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# REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

OCTOBER 30 - NOVEMBER 14, 2002

SPRING 2003

All currently-registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Spring must complete advance registration by November 14<sup>th</sup>. Please follow these instructions carefully, for proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

## STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- Met with their advisor and obtained their Label with Registration PIN #
- Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a first-year student)
- Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- Have an active Network account
- Students who began Fall 2001 must have completed FAE requirement.

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on WEBSTER until January 16<sup>th</sup>, after they have cleared registration holds.

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on WEBSTER on the date listed on your PIN Label. Registration is On-line, and delaying your registration will affect course selection.

Please note that registration for ILP's (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

## REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on WEBSTER through January 16<sup>th</sup>. You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor. After this date students must come to the Registrar's Office at SJU, Quad 163 or at CSB, Academic Service Building.

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on WEBSTER. Students should use WEBSTER to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course which have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and select among these and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) drop/add card to the Registrar's Office.

We also ask that you use the "Request for Additional Course Spaces" menu item on WEBSTER registration to report a course that you wished to take but were unable to enroll in any section of. Your reporting this will help the colleges plan for possible limit changes or additional sections of the course-both for this semester and for future semesters. Please do not report a course if you were able to register for an alternate section of the same course. This request DOES NOT place you on a waiting list for the course.

## REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on the last four digits of your Social Security Number. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. For Spring Semester registration, the highest (9999) four digits have the highest priority. You are encouraged to keep these priorities in mind when you develop your course requests. WEBSTER will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.

# Instructions for Using WEBSTER

## AT ANY NETWORKED PC:

Log on to the PC (your username and password)  
Click on the START button  
Select NETWORK PROGRAMS  
Select INTERNET BROWSERS  
Click on INTERNET EXPLORER or NETSCAPE  
Enter <http://www.csbsju.edu/>  
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

## FROM OTHER PC'S THAT HAVE ACCESS TO A WEB BROWSER:

Sign on as you normally would, then  
Enter <http://www.csbsju.edu/>  
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

- Click on **"Inside CSB/SJU"**. Then click on the word **"Student Links"** and click on **"WEBSTER"** on the left hand side under **"ACADEMIC"**
- Click on the **Spring term ONLINE Registration** Icon
- **At the Registration Login Screen**, Click on the box and **Enter your Student ID # (with no spaces or dashes) & Enter your PIN #** in the space labeled "PIN" (**PIN # is on the PIN Label you received from your advisor - Do not use your WSC**)  
Click on the **Login** button **once**
- **At the Registration Login Verification Screen**  
Click on the box and **Enter your PIN# again** & then click on the **Login** button **once**
- Click on **Spring Term Registration** - from the Main Registration Menu  
Click on **Spring 2003** & then click on the **Select Term** button
- **To Enter your Spring Term Registration:**  
Click on **ADD/DROP Courses**  
**Enter the 5 digit Call #'s for all of the courses you want to register for - call numbers are listed next to the course number in the Spring Class Schedule Booklet.** Click on **Submit Registration** button - **you must click on this for your registration to be entered into the computer system.** If there is space in the courses you selected and if you meet the necessary prerequisites, the screen will display **"Registered Successfully"**. It will also display the Course ID, Credits and Title of the courses that you have registered for. If a class is closed or you do not meet the prerequisite the screen will display **"Class Registration failed with error"** and a reason for the error.
- **To change the credits on a Variable Credit Course:**  
Click on **Change Course Credit**  
**Enter the number of credits** in the box (select from the range displayed) & click on **Submit Changes**
- **To check course availability:**  
Click on **Look-up Class to Add**  
Click on the name of the **Subject** and Click on **Select Subject** button  
Click on the **Department and Course Number** and Click on **Select Course** button  
**This will display all the sections of that course, and under 'status' it will state 'open' or 'closed'**  
(Note: You may **not** be able to register for some courses that are 'open' because you do not meet the prerequisite or quota restrictions for that course.)
- **To request a course that your were unable to enroll in any section of:**  
Click on **Request for Additional Course Spaces** - from Student Registration Menu  
Enter the **5 digit Call #'s of the course(s) you were not able to enroll in** (this request DOES NOT place you on a wait list for the course).  
Click on **Submit**  
**The screen will display "Courses Requested" or "Course Request Failed" and a reason**
- **To change your Spring Registration:**  
Click on **ADD/DROP Courses**  
Click on the **down arrow in the Action Box** of the course you want to Drop  
Click on **DROP**  
Under **ADD Class** fill in the **Call #** of the new course you want to Add  
Click on **Submit Registration Button** - **this will drop your course and add a new one at the same time. Keep your Registration PIN # - you may Drop/Add for Spring semester until January 16th.**
- **To send a copy of your Course Requests to the printer:**  
Click on **File** from Menu Bar  
Select **Print & Click on OK**
- **To sign off:**  
Click on **Exit WEBSTER**  
Exit Internet Explorer or Netscape  
Log-off the PC

## PLEASE NOTE:

If you have trouble operating the computer terminal when attempting to enter your Spring Term registration, please **(1) ask for assistance from the Computer access student employee, or (2) contact the Office of the Registrar.** The students who staff the Access Areas have been trained on the use of WEBSTER and are ready to respond to questions you may have while entering your registration.

### DROP/ADD on WEBSTER

If you would like to drop and add courses for Spring Term 2003 you may do this through WEBSTER until January 16<sup>th</sup>. Please keep your Registration PIN #, you will need this to Drop/Add on WEBSTER. After this date you will need to drop and add Mod courses in the Registrar's Office.

### OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use WEBSTER from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these simple steps to obtain your Network account:

- Step #1:** Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 080, from 8:00 am - 4:30 pm
- Step #2:** Identify yourself as needing a Network account.
- Step #3:** Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

**PROBLEMS** -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

- **Your PIN # doesn't work.**  
**Solution:** Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit WEBSTER completely and logon again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is not the same as your WSC (Webster Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on WEBSTER**  
 Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.
- **You lost your PIN #.**  
**Solution:** Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)
- **You entered the wrong Call #.**  
**Solution:** WEBSTER allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using WEBSTER". You may make changes on WEBSTER through **January 16<sup>th</sup>**.
- **While using WEBSTER it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".**  
**Solution:** WEBSTER is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you **leave the screen idle for more than 2 minutes**. Should this happen simply sign on again. To do so, click on WEBSTER and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.
- **WEBSTER shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.**  
**Solution:** You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

# ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

## ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have him or her place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Spring 2003 class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

## AUDITING

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.

## ADDING A CLASS

**Thursday, January 16<sup>th</sup>** is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after January 16<sup>th</sup>. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

## DROPPING A CLASS

- **Feb. 5<sup>th</sup>** Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- **Apr. 7<sup>th</sup>** Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure.

## EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances, students may petition for exemption/substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the academic dean of the student's college. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

## INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for spring term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 371-01A (Call #10332) or DNA 271-01A (Call #10331) through WEBSTER. First-year students are not eligible for ILP's.

## POLICY ON INCOMPLETE GRADE

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the approximate grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., I/F, or I/C, or I/B). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the provisional grade which was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

**Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation) by March 19<sup>th</sup> may result in postponement of their graduation.**

## INTERNSHIPS

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an internship for 4 or more credits during the Summer or Fall of 2003 must enroll in the Pre-Internship Seminar. The January Pre-Internship Seminar—open to juniors and seniors only—meets during A mod, 8:00 am at SJU, or 2:40 pm at CSB.

This seminar is for no credit. If you wish to sign up for the seminar or if you have questions about other options, contact the Internship Office, Academic Services Building, phone 5799. ALL STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND AN ADDITIONAL SESSION ON REGISTRATION, REQUIREMENTS, AND LEGAL ISSUES. CHECK WITH THE INTERNSHIP OFFICE FOR EXACT DATES. The last day to register for a 8 credit spring internship is January 13<sup>th</sup>. The last day to register for a 4 credit spring internship is January 16<sup>th</sup>.

You may indicate your intent to register for an internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, Call #10335 through WEBSTER.

## SUMMER INTERNSHIPS

**All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the summer term, rather than under either the preceding spring semester or the following fall semester.**

The last day to register for a Summer Internship is May 2<sup>nd</sup>. **Registration after this date requires approval of the Internship Director.** You must have taken the Pre-internship seminar. If you have not done so contact Julie Christle, phone 5799 for information on alternative meetings by April 1<sup>st</sup>.

Please contact Jill Farry, CSB/SJU Director of Internships (Academic Service Building, Phone 5799), for information regarding special tuition structures for Summer Internships. Tuition fees for summer internship credits will be determined in March.

Advisors will have access to their advisees' **On Track** advising aid through WEB for Faculty Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Spring coursework. Remember, all students **MUST** see their advisor to receive their WEBSTER Registration PIN # Label.

## OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overload tuition fees will be \$525.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The WEBSTER registration system will not allow more than 19 credits.

## REPEATING A COURSE

A course which has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses which have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once.

The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course which you are repeating you **MUST** notify the Registrar's Office.



## STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9<sup>th</sup> (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students. Student Teaching carries a \$120.00 fee.

## STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the International Education Office, QUAD 128 at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution should contact the International Education Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits and readmission. Study Abroad (Consortium/External Study Abroad) registration will include a \$175.00 fee per semester.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for an External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

## S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the **beginning** of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**.

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED OR GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

## TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement which encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office or on-line. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before January 2<sup>nd</sup>. The course will be added to your Spring Term Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$525.00 will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Simon in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 163.

## TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office by presenting a picture ID. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 2-3 days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript (former students) will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

## WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw before February 6<sup>th</sup>, no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between February 6<sup>th</sup> and April 7<sup>th</sup> the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after April 7<sup>th</sup>, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you **MUST** notify the office mentioned above.

## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at SJU or CSB. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and four-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the four day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. **Classes which meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for their final exam.**

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this spring. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

# SPRING 2003 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

## **ACADEMIC SKILLS CENTER**

### **ACSC 125: Academic/Cultural Orientation for International Students**

Social and academic life on a United States (US) campus and social-academic realities of CSB/SJU and the surrounding area. Focus on cultural adjustment cycle, and strategies that help students integrate themselves in US campus life. Topics that will also be covered are immigration laws, health services, library services, registration and advising, plagiarism, security, sexual violence and harassment issues, racism and xenophobia. S/U grading only. 1 credit and a global flag. Offered Fall and Spring.

**Recommended for all entering and transfer undergraduate international students. Permission of instructor required.**

## **ART**

### **ART 240: The Art of India**

This course examines the art of India from the Indus Valley Civilization to the present day. Through a variety of media, including sculpture, architecture, and painting, the class will gain an understanding of the broad themes and concepts that run throughout Indian art. Part of this includes an understanding of the role that religion plays. Thus, a basic comprehension of Buddhism, Hinduism, and Islam, will be attained. The structure of the class will include slide lectures and discussion.

## **COMMUNICATION**

### **COMM 381: STP: Rhetoric of Advertising**

Many critics argue that commercial advertising works not only to sell us things, but also to create structures of meaning that shape how we view the world. This course examines the rhetorical function of advertising—how images and arguments function to persuade audiences. The course also examines the social and environmental consequences of consumerism. Students will carefully examine both print and broadcast advertising. Evaluation will be through oral presentations, class discussion, examinations, and a research paper.

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 101 or COMM 103 or permission of instructor.

### **COMM 383-01A & 02A: Culture, Communication & the Construction of News (HMU)**

*Katie Johnson*

The role of the news industry in a democracy is to inform and socialize the citizenry for participation within the democracy. What are the consequences for the nature of that information when the news industry is profit-driven? How do decisions about the “bottom line” influence decisions about an event’s newsworthiness? This course will examine issues of ownership, the influence of advertising, and factors within the routines of production which help determine the content of television news programming.

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 103 or permission of instructor

### **COMM 383-03A & 04A: Media Effects**

*Erin Szabo*

This course will examine the use and effects of mass media for individuals and societies, and will attempt to answer such questions as: Who is affected by the mass media, What effects occur, How do these effects occur, To what degree, What type of media content is responsible for various effects, and What particular contexts and individual differences make media effects more or less likely? This class will primarily focus on adults and the effects of television, newspapers, magazines and film, because these are the most heavily researched areas. Nonetheless, much of the research will apply to radio, books and the internet, as well. Finally, this class will employ a social scientific approach to exploring the question of media effects, with representative research being read and discussed. The objectives of the course are: (1) to provide you with an understanding of the theories and research that inform our knowledge of the effects of mass media; (2) to acquire the ability to apply mass media theories to current events; (3) to enhance logical thinking, critical reasoning, and use of social scientific evidence to support conclusions about the effects of mass media; (4) to become a more critical, educated media consumer. Students will be evaluated on mastery of these objectives in lecture, writing, group work, small group discussion, and on examinations.

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 103 or permission of instructor

**NOTE:** Students may take both 383-01A or 2A AND 383-03A or 04A in the same term. Students may NOT take this course if they have already completed COMM 349 - Media Criticism.

### **COMM 385: Communication Research**

Upon graduating from CSB/SJU many of you will find yourselves in promising careers in public relations, advertising, marketing, business; or continuing your education in graduate programs. In such positions, you will be expected to create or to read communication research reports and respond appropriately to those reports. This course is designed to provide you with a set of tools that may be used to accomplish those tasks. The specific goals of the course are: a) to introduce you to the language of social science research and to develop in you a sense of the precision of that language, b) to develop an appreciation of the many methodologies available to anyone interested in doing empirical social research, c) to cause you to think more scientifically about social phenomena, such as communication; and d) to provide hands-on experience with an actual empirical investigation of communication phenomenon.

The course content can be divided into three parts. The first third of the term will be spent examining the philosophy of social science. Second, the course will cover the multitude of research methodologies available to social scientists for answering empirical questions. The last portion of the course will be devoted to data entry and analyses. As a group, the class will conduct an experiment and enter and analyze the data gathered using a statistical analysis software package (Statistical Package for the Social Sciences—SPSS).

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 105 or permission of instructor.

## **CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS**

“The traditions of the liberal arts and the Benedictine character of our two colleges emphasize the need to develop in our students an ability to lead responsible lives in a contemporary world. This concern has always been a central element in notions about striving for a “good life,” leading a life of civic responsibility, a life of personal integration, a life of “wholeness.” At the junior/senior level of the curriculum, this objective implies that explicit and focused attention be paid to developing the ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. Developing this ability is, then, the goal of this program. By “good moral judgments” we understand choices which are consciously elected and defensively maintained.”

One goal includes, “enhancing the ability of students to think well about problems that resist easy solutions, problems that call for combining many separate resources and skills, both intellectual and personal. . . the program goal involves working on the ability to create an integrated perspective on an issue, recognizing the various dimensions needed for sound judgment. Creating this integrative perspective requires that students understand many approaches to thinking about and questioning issues. No single method, type of analysis, or school of thought has a privileged position.”

### **Exploring the Human Condition**

The major form of pedagogy will be through discussion in all sections of senior seminar. Many faculty members will require the writing of papers and/ or the completion of a final project.

Each faculty member will use an interdisciplinary theme to center the class discussion. A short description of each theme is listed after each faculty member’s name.

### **CORE 390/GWST 390-01A: Feminism and Families: Mortal Enemies or Unexpected Allies?**

*Jean Keller*

In this course, we will examine the social construction of the family by drawing on works of ethics, philosophy, social science, literature, feminist theory, and men’s studies. We will examine critiques of the family by feminists, men’s studies scholars and social conservatives and compare and evaluate these respective groups’ visions for a reconfigured ideal of family life in light of the question: is one of these models of the family

ethically "better" than the others? If so, how do we make and justify claims of ethically better and worse?

Topics for discussion will focus on ethical issues related to the family, such as: how is family defined and who gets to define it?; is there a normative conception of the family? If so, does it include single-parent families, gay and lesbian families, extended families, and families of choice--and why or why not?; what effect does and should public policy have on the family (for example, welfare, healthcare for families, childcare, paid parental leave); for many of us, our conception of the good life includes *both* work and family. How can and should these two commitments be balanced? How do gender roles shape our expectations of what this balance should look like and should gender roles be relevant to individual decisions about work and family?; How do understandings of the family vary across cultures and what can we learn from these examples as we try to envision our ideal of family life?

This course satisfies the Capstone Requirement for the Gender and Women's Studies Program. It is open to any male or female student with an interest in topics related to gender, family, and career.

#### **CORE 390-02A: Ethics and Economics of Sustainable Societies**

*Ernie Diedrich*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions. In this course, we analyze the ethical and economic underpinnings of current industrial societies, critique them and suggest a different foundation for sustainable societies. The topics covered include the economic and philosophical underpinnings of current market systems, a critique of these underpinnings including the flaws in neoclassical economics (epistemology, methodology, and ethics), and an evaluation of how a new paradigm might be constructed.

The purpose of this course is to decide if societies such as ours are sustainable (after we understand this idea) and suggest what a sustainable society could be. In effect, we will try the very challenging task of understanding everything about how we live and then reorganizing or re-channeling social evolution into a new pattern.

This class will be conducted with a heavy emphasis on discussion with students assuming the responsibility for getting the class started on the readings and by grappling with a topic or question (based on the readings or a previous speaker). There will be guest speakers and field trips to learn from others about the problems and opportunities of "manifesting" sustainability (real implementation).

#### **CORE 390-03A: Social Issues and The Law**

*Tim Robinson*

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law.

#### **CORE 390-04A: Reading For Life**

*Tony Cunningham*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

Everyone loves a good story. Yet, great literature can provide us with far more than idle recreation. Stories can often provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we shall use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical question: "How should one live?" We shall do so by attending to all the concrete, particular details of real-life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. Unlike abstract ethical theories, this course will *not* offer a systematic, "how to" approach to ethics. Indeed, one of the things we shall discuss is how standard ethical theories like utilitarianism and Kantian ethics (the most dominant ethical theories in the Western philosophical tradition) provide a unified, systematic view of our ethical responsibilities at the *expense* of ignoring or disfiguring what human beings are really like in all their complexity and beauty. This course will make an attempt to help students make better moral judgments in the sense of better appreciating the competing values that make appeals on a human life. Literature and real-life experience have special powers in this vein because appreciating what *matters* is *not* merely a matter of engaging in an intellectual exercise in philosophical argument and analysis.

#### **CORE 390-05A: Ethics and Economics of Sustainable Societies**

*Joe Desjardins*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions. In this course, we analyze the ethical and economic underpinnings of current industrial societies, critique them and suggest a different foundation for sustainable societies. The topics covered include the economic and philosophical underpinnings of current market systems, a critique of these underpinnings including the flaws in neoclassical economics (epistemology, methodology, and ethics), and an evaluation of how a new paradigm might be constructed.

The purpose of this course is to decide if societies such as ours are sustainable (after we understand this idea) and suggest what a sustainable society could be. In effect, we will try the very challenging task of understanding everything about how we live and then reorganizing or re-channeling social evolution into a new pattern.

#### **CORE 390-06A: War and the Memory of War in the Last Century**

*Nick Hayes*

The twentieth century opened with the promise of peace and prosperity. Our last century, however, witnessed a succession of wars from its beginning to its end. This course examines how twentieth century culture came to remember and interpret the century's wars from WWI, the Spanish Civil War, WWII, the Holocaust, the Vietnam War, to the Wars of the ex-Yugoslavia in the 1990's. Our focus falls not on the basic history of each of these tragic events, but on how the memory of the wars shaped our culture and values. Behind our inquiries lie disturbing moral questions: How does a society reconcile itself to the knowledge of human atrocity and the legacy of total war on civilian populations? What are our moral and ethical responsibilities to remember that indeed such things happen on this earth?

#### **CORE 390-07A: Work In American Life**

*Virginia Arthur*

Americans work longer (2 weeks a year longer than the Japanese, the next most productive group of people) and harder than any other group. Work is a source of identity for many, providing a means of measuring their self-worth and prestige. Work can be a source of fulfillment and service to others or it can be a means of destroying self and relationships with others. Americans struggle to balance work and the rest of their life. Many yearn to find a vocation or calling in work. Americans also have complicated feelings about those who don't work; even if they understand that some people can't work they still make value judgments about those not in the workforce. Women and the few men who choose childrearing and home work have an uneasy relationship with those who have chosen to be employed while trying to raise a family.

This course will examine the meaning of work in our lives through reading and discussion. Ethical issues to be examined include: the place of work in our lives; finding meaning in work; the right to work that uses our human capabilities to the fullest and provides dignity; our obligations towards those who struggle with or can't work.

#### **CORE 390-08A: To Be or Not To Be....?**

*Chuck Villette*

This course will address eternal question(s) that confront humans every day: how will I or should I decide/act/respond/engage in life? How do we make ethical decisions? We will begin the exploration with two fundamental documents: *The Declaration of the Rights of Man and The Social Contract*. The search will continue with a focus on examples/issues from our past, our present and our future.

#### **CORE 390-09A: A Living the Good Life: Ethical choices in a complex world**

*Vera Theisen*

This course will encourage students to examine their values and the moral choices they must make, from the smallest to the most important. It will include the study of virtues and basic ethical theories as a prelude to the discussion of various human rights and social justice issues in our world that is becoming more complex yet interconnected

#### **CORE 390-10A: Revolutionary Lives**

*Kelly Kraemer*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to help students develop the ability to make sound moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. We will achieve this goal by studying the moral judgments of ordinary people who have made extraordinary moral choices and taken action to change

the world. From Bono to Nelson Mandela, from Harriet Tubman to Angela Davis, from world famous heroes to unknown college students, we'll examine the lives, words, and actions of men and women living revolutionary lives—lives marked by and resulting in radical change. Why has an Irish rock star dedicated himself to ending poverty and AIDS in Africa? How did an ex-slave become a leader in both military and nonviolent actions? Why do some people give up their time, their money, their freedom, and even their lives in the name of social justice?

The subjects of our inquiry have found thoughtful answers to some of the difficult questions facing those who seek social justice. Is violence ever acceptable or is nonviolent action the only ethical option? Can real change happen by working within "the system" or must one remain outside of the system to avoid corruption and cooptation? Are we limited to legal action or is breaking the law sometimes morally acceptable? We will examine their moral choices, discuss the rationales behind them, and pose questions: What are the alternatives in any given situation, and how does one choose responsibly among them? Would we do the same? Could we do the same? Our aim is to develop the ability to lead responsible lives in a complex and challenging contemporary world by studying the examples set by others.

### **CORE 390-11A: Energy Dilemmas**

*Dan Steck*

The production and consumption of energy pose difficult choices for members of a technological society. Since large-scale energy use affects the environment, economy, and culture, citizens must understand current and future energy options and actively participate in decision making. Although this course will approach the energy-related dilemma through a technical venue, our study will lead to an investigation of the nature of ethics, science, technology, politics, and their interactions. Nuclear energy and radiation will serve as an extended case study of the dilemmas associated with the production and consumption of large quantities of energy. *It is strongly encouraged that students complete their Core Natural Science requirement before enrolling in this course.*

### **CORE 390-12A & 13A: Ethics**

*Elizabeth Stoltz*

A study of Aristotle's *Ethics*, a system which has been used throughout the ages, incorporated into theology by Thomas Aquinas, and now modernized in Stephen Covey's *Seven Habits of Highly Effective Everythings*. A few contemporary works will be read which test the relevancy of Aristotle's thinking to our contemporary world.

## **COURSES OF THE COLLEGE**

### **COLG 130: EMT Basics**

This course covers basic minimal emergency care required to work on an ambulance or first responder squad throughout the 50 states in the U.S. The course offers basic to more advanced techniques and principles of pre-hospital; emergency care. Students must be at least eighteen years old to take the National and State Certification exams. Students who have been convicted of a felony should contact the course coordinator.

The student will be evaluated by the instructor for passing of the practical portions of the class, according to the standards in the test, handouts, and lecture. There are several quizzes throughout the class and a final written and practical test, minimum passing score will be 80%.

## **ECONOMICS**

### **ECON 329: Asian Economies**

This course addresses the rise to significance of the Asian-Pacific region in the world economy. It examines the rise of the Asia-Pacific as an important economic, cultural, and geopolitical region. This region of the world is typified by a delicate balance between governments and business interests, which accounts for their diverse development trajectories. Moreover, this relationship is not static but dynamic, reacting and evolving with changes in internal and external circumstances. This course in Asian Economies will concentrate primarily on the post World War II growth performance of the countries in East and Southeast Asia, also known as the "Asian Tigers". It will study how these countries transformed themselves from peasant societies into industrial powerhouses and how they have continued to achieve growth rates several times higher than the advanced nations of the West over a period of time. Using basic tools of economic theory, three themes are going to be addressed. First, the different paths of development are analyzed within their regional and

international contexts. Second, the relationships between the USA and some of the key countries, such as Japan, South Korea, and China, are explored. Finally, the rise to significance of this region in the global economy is examined.

**PREREQUISITE:** ECON 111 or permission of instructor.

## **ENGLISH**

### **Eng 220: Topics in Research**

This course focuses on the theory and practice of research in literary and cultural studies (topic TBA). After guided exploration of research as a class (through a literary topic TBA), each student, in consultation with the instructor, will write his or her own research project and present it to the class. This course is excellent preparation for an honor's thesis in the humanities.

### **ENGL 355: Studies in Individual Authors: Emily Dickinson Studies**

Seminar: A group of supervised students engaged in advanced study. Poems, biography, criticism, theory. Vigorous active participation required for successful performance in this course.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES**

### **ENVR 175: Integrated Environmental Science I**

An interdisciplinary introduction to the science underlying environmental issues. This course will focus on the principles of chemistry and geology and in their application to environmental problems. Laboratory experiences will involve exercises and experiments that engage students in the process of science, including design of experiments, analysis and presentation of quantitative data, and written and oral communication

## **GENDER AND WOMEN STUDIES**

### **GWST 390-01A: Feminism and Families: Mortal Enemies or Unexpected Allies?**

*Jean Keller*

## **HISTORY**

### **HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium: Hollywood History**

History is a story about events that occurred in the past. The historical stories told by major Hollywood films reach more Americans than any historian, and have more impact on how we view pieces of the past than thousands of history classes.

What are the consequences? The visual images inherent in film obviously help our understanding of the past by making it come alive, but what else do they do? To what extent do they distort our understanding of the past by ignoring what most historians would see as accurate? If a film strays from the scholarly historical record in some way, can it still convey some essential truths about an event or era? Does the need for capital and audience cause Hollywood films to paint the nation's past in a particular way? What can we learn about the values/attitudes of the time in which a film was made from the way that it tells its story about the past?

Through readings and research, students will "do" history by contrasting their own interpretations with those of major Hollywood films and wrestling with the other questions above. There will be both individual and group projects as we examine a set of films chosen largely by those enrolled.

### **HIST 300: Topics in History: Civil Rights**

This course will examine central topics that contributed to the development of civil rights for African Americans, the interrelationship between social custom and the social contract, and tension between race, ethnicity and class.

### **HIST 389: Historiography and Methods**

This course will explore the historiography of the American West, covering such topics as the impact of U.S. expansion on the environment and native peoples of the West, the realities of violence in "frontier" towns, the political and economic relationships between Eastern cities and their Western counterparts, and the evolution of the 20<sup>th</sup> century West into an overwhelmingly urban society in the midst of a sparsely populated hinterland. Special attention will be paid to historical debates over the "meaning of the West," the introduction of race, class, gender, and environment as themes in these debates, and the varying types of evidence historians have used to interpret the region's past. Readings will include Richard White's *It's Your Misfortune and None of My Own: A New History of the American West*, Stephen Ambrose's *Undaunted Courage*,

several monographic treatments of Western issues, at least one western novel, and 8-10 Western movies screened outside of class.

## **HONORS**

### **HONR 210: Computing: Science and Applications**

This course is an overview of computing and its applications from a scientific perspective. Students should learn how computers are built up from simple components to chips to computing devices and how various levels of software enable users to use them as "general purpose machines". Included in the topics covered will be limits of computation, tractable and intractable problems, artificial intelligence, social and ethical problems, representation of complex data, algorithms, operating systems, databases, the theoretical and hardware bases of computation, programming, and use of applications for doing useful work with computers. Students should have a reasonable level of mathematical ability although no mathematics beyond high school algebra will be assumed as a prerequisite.

### **HONR 220: Introduction to Economics**

Want to know why market systems operate the way they do and why China, Cuba and North Korea are reluctant to play along? Curious about why the poor always seem to be among us...and in such large numbers? Ever wonder what the song of a lark might be worth or why people are catching fewer fish? Is globalization good for the planet? This introductory economics course addresses these and other issues and along the way, you'll learn about economic theory, how it has evolved, and how it applies to every facet of our lives. You won't learn to organize your wallet (as Woody Allen thought a course on Economics was about), but you'll get a very good grip on analyzing and understanding the problems of our times. We'll use a text, two books, some movies and the internet in our work. Bring your curiosity!

### **HONR 230: European Art Survey II**

This is an introductory survey of significant art and architecture from the Renaissance to the present. This course uses lectures, discussion and written work to lead the student in becoming an engaged viewer of art. By focusing on important works from each period, the student learns how to look at a work, what kind of questions to ask about it, and how to bring the knowledge gained about it to other works. In this way, the student learns the basic process of art historical research and develops analytical skills that can be used in various disciplines.

### **HONR 240: The Christian Tradition**

*David Cloutier*

An introduction to the tradition of thought and life called Christianity, primarily through acquiring a historically-informed familiarity with the ideas and content of Christian scripture. In surveying the scripture, particular attention is paid to the relationship of Israel to Jesus and the early Christians, the basic concepts of Christian belief, and the ethics of the Christian life. Some contemporary interpretive controversies and developments will also be studied. Students will be challenged to think critically about the Christian tradition as a whole, particularly in relationship to other religious traditions and to their own ideas about what Christianity is.

### **HONR 240: The Development of the Christian Tradition.**

*Vincent Smiles*

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures, such as creation, covenant, kingdom, prophets, gospel and New Testament letters. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to Biblical Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

### **HONR 250: "An Atlas of the Difficult World" (Reading Fiction/Poetry)**

*Mara Faulkner, OSB*

The title of this literature course is borrowed from a long poem by Adrienne Rich in which she asks whether poetry can help us find our way through the dangers that mark the world of the twenty-first century. We will study this poem as well as several of Rich's essays from *Arts of the Possible*. Many other writers have asked what the value of imaginative literature is in "a difficult world." Some that we may study are Irish poets Seamus Heaney and Eavan Boland, essayist Scott Russell Sanders (who will visit our campus this spring,) and a number of novelists and critics. Students will do several kinds of writing--an annotated poetry anthology, a researched essay, and their own poetry, fiction, and creative nonfiction. Class sessions will be primarily discussion, sometimes led by groups of students.

Students interested in majoring or minoring in English may count this course as English 133--Reading Fiction and Poetry, or as an elective.

### **HONR 250: Social Philosophy**

*Charles Wright*

In the United States today, most citizens tend to take for granted that liberty and equal treatment are fundamental parts of social justice. Not all people have thought this way, though. Thus the first part of the class will be devoted to the study of Plato's *Republic* - a profoundly influential philosophical work that suggests that neither individual liberty or political equality are necessary for a well-ordered society. We are certain to disagree with Plato, and this disagreement will allow us to explore our reasons for valuing liberty and equality. This exploration will be aided by our study of two further classic texts in the Western tradition of political philosophy: John Locke's *Second Treatise on Government* and John Stuart Mill's *On Liberty*. Following our examination of these philosophical sources for our society's ideals, the class will consider ways in which these values are incompletely realized in the economic and political institutions of the United States. For this purpose we will be reading works of social science and investigative journalism such as: Barbara Ehrenreich's *Nickel and Dimed: On (Not) Getting By in America*, Jill Duerr Berrick, *Faces of Poverty*, or Lillian B. Rubin, *Families on the Fault Line*. In response to these reports, the class will consider the role of a free market economy in creating these circumstances and will deliberate on the question: is it right that certain citizens of the United States should experience inequality and limited freedom? Readings for these deliberations will be taken from Karl Marx, a critic of free market economies, as well as from Irving Kristol and Joseph Pichler, defenders of the free market.

**PREREQUISITE:** *Open only to first-year students.*

### **HONR 311: Great Books and the Moral Imagination**

*Mark Thamert*

This is a year-long discussion based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Aristotle, Augustine, Austen, Biblical writers, Camus, Confucius, Descartes, Dickens, Dostoevsky, Eliot, Faulkner, Freud, Homer, Zora Neale Hurston, Henry James, Joyce, Kafka, Kant, Melville, Toni Morrison, Flannery O'Connor, O'Neill, Plato, Sartre, Seneca, Shakespeare, Shaw, Virginia Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to Junior honors students, but Seniors will also be considered. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. Interested student should e-mail the instructor. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of novels and plays during the summer.

### **HONR 340-350: Christianity in Relation to Judaism**

*John Merkle*

This course explores the Jewish tradition, the emergence of Christianity within and from that tradition, the de-Judaization of Christianity, traditional Christian teachings about Judaism, anti-Jewish formulations of Christian faith, contemporary Christian affirmations of Judaism's abiding validity, and the implications of these new affirmations for Christian self-understanding and for Christian-Jewish relations.

### **HONR 350: Dostoevsky**

*Scott Richardson*

The works of Fyodor Dostoevsky do not soothe one's nerves. The reader is bound to get rather anxious while becoming intimate with characters on the edge of sanity and watching acts of destruction and self-humiliation. Still, these books are hard to put down. The plots themselves are gripping and the characters intriguing, and Dostoevsky manages to use these stories of murder, madness, and conspiracy to explore profound questions about human nature, the human mind, the existence of God, irrationality, love, free will, moral responsibility, good and evil, and the struggle of living. We will read a number of novellas, including *The Double*, *Notes from Underground*, and *The Gambler*, and four big novels, *Crime and Punishment*, *The Idiot*, *The Devils*, and *The Brothers Karamazov*.

## **MANAGEMENT**

### **MGMT 305-01A & 02A: Consumer Behavior**

Examines the process of consumer decision making. Studies the consumer in regards to motivation, personality, lifestyle, attitudes, and cultural and social influences. Emphasizes the use of research and theory in developing marketing strategies.

### **MGMT 305-03A: International Finance**

This course examines the international dimensions of finance. The financial management of a multinational corporation is more complex than

the management of a strictly domestic enterprise. This course also provides a conceptual framework for the key financial decisions that a multinational corporation must make. Topics include the balance of payments, the determination of exchange rates, methods of hedging exchange rate volatility, short-term and long-term financing, the cost of capital for a multinational, multinational capital budgeting, and international cash management.

**PREREQUISITE:** MGMT 201, ECON 111, ACCT 113

#### **MGMT 305-04A: Management Information Systems**

Conceptual foundations of MIS, roles of computer-based information systems in organizations, global and ethical issues in MIS, and business application software with an emphasis on database management systems.

**PREREQUISITE:** MGMT 241

#### **MGMT 342: Service Operations Management**

Service Operations Management addresses the design and management of systems for services. This course will combine operations, marketing, and human resources aspects of services using both text material and cases. A sampling of topics addressed include service facility design, layout, and location, service quality, managing queues, managing capacity and demand, the service encounter, forecasting and project management. A wide survey of service industries will be studied including healthcare, financial services, consulting, entertainment, hospitality, airlines, higher education, and environmental services to name a few.

**PREREQUISITE:** MGMT 321 or MGMT 341

#### **MGMT 380: Applied Strategic Management**

Management majors can fulfill their experiential learning requirement while studying abroad by completing this course. A series of readings on international management topics will be assigned and students will be expected to submit written work electronically. These writings will require reflection upon and integration of management theory with the experience of international living.

### **MODERN & CLASSICAL LANGUAGES**

#### **FREN 351: French and Francophone Women Writers of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century**

In this course we will examine the literary production (novel, essay, memoir, poetry, short story) of women writing in French in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The first half of the course will be devoted to a brief survey of French women writers of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, focusing on where their works fit into the canon of French literature as well as on how, writing as women, these authors affected the voice of French literature in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. In the second half of the course, we will read literary works by Francophone women from non-European countries. We will consider the ways in which gender and affiliation with a post-colonial culture are explored by these women writers. Authors studied will include Simone de Beauvoir, Marguerite Duras, Nathalie Sarraute, Hélène Cixous and Andrée Chédid (France), Mariama Bâ (Senegal), Assia Djebar (Algeria), Aminita Sow-Fall (Cameroun), Matie-Thérèse Coliman-Hall (Martinique), Myriam Warner-Vieyra (Guadeloupe), Gabrielle Roy, Anne Hébert and Michelle Lalonde (Quebec). All readings, lecture/discussion, and writing in French 355 will be in French.

### **NUTRITION**

#### **NUTR 335: Clinical Nutrition**

This course introduces the basic concepts of nutrition for students pursuing a non-dietetic or non-nutrition health care profession. The first half primarily provides an overview of the function of the major macronutrients and micro-nutrients, including the principles of how nutrients are absorbed, digested and metabolized. The second half of the course emphasizes the role of diet in the management and treatment of a variety of common clinical conditions. The aim is to provide the learner with an understanding of the principles of some of the common dietary interventions.

### **PEACE STUDIES**

#### **PCST 368: Human Rights**

In 1948, the United Nations issued the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, a listing of civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights, which they hoped would mark the beginning of a new era in history. This course will look at the development of human rights concepts and institutions and explore the relationships between human rights and such areas as women's rights, non-western cultures, religious traditions and

economic globalization. We will also look at the current state of human rights across the globe, and examine past and present U.S. foreign policy regarding human rights. We will study the responses of the international community to human rights violations and genocide, and discuss the ways of promoting and defending human rights used by the human rights movement, especially by Amnesty International.

#### **PCST 399: Why War?**

Sigmund Freud, in response to a letter from Einstein, states that we loath war "because everyone has a right to his own life, because war puts an end to human lives that are full of hope, because it destroys precious material objects which have been produced by the labors of humanity." In this course, we will explore the fundamental causes of war from a variety of perspectives. Sifting through theories of war from political science, psychology, economics, sociology, anthropology, and biology, we will attempt to identify those with potent explanatory value. To enhance this disciplinary-based analysis we will also partake of a judicious selection of literature and films on war. Specific topics we will cover include: the nature of aggression (instinctual v. learned), group thinking, problems of misperception, balance of power, the military-industrial complex, arms races and sales, environmental theories, imperialism, and systemic explanations.

### **PHILOSOPHY**

#### **PHIL 362: Business Ethics**

This new course is offered for the first time as an upper-division seminar intended for students with some background in management, accounting, or economics. Examining the ethical legitimacy of market-based decisions provides the conceptual framework for this course. There is a widely-accepted and influential perspective (often identified as the "classical model of corporate social responsibility") which holds that business institutions (and the individuals within those institutions) fulfill their ethical responsibilities when they pursue profit within the law.

The first section of this seminar will analyze the ethical validity of this perspective, contrasting this classical model with a "stakeholder" theory of corporate social responsibility. A second section of the seminar will focus on business' ethical responsibilities to employees (and employee responsibilities to business and society). A third section will examine business' responsibilities to consumers, with a special focus on marketing ethics. A final section will consider more general social responsibilities of business, particularly with regards to environmental and equal opportunity issues.

### **SOCIOLOGY**

#### **SOCI 337: Ethnographic/Qualitative Methods**

This course will provide an overview of the history and an examination of contemporary issues in ethnographic research. Students will learn to collect and interpret qualitative data. The course will engage students in field projects involving: participant-observation; unstructured and semi-structured interviewing; research design; note taking; and life history. Students will also explore the issue of research ethics. This course will provide an excellent opportunity for students who prefer human contact over statistical analysis to learn how to design, conduct, and interpret quality research. In addition to Sociology majors, this course will be of significant benefit to students who might want to do a qualitative thesis (here or in graduate school) and those whose future careers may involve program evaluation.

### **THEATER**

#### **THEA 140: Fundamentals of Movement**

This course is an introduction to movement fundamentals and is designed for actors, athletes, musicians, visual artists, and anyone desiring to improve fine motor skills, flexibility, coordination, posture, or body image. The goal is for students to develop somatic awareness so that they can recognize their own habitual movement patterns and learn to explore new movement options, with an emphasis on decreasing effort and increasing sensitivity. The course uses the Feldenkrais Method and modern dance techniques to enhance students' understanding of basic anatomical and kinesiological principles, to expand their range and quality of movement, and to improve individual performance skills. The course also offers an experience of movement as a creative art form without the perceived stereotypical limitations and definitions of dance.

## **THEOLOGY**

### **THEO 309: Bible Church & Gender**

*Vincent Smiles*

*This course is cross-listed with CORE 359*

An exploration of the engagement between, on the one hand, the Bible and the Christian tradition and, on the other, modern questions arising from the study of gender (feminism, gay and lesbian studies, men's studies). The course identifies and engages texts and arguments which underlie such issues as: ideas about men (masculinity) and women (femininity) - views on marriage, sex and celibacy - the Bible and homosexuality - women in the Christian tradition - the Bible as a norm for modern sexual ethics and "family values." Essentially the course is a conversation between ancient teaching and insight, which is still with us, and modern perspectives, which both endorse and question the traditional heritage.

### **THEO 319: The Orthodox Church**

*Rev. Harry Spero Pappas*

*This course is cross-listed with CORE 350*

An exploration of the history, theology, worship, and spirituality of the Orthodox Church, with particular emphasis on the development of the Christian Tradition through the Byzantine Empire into the modern world. Explicit attention will be given to relationship of Orthodoxy to western Christian traditions, above all Roman Catholicism and Lutheranism.

### **THEO 339: Art, Beauty, and the Revelation of the Divine**

*Kimberly Vrudny*

*This course is cross-listed with CORE 346*

Art critics have suggested that beauty is composed through a skillful use of proportion and harmony of elements. Christian theologians have written that beauty is personified in the person of Christ, whose soul was perfectly proportioned and harmonious with God. Thus, the concept of beauty has long been understood to inform both artistic and theological disciplines. This course examines the historical, existential, prophetic, liturgical and sacramental dimensions of the intersections between art and theology using the concept of beauty as an axis. Documents from the field of art criticism as well as theological documents from the history of the church will be studied to form working definitions of beauty. These

definitions will then be applied to the work of artists, both historical and contemporary, as well as to various theological themes, such as revelation, redemption, ethics, devotion, and grace, in order to locate beauty in contemporary dialogue and practice both inside and outside the church.

### **THEO 349: Sex, Dating, and Marriage in the Christian Life**

*David Cloutier*

This course covers comprehensively the traditions and teachings of Christianity on these topics. Issues will be examined both historically and in the contemporary debate, and the class will engage in debates over contraception, premarital sex, divorce, homosexuality, and other disputed questions. These questions will be raised within the larger question about how Christians define the practices of sex and marriage in their lives. Attention will also be paid to comparisons and contrasts raised by the cultural "scripts" generally available on these topics, and how the Christian tradition has responded to these contemporary scripts. Finally, the relationship of sex and marriage (human actions) to God's action will be explored.

### **THEO 369: Spiritual Traditions of Islam**

*Noreen Herzfeld*

Why should a Christian study Islamic spirituality? Islam appears in the news. Islam is also the fastest growing religion in America. A study of some of the major sources of Islamic spirituality will help us put current events in context. However, a more fundamental reason to study another faith is that it can provide a new lens through which to see one's own tradition, and a new appreciation for the commonality of the human condition throughout the globe. This course focuses on Islamic spirituality. Although we will begin with some history and an overview of the basic beliefs in Islam, our focus will be on how Muslims have encountered God (Allah), and how this encounter informs their daily life. This course is an introduction. I expect that you will end it with more questions than you began, but with enough basic knowledge to read further and to put current events into a broader context.

# CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

**The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:**

## 1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 10 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—five events per semester.

## 2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses)-- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 & 101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, GWST 390 or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. Cannot be repeated for credit. Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

## 3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

FA	( 4 credits)	Must be from courses that are designated as fulfilling Fine Arts
HML	( 2 courses)	Must be from different departments or disciplines ( ex. Not two literature courses even if they are from different department)
TH	( 1 course)	Must be 100 level theology course.
HMU	( 1 course)	Must be from the same discipline as one HML or TH already completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
JC	( 1 course)	May be satisfied only after the TH and both HML courses are completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
MT	( 1 course)	Must have satisfied the Math Proficiency before the completion of the course.
NS	( 2 courses)	Must be from different departments (unless NATS, COLG, HONR, PCST or ENVR).
SSL	( 1 course)	Must be 100 level.
SSU	( 1 course)	Must have completed the SSL course first.

## 4. Flagged courses

Courses may carry 1 or more flags, in addition to meeting Core disciplinary or Major requirements. Flagged courses are specific to the instructor and term. Flagged courses are listed in the Class Schedule and updated lists are posted at the Office of the Registrar.
