Course Descriptions

CORE 390-14A: Liberation and Development in Latin America

Brian Larkin

This course examines ethical issues involved in development projects aimed at alleviating poverty in contemporary Latin America. A major component of the course will be an investigation of Liberation Theology, a radical response by part of the Catholic Church to poverty and marginalization. Other topics will include free trade, globalization, and multinational corporations.

MUSC 102-01A: Class Voice I

This voice class is being offered especially to theater majors who would like to improve their singing skills and prepare audition repertoire. The class will meet eleven times during the semester and will cover the following topics: healthy singing and speaking, posture/breathing, choosing appropriate repertoire (range vs tessitura), onset of tone (beginning and ending), resonance issues, healthy vibrato, diction considerations, and the vocal audition. Come improve your singing in a supportive environment!

CSCI 130: Computing: Science & Its Applications (NS), 4 credits

An overview of computing and its applications from a scientific perspective, designed to equip students with the basic tools needed to understand computers and use them effectively. Students will study the basic architecture of computers, the structure of programming, and the design of spreadsheets and databases. Through regularly scheduled labs they will gain hands-on experience with applications to scientific and business problems. Not intended for students majoring in the sciences.

New Courses for Summer 2008

Students will be billed approximately \$380 per credit for 2008 Summer Courses

COLG 180: Civil Rights Movement, 1 credit

Faculty Moderator – Gary Prevost

Dates: May 20 to May 28 (9 days)

This is a ten day course on the Civil Rights Movement and its continuing legacy. It combines classroom presentations at Morehouse College with site visits in Atlanta, Birmingham, Montgomery, and Selma. The first week of the class begins with the classroom work in Morehouse, a visit to the King Center in Atlanta and then proceeds with travel to Montgomery and its various civil rights sites, including the new Rosa Parks Museum. From there the group would proceed to Selma and the National Voting Rights Museum. The final Alabama stop would be Birmingham where the focus would be the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute.

The second part of the course, in Atlanta, would be focused on processing the experiences from the Alabama visits and in larger measure explore the continuation of the Civil Rights Movement and other struggles for social justice based in the Atlanta area. Organizations to be focused on would include the Georgia Justice Project, Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and the Carter Center. Interaction with these organizations would include meetings with representatives and where possible observation of the groups' activities.

Approximate Fee for trip: \$1,450

ENVR 200C: Environmental/Culture & Social Sustainability in Scandinavia

Faculty Moderator - John Hasselberg and Ernie Diedrich

Dates: May 15 to June 10, 2008

The Scandinavian countries have evolved during the past century from agrarian, to industrial, and finally to leading informational technological societies. These small countries intentionally conceived and implemented groundbreaking social and economic policies. They are the most environmentally sustainable, gender balanced, and digitally interconnected societies in the world. They have developed democratic and humane systems of social organization, globally aware cultures, advanced organizational and industrial design, deeply embedded environmental stewardship, leadership in United Nations and international peacekeeping and global marketing of their artistic productions. As culture, history, politics and economic frame the ways in which humans organize themselves and create and manage institutions to accomplish things then we must ask how and what can we learn from Sustainable Scandinavia.

Participates in this course will learn to appreciate and understand the diverse cross-developments of environment, religion, politics, technology, social structure underlie the dramatic yet sustainable development that enabled Scandinavian societies to become globally engaged while remaining sensitive to the foibles of the human conditions. This learning will be done through on-site research and dialogue with hosts and faculty directors, supported by preparatory readings, faculty-led workshops and exercises, media analysis, and ongoing and reflective critical writing and group discussions. Specific prerequisite courses will not be necessary for this program.

Fee: \$3000

MATH 118-01A: Essential Calculus (MT), 4 credits

Faculty Moderator – Michael Gass

Dates: May 19 to July 3rd

Days: Monday, Wednesday & Thursday from 10-12:00pm in PENGL 244

Preliminary concepts; derivatives, integrals and the concept of limit; application of differentiation and integration; calculus of several variables; exponentials, logarithms and growth problems. Other topics may include differential equations and probability theory.

Prerequisites: MATH proficiency or QSI & MATH 115 or four years of college preparatory mathematics or permission from the chair of the mathematics department.

MATH 124-01A: Probability & Statistical Inference (MT), 4 credits

Faculty Moderator – Phil Byrne

Dates: May 19–July 3rd

Days: Monday, Wednesday & Thursday from 6-8 pm in PENGL 325

Graphs and charts, mean, median and other measures of location. Terminology and rules of elementary probability; normal distribution, random sampling, estimation of mean, standard deviation and proportions, correlation and regression, confidence intervals, tests of hypotheses.

Prerequisites: three years of college preparatory mathematics; satisfactory performance on the university administered Quantitative Skills Inventory Test.
