREREQUISITE: Senior standing and 20 credits in psychology.

SOCIAL WORK

SWRK 301: Social Services Grant Writing

Kerby Plante

Cross-listed with PCST 301

This course is designed to teach the mechanics of successful grant writing. It addresses the full continuum of the grant writing process from defining the grant idea, identifying grant sources, and writing and submitting the grant application. Emphasizes skill development in the areas of writing and submitting a grant application, public speaking skills, and ethical issues. Students need to be at least Junior standing to register for this course. Course will meet once per cycle.

SOCIOLOGY

SOCI 121: Introduction to Anthropology Jessica O'Reilly

Anthropology, very broadly defined as the study of humankind, is essentially an interdisciplinary endeavor. Traditionally, anthropology is described as having four major fields of inquiry: cultural anthropology, physical anthropology, linguistic anthropology, and anthropological archaeology. More recently, a "fifth field" called applied anthropology has been included in the discipline.

This course introduces the four fields of anthropology, but instead of spending a few weeks learning about each field separately, we will instead focus on some of the key problems that the study of anthropology can help to describe and the ways in which anthropological understandings of such problems can help devise solutions. The course units include four-field examinations of culture, race, human evolution, family and kinship, gender and sexuality, social hierarchy, nation-states, politics and violence, progress, and development. Throughout this course, you will engage with materials from all fields of anthropology to 1) understand the approaches, methods, and key questions of each field, 2) analyze human problems across space and time, and 3) integrate interdisciplinary approaches to understand human diversity more completely.

SOCI 335: Sociology of Religion Christopher Scheitle

Why are some people more religious than others? Is society becoming less religious? Is religion beneficial or harmful for individuals or societies? Why do people choose to belong to a religious group that is very demanding, strict, or outside the norm? Why do people change religions? This course will explore classical and contemporary theory and research attempting to provide answers to these and similar questions. Through readings, written assignments, lectures, films and class discussions, students will gain insight into the structure and influence of religion at the individual, organizational and societal levels.

SOCI 337D: Environmental Anthropology Jessica O'Reilly

Cross-listed with ENVR 3001

This course examines the relationships between human cultures and the environments that they inhabit. We will engage with the ways in which environments are collusions of human knowledge, perspective, histories, and economic and other cultural systems. Many of the course texts grapple with environmental management systems throughout the world, and ways that people plan for, participate in, subvert, and are affected by environment management schemes. Furthermore, this course also emphasizes the ways in

which people shape knowledge about the environment and environmental management through historical vantages as well as Western science, particularly conservation biology and ecology.

The first several weeks of the course focus on contemporary and classic themes in environmental anthropology, providing a toolkit of ethnographic theories on the environment. What ideas have anthropologists contributed to general understanding about how people live in and think about their environments? How have anthropological perspectives on the environment changed over time? The second half of the course involves reading contemporary ethnographic case studies that address environmental issues within specific themes. For this portion of the course, we will perform close readings of ethnographies for several reasons: 1) to be able to understand all components of each author's arguments, 2) to compare these ideas with others, and 3) to articulate how each ethnography is situated within the theories presented in the first half of the course.

<u>PREREQUISITE</u>: Any <u>one</u> of the following: SOCI 111 or 121, PSYC 111, ECON 111, POLS 111 or 121, PCST 111, or Permission of Instructor.

SOCI 337E: Cultural Anthropology Jessica O'Reilly

This course explores cultural aspects of humanity by learning about an array of cultural groups, worldviews, and belief systems. We will learn about the diverse cultural forms that people have created to help understand themselves, their homes, their families, their food, and their relationships. We will be asking: how do people shape culture, and how are they shaped by it? Also: what can a nuanced analysis of human culture contribute to our understandings of contemporary problems? While the cultures we read about will be located primarily in non-Western states, we will also be analyzing our own cultures in comparison with others.

This course has three main components. First, we will learn about certain aspects of human culture—such as gender, conflict and consensus, religion, and so on. Second, we will engage with several ethnographies—films and book-length manuscripts that provide a detailed description of a cultural group—in their entirety. Third, students will be conducting their own ethnographic studies throughout the duration of the course, learning about ethnographic methods and ethics as well as project design.

<u>PREREQUISITE</u>: Any <u>one</u> of the following: SOCI 111 or 121, PSYC 111, ECON 111, POLS 111 or 121, PCST 111, or Permission of Instructor.

STUDY ABROAD COURSE DESCRIPTIONS GENERAL TO VARIOUS PROGRAMS: COLG 385: Study Abroad Seminar

Selected topics pertaining to the study abroad program site, with a significant emphasis on the local culture(s). Course content will include other site specific fields (history, art, economics, politics, biology, geology, music, etc.), depending upon the expertise of the program director. Excursions, field trips, volunteering and or interactions with local institutions and people will also be a part of the course experience.

MGMT 389: Study Abroad Experiential Learning

This course is designed for students participating in Study Abroad. Reading relevant to understanding business in the international environment will be assigned. Students will write a series of essays integrating their knowledge of theory with their personal observations and reactions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the impact of culture on business. The course will be taught by a professor at CSB/SJU using distance learning to maintain contact with students located in a variety of countries.

THEATER

THEA 218: Culture & Dramatic Literature: Readings in Gay & Lesbian Drama

Kaarin Johnston

In this course students will read and discuss modern or contemporary plays written by gay or lesbian playwrights which reflect the culture in which they live. Some playwrights include: Jane Chambers, Charles Ludlam, Mart Crowley and Paula Vogel.

THEA 260: Theater & Youth Kaarin Johnston

This participatory course focuses on using the art form of theater both as a pedagogical tool and as performance art. Creative Drama and TIE are practiced through experiential learning and students improve their leadership skills through teaching others. The course includes basic instruction on creating theatrical performances with child actors. Various forms of theater such as: puppetry, pantomime and improvisation are also addressed.

PREREQUISITE for Elementary Education majors: EDUC 107, 200

THEA 385C: Interactive Theater for Social Change Kaarin Johnston

Students work together using a variety of techniques to create open-ended scenarios which focus on specific issues involving cultural differences. They

are called "Interactive" because once the scenarios have been created and rehearsed, the student "collaborator/performers" are ready to interact with specific groups, in an apparently improvisational mode, focusing on specific areas of misunderstanding. There are several student groups at other institutions working from this model so we will also learn from their work. Our work will be tailored to the CSB/SJU communities. Texts may include Augusto Boal's *Theater of the Oppressed* and Paulo Freire's *Pedagogy of the Oppressed*. We will begin our work by interpreting the Interactive Theater Ethics Statement being written by a special task force of the national organization, American Theatre in Higher Education.

THEOLOGY

THEO 309B: Sexuality & Renunciation in Early Christianity Charles Bobertz

This course will investigate the theological and social construction of sexual expression and gender roles among various Christian groups from the first to the fifth century of the Common Era. We will focus on the reading and interpretation of primary texts, biblical and early Christian, with a twofold objective in view. First, to gain a better understanding of how theological and cultural considerations informed the early Christians' understanding of sexuality and gender; second, to explore the implications such understanding has for exploring contemporary attitudes toward sexuality and gender.

THEO 329A: Women's Theological Perspectives Anna Mercedes

This course introduces students to the critiques and alternative reconstructions that feminist/womanist/mujerista theologians present with respect to traditional Christian understandings of scripture, God, human personhood (including the body and sexuality), and the church using scriptural, historical, cultural, social, and spiritual approaches.

THEO 329B: Medieval Philosophy Tim Robinson

Cross-listed with PHIL 333

Philosophy in the West did not take a long nap after the ancient era. This course in medieval philosophy will investigate the period which began with Augustine and reached its culmination in 13th- and 14th-century Scholasticism, especially with Thomas Aquinas. It will investigate at least three major philosophers or schools of philosophy of that era.

THEO 339A: Discernment and Christian Decision Making Kathleen Langer

This course introduces participants to the teachings on discernment found within the Christian tradition. The topic of discernment will be considered both as a way of life and as a specific process for vocational decision-making. Participants will apply discernment principles in differing contexts through course assignments and class activities such as discussion of case studies and reflection on personal experiences.

THEO 349A: Family, Church, and Society Kari-Shane Zimmerman

Drawing on historical, sociological, and religious sources, this course introduces students to a range of perspectives concerning the intersection of family, church and society, focusing on issues such as cohabitation, marriage, divorce, homosexuality, and gender roles.

THEO 349D: Justice, Peace & Reconciliation Ron Pagnucco

Cross-listed with PCST 368E. See course description under PCST

THEO 349E: Economic Thought & Religious Values Daniel Finn

Cross-listed with ECON 327

An examination of how economic life has been viewed from the perspective of religion, particularly Western Christianity: from roots in the Hebrew and Christian scriptures, through the early church, middle ages and the Protestant Reformation, up to contemporary debates about free markets, Marxism, feminism and the social teaching of the Roman Catholic Church today. PREREQUISITE: ECON 111 & THEO 111

THEO 349G: Moral Vision of John Paul II Kari-Shane Davis

This course introduces students to the moral vision of Pope John Paul II (1920-2004), with a particular focus on the distinctions and connections between the human person (anthropology), the human family (sexuality), and human creativity (work). From his early years as a boy in small-town Poland to his ascent through the church hierarchy, the course begins with a brief historical overview of the man many have referred to as the "man of the century." Students then will have the opportunity to critically and charitably engage all or parts of the following primary source documents: *Redemptor Hominis*, *Familiaris Consortio, Laborem Exercens*, and *Centesimus Annus*. Secondary

source material will be drawn from contemporary Catholic and Protestant theologians both commenting on and engaging specific themes/issues regarding the human person, family, sexuality, and work.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

HHTH 468-01A: Introduction to the History of Christianity Suzanne Hequet

Why do Christians worship on Sundays? Why is the Nicene Creed included in liturgies world-wide? Answers to these questions and more will be included in this overview of Christian history, thought and practice from the apostolic age to the present. Classes will include lectures, visual presentations, small-group discussions and readings from both primary and secondary sources. To the extent possible in a survey course, the history of the church will be traced against the larger political, intellectual, and socio-cultural backdrop of world history.

LMUS 468-01A: Gregorian Chant Schola Anthony Ruff

A performing ensemble, open to men and women, which sings Gregorian Chant (and some English chant) primarily at liturgies of Saint John's Abbey and other liturgies on the two campuses.

LMUS 468-02A: Composing Music for Liturgy Anthony Ruff

Cross-listed with LTGY 468-01A

The theory and practice of composing and arranging music for the reformed liturgy. Theoretical study of the demands of the liturgy and its ritual requirements upon the composer. Score reading and evaluation of music written immediately before Vatican II, immediately after Vatican II, and since using the resources of the Larsen Collection. Exploration of musical sources of inspiration for the composer (e.g., chant, folk, jazz). Weekly submission of composition exercises (e.g., writing an unaccompanied antiphon melody, writing a bass line for a melody, arranging a 3-part or 4-part chorale) with a view toward developing musical craftsmanship. Each student will compose or arrange (a) final substantial work(s) which can vary in genre depending upon the interests and goals of the student.

LTGY 468-01A: Composing Music for Liturgy Anthony Ruff

Cross-listed with LMUS 468-02A

The theory and practice of composing and arranging music for the reformed liturgy. Theoretical study of the demands of the liturgy and its ritual requirements upon the composer. Score reading and evaluation of music written immediately before Vatican II, immediately after Vatican II, and since using the resources of the Larsen Collection. Exploration of musical sources of inspiration for the composer (e.g., chant, folk, jazz). Weekly submission of composition exercises (e.g., writing an unaccompanied antiphon melody, writing a bass line for a melody, arranging a 3-part or 4-part chorale) with a view toward developing musical craftsmanship. Each student will compose or arrange (a) final substantial work(s) which can vary in genre depending upon the interests and goals of the student.

MONS 468-01A: Celtic Monasticism Mary Forman

The Lives of Saints Bridget, Brendan, Columba and Columbanus are a small part of the traditions that comprise the beginnings of Celtic monasticism, from its origins in Ireland to its spread on the continent. The course will examine the documents, culture, history and theology of such works as the penitentials, vitae, Irish Biblical Apocrypha, rules, the Stowe Missal, and the Book of Kells among others. The study of famous Celtic monasteries like Iona, Bangor, Luxeuil and St. Gall will reveal that the monks not only produced fine manuscripts, but also greatly facilitated education, encouraged practices of prayer and enhanced pilgrimages as a way of Christian devotion.

MONS 468-02A: Medieval Monastic Spirituality — WEB ${\it Greg\ Peters}$

Cross-listed with SPIR 468-01A

The abundance of monasteries and their inhabitants during the Middle Ages still inspires awe and adoration as do many of the literary texts produced from these schools of the Lord's service. This course will examine important texts representative of the medieval monastic tradition with selections from Benedictines (Anselm of Canterbury and Hildegard of Bingen), Cistercians (Aelred of Rievaulx and Bernard of Clairvaux), Carthusians (Guigo II), Byzantine monastic authors (Peter of Damascus and Gregory Palamas) and others (Julian of Norwich, Walter Hilton and Richard Rolle). These texts will be examined for their rich spiritual theology and ongoing influence in today's church."

MORL 468-01A: The Environment in Christian Theology Bernard Evans

During the past few decades a number of writers have argued that Christian theology can offer us very little assistance as we try to respond to current envi-

ronmental problems. According to this thinking Christian theology has little interest in the natural world and is "hopelessly anthropocentric." The purpose of this course is to discover what classical Christian thought has to say about the natural world. The course surveys selected writings of Christian theologians to determine how they answer the question: what should be the relationship between the human person and the rest of creation?

SPIR 468-01A: Medieval Monastic Spirituality — WEB Greg Peters

Cross-listed with MONS 468-02A

The abundance of monasteries and their inhabitants during the Middle Ages still inspires awe and adoration as do many of the literary texts produced from these schools of the Lord's service. This course will examine important texts representative of the medieval monastic tradition with selections from Benedictines (Anselm of Canterbury and Hildegard of Bingen), Cistercians (Aelred of Rievaulx and Bernard of Clairvaux), Carthusians (Guigo II), Byzantine monastic authors (Peter of Damascus and Gregory Palamas) and others (Julian of Norwich, Walter Hilton and Richard Rolle). The research seminar is designed to direct and guide students in advanced theological research in preparation for writing a thesis. Students may prepare the thesis proposal in the course, or if approved, can begin writing the thesis. Students will be engaged in dialogue and critique of each others' work in order to enhance understanding of theological research and writing. The proposal will contain: a persuasive and debatable thesis statement, a description of the project that maps the argument with a brief summary of the positions and the lines of argument to be developed; a tentative outline, a preliminary bibliography of primary and secondary sources from current scholarship as well as the history of research on the topic. The bibliography will also include sources in the ancient and/or modern language being utilized in the thesis.


